Letter from the President

What a pleasure and honor it is for me to be the President of Temple Beth Zion. To paraphrase Sir Isaac Newton, I am standing on the shoulders of giants who came before me. I am particularly mindful of the women Presidents who preceded me - Joan Ellis Shatkin, Susan Adelman, Wendee Lorbeer and our immediate Past President, miriam treger.

TBZ has been the central part of my Jewish journey for my entire life. The most significant events in my Jewish life were at 805 Delaware. I began my journey at TBZ walking into our suburban building with my parents at the tender age of 4 to attend my first day of nursery school. I have fond memories of Miss Halley, Miss Ydawn and Miss Getelle. There I played with Heidi Rose, the daughter of our first cantor, Norman Rose, z'l (of blessed memory).

Rabbi Goldberg, z'l officiated my Bat Mitzvah, my Confirmation and my wedding.

My children followed me at our TBZ nursery and religious schools.

Rabbi Rosenfeld and Cantor Myers led the services at my children's B'nei Mitzvah and the funeral for my beloved father.

I tell you this to explain the depth of my commitment and devotion to our Temple.

From nursery school through the birth of my two children, I had one Rabbi - Rabbi Goldberg. How things have changed!

Transitions are challenging, but they often present myriad opportunities for change that can be truly rewarding. And they can provide opportunities for growth and innovation.

To help guide us on our path, the Union for Reform Judaism has a wealth of resources for Progressive congregations. One of those opportunities is the Scheidt Seminar for Presidents and Presidents-Elect. It is funded through the generosity of Rudi and Honey Scheidt. Since 1998, the annual Scheidt Seminar convenes congregational presidents to learn, network, enhance leadership skills and build relationships. With the support and encouragement of Rabbi Freirich, I was fortunate to have the opportunity to go to Atlanta this April to experience it for myself. Imagine 80 really nice middle-aged Jews tucked in at a hotel in suburban Atlanta. It was like Camp Lakeland for "alta kockers." We prayed together, learned together, ate and drank together, and shared our thoughts and concerns about our congregations. It was truly a life changing experience.

Shmita – The Sabbatical Year

Our Torah tells us:

When you enter the land that I assign to you, the land shall observe a Sabbath of the Lord. Six years you may sow your field and six years you may prune your vineyard and gather in the yield. But in the seventh year the land shall have a Sabbath of complete rest, a Sabbath of the Lord.

We glean from these verses the importance of the agricultural rest for our land to lie fallow after six years of toil and harvest. So, too, it has become custom of clergy after a significant period of faithful service, and in accordance with contractual agreement, to observe a sabbatical period as well. During sabbatical periods many of us choose not to lie idle but rather to work on a special project or two, whether it is a book or intense professional development and study. Sabbaticals are observed and supported by our movement (Union for Reform Judaism), by professional organizations of Cantors and Rabbis, and by synagogue leadership.

Why would a Cantor or Rabbi need a sabbatical?

Consider this: As clergy, the emotional and spiritual health of our Congregation is the life-blood of what we do. The emotional extremes we carefully navigate are unlike most vocations. A typical day could be spent taking care of a spouse who just lost their beloved with the next hour spent visiting someone at a nursing home whose family is out of town and then tutoring a b'nei mitzvah student. We share times of loneliness, moments of crises, questions of faith, illnesses, and moments of mazel tovs, often without taking the time to process or recharge so we are able to attend to our Congregation. As your clergy, we are on call 24/7. We go into the pulpit knowing and accepting this fact. When we are on call, we know that at any time our phones can ring with an emergency. A sabbatical provides the Cantor or Rabbi a designated period of time for a hard reset, a dedicated downtime.

When is one granted a sabbatical and how long is a typical one?

As we read above, the Torah states every six years, then a period of sabbatical. Although I have been serving TBZ for 12 years, this will be my first. On average a sabbatical is six months. However, mine is two months.

