Letter from the President

The parshah that we will read the first Shabbat of November is Chayei Sarah (the Life of Sarah). The title is ironic, as it begins with the death of Sarah, our first matriarch, who represented confidence, physical and spiritual beauty, conviction, purposefulness and nobility. She also represented kindness and compassion, constantly reaching out and opening her home to strangers. The parshah begins with Abraham discussing the need to purchase a cave to bury his beloved wife.

The Eishet Chayil (Woman of Valor) is chanted by some husbands on Shabbat in appreciation of their wives. This prayer was originally composed by Abraham as a eulogy for Sarah and then adapted and inscribed by King Solomon in the Book of Proverbs.

It begins: "What a precious find is a woman of valor! Far beyond pearls is her value. Her husband's heart trusts in her...She seeks out wool and linen, and her hands work accordingly."

The words are extremely antiquated...Most of us don't spend time seeking out wool and linen. Not all of us are married to men. There are myriad family constellations that Abraham and King Solomon could not have imagined.

But I am drawn to the notion of valuing the extraordinary (and ordinary) contributions of the women in our lives. I think of the incredible women right here in our Temple family, namely our beloved Sisterhood.

I learned from "A Short History of Temple Beth Zion Sisterhood" prepared by our former Rebbetzin, Michele Hope, that our Sisterhood has been doing good work for Temple Beth Zion since 1891! They identified two areas on which to focus - philanthropy and social programming.

Today's Sisterhood, led by Susan Bruckheimer and Marilyn Schillroth, is a dedicated group of women. I am constantly impressed by their energy and devotion to each other and our synagogue. Besides building community, the activities that they plan, arrange and coordinate throughout the year are just wonderful! Their next event is their annual Games Galore (details on page 9).

While I was doing the research for this article I came across the "Jewish Women's Archive" (url: jwa.org). It is a website whose mission is to "document Jewish women's stories, elevate their voices and inspire them to be agents of change."

Letter from the Rabbi

Remembering With a Purpose

In November two important events happen on the same weekend.

On Friday, November 9, at 7 p.m., we devote the theme of our Shabbat worship to honoring and remembering our veterans on the weekend of Veterans Day.

And on Saturday evening, November 10, at 6 p.m. we remember Kristallnacht – the Night of Broken Glass – which occurred seventy years ago, on November 9-10, 1938.

Both of these days focus our attention on the past.

Jews look into the past to build a better future. We consult ancient and not so ancient sources as a continuing source of wisdom about how to go forward. Our remembrances of difficulty and of valiant efforts catalyze us to act better and more effectively in the present to bring about improvements.

This year's Kristallnacht event will feature the film "No Place on Earth," which explores the harrowing story of dozens of Ukrainian Jews who hid in caves from the Nazis.

Our Veterans Day Service will concentrate on freedom and responsibility, the cost of liberty and the duty to expand it and protect it. If you know of a veteran of the American or Israeli military you would like us to remember, please send me their name. If you are a veteran or a friend of a veteran, please come to our service and bring your friend, to be recognized by all of us.

Elie Wiesel said:

"...as a Jew, I believe that whatever we receive we must share. When we endure an experience, the experience cannot stay with me alone. It must be opened, it must become an offering, it must be deepened and given and shared...

"What is a witness if not someone who has a tale to tell and lives only with one haunting desire: to tell it. Without memory, there is no culture. Without memory, there would be no civilization, no society, no future."

The power of Elie Wiesel's vision for Judaism and humanity still reverberates. We are the inheritors of Wiesel's future and we must be the ones who remember his past, the past of all who lived through and died in the Holocaust, the past of all those who fought and sacrificed for our freedoms in this country and in Israel, and through remembering contribute to our present society and civilization, insuring a better future for everyone.

You Ask -We Answer

The Board of Trustees, Clergy and Administrator have held two community forums since May, with two more scheduled. The aim is to host a meeting once a quarter, which provides you an opportunity to ask questions.

