Letter from the President

Letter from the Cantor

Kids Coping During the Pandemic: A TBZ-Jewish Family Services Partnership

As I write this clergy message in early July when the heat indexes are soaring and Buffalo is the picture of summer, I know that even this glorious weather cannot be enough of a balm to soothe the restless *neshamot* (souls) of our students who are anxious about the future and their hunger to socialize, play, and live the life that they had always known cannot be satiated during a pandemic.

As we have been experiencing, many of our plans have been put on hold or have taken on a new form. For over two years, our current Bar and Bat Mitzvah students have set their sights on a day where they will be recognized and celebrated as they take on their new roles as recognized adults within our Jewish community. Envisioning this once in a lifetime ritual, now constricted to being in their homes using Zoom, is a distant second compared to what they've been setting their hearts on which is being in our gorgeous sanctuary, on our bimah with friends and family.

Recognizing this reality coupled with my regular interactions with B'nei Mitzvah students and parents, I realized that as Cantor, there is more that I could offer our students to support their emotional and psychological wellbeing.

Jewish Family Services and Temple Beth Zion will be providing <u>free</u> 1-hour weekly sessions throughout August, with a licensed social worker from Jewish Family Services via Zoom platform to facilitate healthy and safe conversations with our B'nei Mitzvah kids. The goal is to provide our students with tools and coping mechanisms they can use as we continue to move through a pandemic.

These sessions are targeted and tailored to the demographic of the students of our Bar/Bat Mitzvah program and spots are limited to 10. However, if there is more interest, JFS has many different options to help support our Temple Beth Zion family. Advance registration is required. See more details on page 9.

2020 Annual Meeting Recap

The Temple Beth Zion 170th Annual meeting was held on June 30, 2020 via Zoom. Andrew Shaevel hosted the meeting and kept all on track and running smoothly - thank you Andy!

This Annual Meeting was held via Zoom in place of an in person meeting pursuant to New York Executive Order 202.18 as extended to July 7, 2020 by New York Executive Order 202.39, which amends section 603(b) of the Not-for-Profit Corporations Law to the extent necessary to permit annual meetings of members to be held remotely or by electronic means.

The amendment to the Temple Beth Zion by-laws, which was included in the meeting notice, was introduced and approved through a vote of those in attendance and those who voted by proxy. The amendment allows for telephone and video conference meetings.

Julie Weinberg delivered her President's remarks and thanked all those who are committed to the well-being of TBZ. She thanked the Past Presidents for their wise counsel in dealing with issues and events, local and global, which have occurred over the past two years. Additionally, Julie thanked Sisterhood, Brotherhood, clergy, Ritual Committee and staff for their commitment to our community. The Governance, Personnel, Financial Planning, Ritual, Engagement, Education Committees, Security, Facilities, Building, and Re-Opening Task Forces were recognized for their ongoing work.

Julie concluded by sharing her complete faith in our next Board President, David Goldberg and by thanking the members of Temple Beth Zion for allowing her the honor of being your Temple President.

Julie's remarks were followed by a presentation by Susan Bruckheimer, on behalf of the Sisterhood of Temple Beth Zion, for the Sylvia and Alvin Small Youth Fund.

The Board of Trustees, based on on-going discussions with Cantor Penny Myers, recommended a one-year contract extension from July 1, 2020 to July 1, 2021. Cantor's contract extension was approved.

The Treasure's report was presented by Cindy Algase Gradl, Treasurer. Cindy noted the great challenges we have all faced over the past six months. The 2019-2020 fiscal year was already slated to be a difficult one financially for TBZ, even without the Pandemic.

"Amidst the Pandemic and other extraordinary circumstances, TBZ leadership decided not to present our congregation with an increase in membership dues for the upcoming fiscal year. We have historically budgeted for an annual increase of 2 to 4 percent, but this year we did not feel we can ask our families who may be struggling to increase their dues payments. Instead of an across the board dues increase, we are asking those who can to make an

extra voluntary dues contribution to assist us in closing the budget gap.