I want to share a few of those moments with you. At our first gathering, Rabbi Rick Jacobs, the President of the Union for Reform Judaism, shared from Ecclesiastes: *Toveem ha'shnayim meen ha'echad*, meaning two are better than one. He had us say the Hebrew over and over as a group, to really drive home the point that we are stronger when we work together as a community than when we try to accomplish things on our own. It was truly a powerful and moving moment.

The next day I shared Shabbat dinner with Rabbi Jacobs, Rabbi Aaron Panken, President of the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute; Daryl Messinger, Chair of the URJ Board; and several presidents-elect who by this point already felt like old friends. Celebrating Shabbat with all these lovely people was really a magical moment. After dinner, Rabbi Panken gave a brilliant talk about "Leading and Learning in the Talmud."

I left Atlanta with a bunch of phone numbers from my new friends and a feeling of tremendous community, excitement and optimism. I left with the strength and wisdom of an incredible group of people. "Two are better than one."

Less than two weeks later, my new Scheidt friends were a community joined in grief. I received a text from one of my colleagues that the remarkable Rabbi Panken had been killed in a plane crash. He was an amazing leader, a brilliant man, and a truly lovely person. Our world is diminished without his bright light. May his memory be for a blessing.

While there is no replacing Rabbi Panken, others will surely strive to carry on his legacy at HUC. We can honor his legacy by doing everything we can to have a caring, vibrant Temple Beth Zion.

I begin my presidency truly excited to work with our board, our leadership team and our wonderful, caring Congregation. I feel lucky to follow Miriam Treger Honig's inspired leadership and hope to build on all that she started. Our board will be having a retreat this month to develop a plan for the coming year.

I want to close by reiterating my sense of excitement and humility as I begin my time as the President of Temple Beth Zion. What do Cantors and Rabbis do on sabbaticals? What are your plans?

The sabbatical time is a very sacred time, like Shabbat. Cantors and Rabbis devote this time away to work on projects that they wouldn't otherwise be able to do while actively serving their congregations and to reinvigorate their spirituality. Cantors often write books, record albums or compose music. Both my sister-in-law, Rabbi Nancy Myers and a good friend, Cantor Matt Axelrod, just finished books. For me, I have begun the genesis of a book that I am submitting the query letter to editors and publishers focusing on a specialized pedagogy for non-typical students as they prepare for Bar/Bat Mitzvah. While I wait for an agreement (hopefully within the year) I will be reinvigorating my Cantorate for TBZ by exploring deeper our sacred homeland of Israel. Because the length of my sabbatical is shorter than typical, I will be in Israel the entire month of July refreshing my Hebraic skills, reigniting my connection to Israel outside of the diaspora, and learning from esteemed colleagues who live and teach in Israel. I am also able to officiate at the Bat Mitzvah at the kotel (Western Wall) for one of our TBZ kids. In August, my main project will be to assist and work alongside our Buffalo Jewish Federation to help with the "Jewbilee" on August 19th; my special project is the orchestration of the "Chai 5 /5 K" fun run and walk that morning. How has TBZ and you prepared for your absence?

Services and worship will continue to be led by Rabbi Freirich and Judy Henn. We have very few B'nei Mitzvah services this summer and have engaged tutors to assist with students. Because of the summer gap, I began meeting with students several months ago so our families would feel solidly prepared before my departure. During the spring, Rabbi Freirich and I diligently planned our High Holy Day services. And our 2019 Stained Glass Cultural Arts season was planned over the past few months.

On a personal note, I am deeply grateful that our leadership recognized the importance and significance of granting me this time for spiritual and professional growth. I will miss you, but will be back before you know it!

The Fast I Desire

The Book of Isaiah, Chapter 58, Verse 6: "This is the fast I desire: To unlock fetters of wickedness, and untie the cords of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free; to break off every yoke."

