Letter from the Cantor

Our Bond With G-d

Penny: "Siri, do you pray?"

Siri: "I don't have an answer for that."

Many believe that prayer and belief in Hashem (G-d) are only reserved for emergency situations. These are times we face that are perceived as "life or death." Moreover, these same folks may be compelled to recite an improvised prayer during such times of severe illness or when they find themselves in other situations of emotional duress or physical danger.

I remember a time I met with someone interested in converting to Judaism. She declared to me that she didn't believe in G-d. Many people have admitted their skepticism of a "higher power" or G-d. My salty reply to her was: "Tell me about this G-d you don't believe in?" Lingering in that brief silence was a shared level of trust and respect. I wouldn't push further, at least not yet, until I gained a deeper understanding of this young woman.

As we progressed in the conversation, she admitted that her final exam that morning had been postponed, followed by a "Thank G-d." I thought this contradiction was very interesting.

Why is it we only have a need for G-d during times of insecurity? Why is it some people can dismiss the notion that G-d exists - but praise G-d or pray to G-d when we need something? Or thank G-d when things go as we hoped?

Thus, I feel this is the entire nature of the human experience: When we feel out of control, we are ever humbled by the impending "danger" and then cling to the notion of G-d to "take care of us" when we find ourselves in these precarious situations.

Our relationship with G-d and prayer doesn't need to be reserved for difficult times, but rather it is a bond that can be nurtured and nourished with mindful attention that will provide an unbreakable bond as our spiritual journeys grow deeper into our spiritual foundations.

Siri doesn't pray, but we do. Try a little more, channel your thoughts deeper, immerse yourself in our worship and trust in G-d. G-d is with you at every moment of every day.

May you continue to recognize the power and majesty of Hashem when you are not faced with a difficult situation.

May Hahsem help you find shalom-peace. Shalom uvrachah peace and blessings


