Letter from the Rabbi

Modeh Ani – An Expression of Gratitude

Our Jewish tradition is deeply rooted in the value of expressing gratitude in concrete and meaningful ways.

Each morning, we recite a prayer called: "*Modeh Ani*" – "*I thank you*." When we recite "*modeh ani*", we thank God for allowing us to awake once again to a new day, to live our lives with meaning and purpose, with joy and contentment, and to make a difference in this world.

Acknowledgement is the first step of showing gratitude, through our words and deeds. Whether it's reciting *motz*i or *birkat hamazon* after we eat a meal acknowledging God's gifts or finding some special way to thank those in our lives who have served us well, either through a kind word, a gracious act, the proper social construct, acknowledgment should be a part of our daily lives.

When we experience a moment of meaning, a time of joy, something that should be acknowledged – do we take the time to express our gratitude and appreciation? We don't need to make grand gestures: a phone call, a simple note, a lovely tip for a good server, a word to the manager when we received exceptional service, a donation in gratitude.

When we express gratitude and give thanks, we place ourselves in relationship to something greater than ourselves. Our prayers of thanksgiving and mindfulness carve channels of gratitude on our hearts, and the more frequently we carve those channels, the more easily our spirits flow in those directions. Sometimes we offer words of gratitude because we are already feeling grateful. And sometimes we come to feel grateful because we are offering words of gratitude.

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Letter from the Executive Director

The Year that Was

In this season of hope and reflection, here are some of TBZ's wonderful achievements from another wild, complicated, yet ultimately quite successful year:

• Applied for and received a second Draw PPP loan for \$191,000, and recently submitted our application for forgiveness. Last year's PPP loan for \$189,000 was fully forgiven.

• Submitted a grant request for \$300,000 to enhance the security of our buildings.

• Requested an Employee Retention Credit of \$83,000 for 2020 payroll expenses.

- Completed our accounting migration to Quickbooks.
- Updated our Wi-Fi strength and security, our server, and nearly every computer in the office.
- Lowered costs by eliminating extraneous phone lines and upgraded our VOIP phones.
- Delivered shalach manos (Purim gift bags) to more than 600 local member families.
- Presented a lively virtual Purim spiel through Rabbi Sobel's connection to the famous Canadian duo Judy & David.
- Partnered with the Buffalo Jewish Federation to enhance TBZ's communications.
- Partnered with Hillel to bring in an intern to manage a special fundraising project.
- Survived a ransomware attack without paying the ransom and losing only a trivial amount of non-sensitive data.
- Updated our proxy voting forms to allow for yes and no votes and email responses.

• Experimented with a variety of fun new fundraising efforts, including two craft fairs, multiple Chiavetta's chicken BBQ dinners, a fish fry, a meat raffle (with kosher options), a trivia night, and more. Some events were more successful or well received than others, but we certainly made quite an effort and brought in a significant amount of funds!

• Deployed a specially crafted La-Bri'ut curriculum for a unique year of remote religious school. Our Director, teachers, and madrichim did a phenomenal job implementing the new content and adapting to the virtual format, and the families who engaged with the program found it incredibly rewarding.

• Established a Community Religious School for the Fall

with our friends at Congregation Shir Shalom and Temple Beth Tzedek.

• Reestablished our Summer Celebration at the Transit Valley Country Club. It felt like old times and brought in almost twice the revenue we budgeted. Special thanks to our sponsors and all who attended!

• Hosted nearly a dozen wonderful B'nai Mitzvah celebrations, most virtually and all meaningful. Families loved having a Torah in their home and having relatives from around the globe join in to read honors and offer congratulations from their homes.

• Established a Covid Task Force, guided by a qualified MD, to drive our policies and protocols. We generally followed CDC and Department of Health guidelines, but in the name of pikuach nefesh (the concept that saving a human life is more important than any mitzvot) typically erred on the side of caution. As time went on and more members of our community were vaccinated and positive Covid rates in Erie County decreased, we began to open up and provide opportunities for our members to gather and worship safely in-person.