We have a lot of fast days in Judaism that most of us don't know about. When I read Abigail Pogrebin's book *My Jewish Year* last fall, I began to think about her experience of re-exploring fast days, especially the Tenth of Tevet.

This year, the Tenth of Tevet occurs on December 18. The day commemorates the beginning of the destruction of the First Temple in ancient times. Pogrebin quoted Rabbi Yosef Blau of Yeshiva University:

"Blau believes there is a powerful lesson in marking the start of this devastation. We should notice the clouds; they could warn of an approaching tornado. 'There's a sense on the Tenth of Tevet that we should always be concerned about what things may lead to, instead of waiting for some tragedy to happen,' Blau says. 'We should be alert to the early stages of the process. The fact that we fast even for the beginning of the destruction, not just for the destruction itself, is probably a reminder that we should be sensitive to dangers even early in the game.'"

Pogrebin continues:

"I like that: Heed the signs. Care about the start of something bad, don't wait for it to grow worse."

This year I aim to use these ideas of "heeding the signs" with regard to our fast days and advocate turning these days of lamentations into calls of action.

We will start this project on the Ninth of Av, Saturday evening, July 21, by looking at the thoughts of Dr. Jonathan Haidt and his book *The Righteous Mind: Why Good People Are Divided by Politics and Religion*.

Please keep an eye out for other events around this theme. Our Elul Study series will also look at different aspects of the challenges of staying in difficult conversations with people with whom we disagree. The series will take place during Shabbat Services on Fridays, August 10, 17 and 31.

I believe that we Jews are called to this effort – we can bring people together over common ground no matter how much we disagree. I believe that the Jewish people are needed in our world now more than ever, and in the words of Hillel, the great rabbi: "If not now, when?"

Let me know what you think.

Thanks for reading, listening, thinking, participating, arguing, and acting as agents of change for a better world together.

Our Annual Meeting is an opportunity for us to come together every year to check in with each other on our Jewish journey. It is a time to celebrate the many moments we have shared as a community over the year and to rededicate and refocus ourselves for the future. This is the last time I will address our Congregation as President of TBZ. It has been my honor to lead our congregation over the past two years. And while we have seen many changes, some planned and others not, we are moving forward together. As with everything, there is always more work to do, but together we can accomplish wonderful things at TBZ.

Since last July, we have:

- 27 new families we now call a part of our TBZ family.
- Celebrated our Confirmation students and High School graduates.
- We've schmoozed, worshiped and volunteered as one, not just among our TBZ selves but with increased collaboration within our broad Jewish Buffalo.
- We have stood with our interfaith community partners in an effort to bring healing to our community.
- Shared in the happiness of our 32 B'nei Mitzvah students and 10 Consecration students.
- We've cared for each other in sickness and sadness, and said goodbye to close friends and members of our TBZ family.
- We have smiled, laughed, prayed and sung together when sharing holidays.

We take each opportunity to assess our needs and resources to make the best choices possible so we have a strong and sustainable TBZ community. We strive to be flexible, nimble and focused on meeting YOUR needs.

The Board of Trustees continues to provide oversight and strategic direction to our TBZ community as Rabbi Freirich and Cantor Myers provide us strong spiritual and communal leadership and Amy Schaefer manages our daily operations and finances.

With the spiritual and communal leadership of Rabbi Freirich and Cantor Myers, we are constantly seeking ways to share our Jewish journeys and build community.

We recognize that for many, worship and spirituality does not happen solely within the walls of our Sanctuary. We will continue to maintain our traditions and our established sacred spaces as we engage throughout Western New York to find new spaces and meet Jews "where they are at" and in ways that are important and relevant now.

As your leaders, we focus on continuing to build collaboration and build community through what you want and the things you are passionate about, whether it be:

- Informal learning through Women of the Book, weekly Torah Study or Entering Kabbalah.
- More collaboration among our community partners.
- Engaging Jewishly in different community settings.