We recognize that we need to take a close look at our income and expenses in the coming year in light of what becomes our new normal and may need to make adjustments and difficult choices, but for this year we have all endured much instability and change. We wanted to provide some semblance of normalcy in our mixed up world, so we are presenting a deficit budget for your approval, being mindful of maintaining the high level of programs and services you expect and currently need.

The budget presented was recommended by the Financial Planning Committee and Board of Trustees. The budget includes assumptions which we believe reasonably represent our financial condition in light of current circumstances. We believe it is a necessary budget, given the uncertainty of our current times."

After answering questions relating to the budget, the 2020 -2021 budget of Temple Beth Zion as presented was adopted, ratified and confirmed.

Andrew shared our gratitude for the work of miriam treger honig and Aaron Weinmann, whose terms on the Board of Trustees have ended. He also thanked Julie Dressler Weinberg, who is handing over the reins to the next President of Temple Beth Zion.

The Governance Committee presented and the congregation ratified the following nominees to the Board of Trustees:

Lewis Shaevel, who will represent TBaZY, was also welcomed to the Board of Trustees.

We are fortunate to have developed a strong partnership with Kadimah, and are grateful that they and Park and the Buffalo Jewish Federation have welcomed our families with open arms.

High Holy Day Services Will Be Virtual

Temple Beth Zion's Board of Trustees has accepted the recommendations of the Ritual Committee and Re-Opening Task Force to present High Holy Day services in an allelectronic format this coming September. Citing the principle of *pikuach nefesh* – saving a life takes precedence over all other obligations – Past President Julie Dressler Weinberg, commented, "Keeping our Congregation safe and healthy is our highest obligation." The decision was reached after study of the Reopening New York Guidelines for Religious and Funeral Services, detailed analysis of Temple Beth Zion's specific situation and preparation of the Temple's reopening plan.

"For thousands of years, Jews have come together to survive both natural and human-made crises and disasters." stated Ritual Committee Chair, Anna Marie Richmond. "Together our community will create ways to come together that keep us all safe in an era of COVID-19. As we have seen with the Traveling Torah for our b'nai mitzvah families, the beauty of our rituals and our traditions provides both an anchor and a lodestar. We are sustained by our deeply-rooted connections to our rituals, and guided by our traditions to create new ways to express our connections."

From the Director

As I continue to plan for the next Religious School year, I am bombarded daily with information (and misinformation) about the COVID-19 pandemic. What we don't know about how it will continue to affect us is overwhelming. The world's most respected scientists and medical experts are telling us that this threat will not go away anytime soon, and they continue to stress the importance of remaining vigilant in our efforts to protect ourselves and each other. (Very Jewish, I suggest.)

Religious School must act in the safest, most *menschlichkeit* manner, as demanded by our tradition and values. We may wish it were otherwise, but this virus doesn't care about economics, mental health, or any other of our human concerns. Opening Religious School at Broder in September — even partially — has the potential to endanger the health and well-being of students, teachers, and families. These are not risks that I, or the leadership of TBZ, are willing to take.

What I have discovered, to my surprise and delight, is that this crisis has given me the opportunity to explore new and creative ways of learning and engaging in a manner that is safe for everyone. What if we could implement a plan for Religious School that emphasized collaborative learning? What if it promoted family conversations and encouraged siblings to participate together? What if it incorporated play, exploration, and inventiveness? And what if that plan was flexible enough so that if/when restrictions ease, small groups of students and families could gather together comfortably in their homes?

What if the curriculum content acknowledged the worries all of us have struggled with regarding our health, job and financial security, and feelings of isolation? What if that plan came with guidance for teachers who excel in the in-person classroom, but are less comfortable teaching remotely? And what if it all happened under an umbrella of Jewish principles and values?

Sounds pretty amazing... which is why I am so excited to tell you that we will be adopting a ground-breaking new curriculum for our Religious School this fall.