We are sharing just a sample of the many questions that were asked during the first two sessions.

O: What is our relationship with the URJ (Union of Reform Judaism)? What resources are available?

A: TBZ is a member congregation of the Union of Reform Judaism, which provides our members and staff resources, training and materials to national and international initiatives. Through URJ membership, TBZ has participated in specialized groups to enhance our Early Childhood Program, Social Action initiatives, the Congregational Survey and Assessment, attendance at Biennial Conferences and Board Leadership classes. TBZ members can access information from the URJ at www.urj.org.

Q: Shabbat dinners were a great way to meet other members, and then we stopped having them frequently. Can we have them again?

A: YES! We are again scheduling regular Shabbat dinners prior to Friday evening services. Many will be potluck, while some may have food brought into the synagogue. All Shabbat dinners are open to the Congregation, even when they are before a Shabbat Alive or a service where Religious School grades are participating.

Q: What is happening with the survey the Congregation completed earlier this year as part of the URJ assessment?

A: The URI assigned TBZ a mentor to help us evaluate and understand the data. While some initial results were shared in early summer, our mentor presented the key findings to the Board of Trustees, Rabbi Jonathan, Cantor Penny, and Amy Schaefer in October. The board then discussed how the results compared to the key priorities identified at the orientation session in July and the initiatives that the Board is working toward. Results and next steps will be shared with the Congregation through the Bulletin and our upcoming congregational forums.

Additional questions were asked, and feedback was provided, on music at Shabbat Services; High Holy Days; celebrating Sukkot and Simchat Torah; increasing membership engagement; and the upkeep maintenance of our buildings.

Our next TBZ Congregational Community Forum is scheduled for Sunday, December 16, at 9 a.m. in the Broder Center, 700 Sweet Home Road.

Board Welcomes New Trustee

The Board of Trustees voted to accept the Governance Committee recommendation of Michael Komm to fill the vacancy left when Jennifer Patrick resigned from the board this past summer. Michael will fill the remaining year of the term. Michael grew up at TBZ, and his family has been active here for many years. He operates Leon Komm & Son Monument Company. and is widely regarded as an "Emerging Young Leader" in Jewish Buffalo. Michael actively participates in Nickel City Jews and also serves on the Board of Directors of the Graycliff Conservancy. Michael is the husband of Jill Komm and the father of Ethan and Sarah.

Building Task Force Update

As most of our members are aware, one of our biggest strengths, and largest challenges, is the reality that our congregation owns and operates two buildings. That is extremely rare among congregations of our size and financial capacity, and operating the buildings has been a significant percentage of our annual budget.

We have been fortunate to have tenants in both buildings that have helped to underwrite those annual costs, but that in itself is a challenge because TBZ is (at least in theory) in the spirituality business – and not the real estate investment business. Each of the buildings require significant investments on an annual basis, and each requires long-term capital improvements. Any expenditures come out of short-term reserves or the annual budget. This situation is untenable and requires some creative solutions.

The Delaware Building is important to the Congregation and to the community and will remain a part of Temple Beth Zion. It is the symbol of our commitment – our spiritual home and a cultural center. It offers many potential uses that could be both income-producing and add to its vibrancy. With its listing on the National Register of Historic Places, and as a part of the Linwood Historic District, any changes will fit within the constructs of preservation and respect for our place in the community.

The Broder Center offers many options. It is an asset, either for TBZ use, Jewish and secular community use, or for liquidity if sold.

Your Building Task Force will prepare an analysis of the current status of the two TBZ-owned properties and present options and recommendations to the Board of Trustees in regard to:

- 1. Safety issues.
- 2. Short-term necessary repairs and improvements and longer-term preventive maintenance.
- 3. Near-term optimized utilization of the buildings and grounds based on expected occupancy by current tenants and TBZ.
- 4. Longer-term (3-5 year) options for use and/or disposition of each building based on expected occupancy and use of buildings.



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
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