Our Religious School is re-energized and focused so our families and our children have a love of Judaism and a level of comfort with participating in being Jewish anywhere they go. There is growing and active participation among our teens in both Youth Group and as madrichim for Religious School. We are working hard to look both within and beyond ourselves to find commonality in Jewish communities in WNY and nationally through our relationship with the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ).

We are leveraging our partnership with the URJ so that we are able to benefit from the vast network of other Jewish communities – we spent time at the Biennial, our kids are highly connected to our National Federation of Temple Youth (NFTY) region, and we will benefit from our participation in the URJ Congregational Survey and the Community of Practice group for Early Childhood Education and participation in the social action work through our standing up as a Brit Olam Congregation.

As we look forward to our shared future, we are excited about so many things. We continue to live and expand our mission and vision to support our Jewish values and engage and connect with each other in ways that are meaningful to us.

As we move to our next "fiscal year" with an eye on 5779 we see new opportunities including:

1. Continued focus on our TBZ families and the WNY community meeting you where you are.
2. PALS-Kadimah bringing more children into our Jewish values-based program.
3. Congregant participation in spiritual life in different ways such as Shiva minyanaires, Holy Rollers, and Cantor's [Torah] Chanters.

We are 804 families strong. Our new families come to us in all shapes and sizes, and we will continue to focus on building participation, engagement and connections with each of us. Yet as our membership changes, we are committed to engaging in new ways, to working with our members differently and continue to improve how we do things.

Treasurer's Report by David Goldberg

Our financial position looks fine. The Temple has holdings in endowments and restricted funds of almost \$3 million. We do, however, run on a cash-tight basis. Over the past two years we implemented several changes to the organization and budget. We have been able to operate within the parameters of the budget this year, seeing both positive variations and challenges. We will share the full report once our fiscal year has come to a close. However, overall this year, we expect an increase of 3.6% in revenue versus a 1.7% increase in expenses, resulting in positive balance. Because of the generosity of a donor and based on our anticipated favorable position at this year, we will be able to begin to rebuild some of our reserve (savings) funds.

For the 2017-2018 fiscal year that ends on June 30, we were able to operate within the parameters of the passed budget, without touching our reserves. Unanticipated extra revenue came from PALS-Kadimah tuition. Melissa Milch and her staff did an awesome job of filling and running our early childhood education program and deserve a ton of credit for this achievement. Additional extra revenues came from higher contributions to the Stained Glass Concert Book. And a number of our operating expenses were lower than expected, including utilities.

On the down side, dues collections were slightly lower than expected, and we saw some higher maintenance expenses. Our staffing for PALS-Kadimah needed to be increased due to the higher enrollment. Combine all the positives with the negatives, and our budget finished in the black. In pure numbers, revenue increases exceeded expense increases!

While this is good news, as we look at next year we must continue to be diligent in our revenue and expense planning. We are presenting an operating budget of \$1.585 million. This is a 3.8% reduction from last year. There are a number of factors to consider for next year's operating budget. Our decisions were not made lightly. They were necessary to maintain our long-term financial stability.

Revenues:

Dues make up just under 50% of our total revenue. With declining membership comes declining dues dollars. So what does this mean for you? How many of you like to take a friend out for coffee? A large Tim Horton's coffee costs \$2! We are asking you to take your Temple out for coffee once per month. This is the amount of the proposed dues increase of 1%. In numbers – a \$24 annual increase in dues. If you are so inclined, throw in a bagel with the coffee to make it a \$3 increase!

Our Temple receives **rental revenue** from Jewish Family Service and from Buffalo Hearing and Speech Center (which took over from Olmsted School). These revenue streams are under constant review, and we work actively with our "tenants" to maintain these relationships and their long-term goals.

A number of our members make monthly payments to the Temple, using a **credit card**. We are now asking that some of these payments include a convenience fee associated with these transactions, as many other organizations do. The savings to the Temple will be almost \$10,000! There are also other ways to make payments to reduce all expenses.