Called "האָרָבְרִיאוּת *La'bri-ut*: To our health and wellness," it is currently being developed by the Jewish Education Center of Cleveland, a nationally recognized agency at the cutting edge of Jewish educational practice. I look forward to sharing the details of *La'bri-ut* with you just as soon as possible. Watch for those emails!

Licensed Social Workers Matthew Stewart and Lianna Zullich will facilitate conversations and provide tools surrounding the reality our adolescents face.

Sessions will include: Coping Strategies & Self Care, The New Normal, Managing Social Connections, and Tools for the Future.

Lianna Zullich is a Clinical Social Worker at JFS. She is a graduate of Fordham University where she earned her MSW and of SUNY Buffalo where she also earned a B.S. in Social Work. She is certified as a Licensed Master Social Worker (LMSW) and her studies have specialized in trauma informed care and Cognitive Behavior Therapy (CBT).

Matthew Stewart is the Manager of the Jewish Community Care Program at JFS. He received his Master of Social Work degree from Daemen College, and is in the process of obtaining his LMSW certification.

The Traveling Torah

Zoom Instructions for Participants

Many of us had never heard of Zoom until a couple of months ago. Zoom has become a highly valued internet tool, enabling us to continue to provide Shabbat Services and other opportunities for learning and interacting. Zoom links to services, Torah Study, and other opportunities are provided in the weekly TBZ email and on the Temple website: www.tbz.org. We hope you find the following instructions and standards for Zoom to be useful.

Before an event:

You will need a computer, tablet, or smartphone with speaker or headphones.

To join a Zoom event:

At the start time of the service or event, click on the link provided on the TBZ website or your weekly email. You may be instructed to download the Zoom application.

You may also join a service or event by going to join.zoom.us on any browser and entering the Meeting ID and password provided.

To join by phone:

If you prefer to attend via your phone: Dial the teleconferencing number provided for the service or event. Enter the Meeting ID number when prompted using your phone keypad.

Zoom Etiquette

- Please mute your audio unless you are the speaker.
- Unless your appearance or background is distracting, turn on your video. A simple background plain wall, potted plant, or a bookshelf works perfectly. Position yourself so that light is coming from in front of you (behind the monitor) rather than behind you.

• Look at the camera. This takes a bit of getting used to since you want to look at the other participants faces, but try to look at the camera.

• Adjust your camera if it is too low or high. Your camera should be at eye level.

• If you can, connect to the internet via an ethernet cable. Zoom works well on wireless, but the quality is best on a solid wired internet connection.

• If you can, hold off on eating during the videoconference.

- Even though it's tempting, try not to multitask.
- Try to arrive at the start of the service or event.
- Please refrain from private behavior we can see you!

We're excited to have established a way to access your member account on the new Temple Beth Zion online membership management system powered by ShulCloud. Used by more than 900 congregations, ShulCloud will allow you to easily manage your own account information, register for events, submit donations, and connect with other members who opt-in to the online membership directory.

ShulCloud is designed to provide a secure and private way to view your transaction history and set up one-time or even recurring payments. There is so much you can do!

How to Get Started:

1) On July 6 you should have received an email from kara@tbz.org. Open it and click on the link that is provided (note, the link expires on August 6). You will automatically be brought to your Member Profile Page.

2) Create your new personal TBZ member password.

- Your username is your email address.

3) Review and update your personal information and privacy preferences. You can:

Click the **My Profile** tile to verify and edit your profile information.

Click the **My Family-Edit** tile to verify and edit your family information.

Click the **My Directory Listing** tile to verify and edit your display and sharing preferences. The listing includes only your name until and unless you choose otherwise. You will be able to allow other TBZ members the ability to look up your address, phone number, email address...whatever YOU choose.

4) Explore! Click on the "Members" link in the upper right corner to check out your personal dashboard. Upload a photo for your profile. Link a bank account. Submit a donation in honor of a loved one. Have fun!

Shulcloud is an online Congregant directory visible only to other TBZ members. If, when the last TBZ directory was printed in 2012, you selected the option to keep ALL of your information private, your name will not be visible to other congregants.