• Created a History Corner on our website where we've posted stories about TBZ families.

• Repaired severe water leaks and a minor gas leak at Broder.

• Properly disposed of thousands of very old prayer books, clearing space in the Fink Auditorium which has been unusable for years. Plans are in place to remove more of the unneeded items in the coming weeks.

• Covid brought an abrupt end to our PALS program, but we established a relationship with The Park School and the Buffalo Jewish Federation to ensure PALS students were given the opportunity to continue their Jewish education. We donated and sold thousands of dollars of program supplies and applied much of the proceeds to scholarships.

• Applied for and were accepted into the Grinspoon Foundation's Life & Legacy Program, brought to Buffalo by a joint effort between the Buffalo Jewish Federation and the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies. This 4-year journey is just getting underway and will help us build our endowment to support TBZ well into the future.

• Signed JFS to a 15 year lease with a commitment to invest more than \$1 million into our Delaware facility. Special thank you to Ken Rogers for leading this effort.

• In lieu of arranging and delivering gift baskets during Covid, our Caring Community sent gift cards for Rosh Hashanah then a Chanukah album for the holiday.

• Worked with the Center for Jewish Engagement and Learning to conduct a Belonging Assessment of TBZ's policies and culture and will use their subsequent report

and guidance to promote diversity and inclusion throughout our organization.

- Provided dozens of meals for those in need through our support of the annual Turkey Basket project and a special Passover initiative.
- Rabbi Sobel hosted a well-attended Picnic in the Park as the congregation's first chance to meet her in person.

• Rabbi Sobel arranged and led a series of informative lectures on Israel.

I am proud of and grateful to my team in the office for carrying the synagogue through so many unusual challenges, to our past and present leadership for their ongoing support of the organization, and to our clergy team for continuing to deliver meaningful services and guiding us along our spiritual path. TBZ has an exceptionally strong core and it bodes well for our bright future.

We are honored to be Kol Nidre chairs this year. We joined Temple Beth Zion 18 years ago because of the history and stability of the synagogue, the diversity of its membership, and the educational programming. Having

both been raised in an active, faith community, it was important to us to establish a consistent, meaningful Jewish community for our future children.

For those of you that have children or grandchildren, consider giving for them, for the next generation, so that they may have the same experience as we did in being surrounded by a thriving, faith community. During this time of reflection, let us consider how we can participate, contribute, give back to the community that has given us so much.

Let us all take ownership of the future of our synagogue. Our TBZ community would be nothing without each of you, without all of us. Our temple cannot be sustained by only a select few – it must be all of us that are responsible for its success. The money that is raised through the Kol Nidre Campaign serves many purposes, but most importantly, each dollar we raise allows us to care for our own Temple family: your donation keeps the lights on and the doors open, supports our clergy and funds educational programming for all ages. We believe in the power of transparency, and so you might appreciate knowing that in 2018-2019, the Campaign raised about \$95,000 with the average donation of \$247.50 and the median donation of \$100. The last few years have been challenging for many of us, but the typical contribution amounts have remained the same and the average campaign total across the last 3 years is \$83,000. Because this congregation belongs to us all, we are seeking 100% participation with a goal of \$90,000 this year. Every gift matters.

We hope that you, like us, face this New Year with excitement - a clean slate with so many possibilities! L'Shana Tova!

During these opening weeks, we hope to have begun forming the relationships in our classrooms that will sustain us through the rest of the school year and beyond.

Some of our students will have learned a little more about the fall holiday cycle than they knew before. Some will have gotten their hands messy making Rosh Hashanah or Sukkot arts and crafts projects. Some will have made a new friend or two, or maybe reconnected with someone they haven't seen in several months. Some will have brushed up on their Alef-Bet or Hebrew reading skills, enjoyed learning a song they didn't know before, or begun meeting online with their 1-on-1 Hebrew tutor.