As any institution should, we are actively working on and seeking additional **fundraising** opportunities. The annual golf tournament, now heading into its 20th year, has added new partners. Congregation Shir Shalom and Buffalo Jewish Federation have joined our efforts. This is the only golf tournament in WNY that benefits the Jewish community. The BBC Concert held Saturday, June 16, under the direction of Past President Warren Clark was a great success. Attendees had a great time dancing the night away and contributed over \$5,000 to the temple's bottom line. Warren has graciously offered to chair this event again next year.

We ask that you keep TBZ in mind when you are planning your will and estate. **Gifts** to the Temple have historically been a extremely beneficial, as evidenced by the Sisterhood Chapel, which was refurbished with the proceeds of a very generous gift.

And our annual **Kol Nidre Campaign** is a vital piece of our continuing revenues that we so rely on.

Expenses:

We cease to exist without quality staff. Our **personnel costs** account for the majority of our expenses; it's these funds that go directly to support our TBZ mission, values and families, giving us:

- Clergy support during life-cycle events, worship, our individual interactions, festivals and holidays.
- Our teachers for Religious School and PALS.
- Continued upkeep and care of our facilities.
- General organizational support for our families.

We continue to diligently manage our expenses and seek different ways of doing things that are more efficient and still maintain quality service to our congregants. Sometimes this is slower than we'd like, but we are being thoughtful and living within our Jewish values.

The Temple has some outstanding balances from previous capital campaigns. We have budgeted a monthly amount to pay those down, as we are in the process of refinancing those debts into one monthly payment.

We own two aging buildings. Maintenance costs are a constant we live with. With the leadership of Jennifer Patrick, a Building Task Force has been formed to evaluate the viability and functionality of our buildings.

Congregational Vote

In addition to voting to approve the 2018-2019 budget, the Congregation voted to approve recommendations to:

- Ratify a new 3-year contract for Rabbi Freirich. The contract term is from July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2021.
- Elect the following to the Board of Trustees for a 3-year term: Philip Glick, Jody Goldstein, Mindy Monkarsh and Jennifer Patrick. Susan Bruckheimer and Ken Graber will continue to represent the Sisterhood and Brotherhood. Nathan Wallens will represent TBaZY.

Recognition and Honors

Sisterhood Co-President Susan Bruckheimer presented the Congregation a check to support the youth scholarship funds, and we thanked all the members of the TBZ administrative and maintenance staff for their hard work and dedication, as without them, we could not be here today. Their contribution to our community's spiritual health is beyond words.

We took special note to honor Melissa Milch and Becky Schiefer, who celebrated their 5-year anniversary with TBZ during this year. And welcomed new staff members: Judy Henn (Clergy Associate & Pastoral Coordinator), Lucky Nkubito (Delaware Maintenance) and Marcus Smith (Broder Maintenance).

Samantha Kane was congratulated for her election as TBaZY President.

We also thanked outgoing Trustees Eric Bernhardt; Madeleine Weinmann (TBaZY Representative) and Warren Clark (Immediate Past President) for serving as part of our leadership. Julie Weinberg thanked miriam treger as she concluded her term as Temple President.

TBZ Board Elects Officers

Immediately following the adjournment of the congregational Annual Meeting, the Temple Beth Zion Board of Trustees met briefly. The meeting began with the welcoming of the newest members, Jody Goldstein and Mindy Monkarsh.

The 2018-19 slate of officers recommended by the Governance Committee was announced:

- President - Julie Dressler Weinberg
- Vice President - Stephen Yonaty
- Vice President - Amelida Weinmann
- Treasurer - David Goldberg
- Secretary - Daniel Kotzin
- Assistant Secretary - Adam Field

The Board approved the motion to accept the slate of officers. miriam treger will also serve on the Executive Committee in the role of Immediate Past President.

The Board will meet in July for an orientation session/retreat. The next "regular" meeting of the Board of Trustees will take place on August 14.


