# Letter from the President

As I write this message we're celebrating the second night of Chanukah. Now that my husband and I are "empty nesters," our celebration is rather subdued. We play our favorite Chanukah music - Erran Baron Cohen's "Songs in the Key of Hanukkah." We kindle the lights of the menorah and enjoy a quiet dinner. It's lovely in a new way.

We've also been watching our nation mourn our 41st President, George H.W. Bush. I am moved by the tributes from his family and friends. Regardless of whether you had or would have voted for him, his devotion to service to others is inspiring. Upon nomination for President of the United States, in his acceptance speech he urged people to become what he referred to as "1,000 points of light" — to celebrate people volunteering to make our country a better place. The idea was that service to community allows its members to find a "shining purpose."

A perfect example of TBZ members finding a new "shining purpose" is the heartwarming response to my request for congregants to volunteer to be a part of our newly formed Security Task Force. In the aftermath of the tragedy at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, it was clear that we needed to form a committee to objectively review the steps we are taking at TBZ to keep our congregants, tenants and visitors as safe as we can. I have been enormously gratified by the swift response from TBZ members who have an expertise in security to offer to lend a hand in modifying our security measures.

In addition, Amy Schaefer and I attended a Community Security Task Force organized by the Jewish Federation. We discussed how we can work together as a Jewish community on security matters. We discussed everything from how the local police respond to threats to Jewish agencies, to the simple idea of "if you see something, say something." I will continue to update you as we move forward.

The parsha we will read the first Shabbat of January is from the book of Exodus, Vaera. It begins with G-d telling Moses to tell Pharaoh to let the children of Israel leave Egypt. Moses complained to G-d several times that he was not the person for the job. As you know, despite Moses' self-doubt, he overcame his fear and is remembered as one of the great leaders of the Jewish people.

This makes me think that we can all rise to the occasion to be a "point of light" in our community. Please consider where your light can shine here at TBZ.

Please accept my family's wishes for good health and happiness in 2019!

The Jewish New Year doesn't ask us to make promises to ourselves; in fact, the opposite – we release ourselves from promises that we cannot fulfill.

This little piece of Jewish wisdom – start the year with fewer obligations – is one we can all take to heart as the calendar year advances.

Instead of making resolutions right now, let's offer one another, and ourselves, a little relief. Let us try to make 2019 a year of understanding instead of a year of broken resolutions.

The year might turn out to be better if two days, two weeks, or two months into it we didn't look back and say, "Wow, I couldn't stick with my resolution," and instead said, "I managed to offer a bit more sympathy this year, so far."

We have been saying this as Jews for a long time. In *Pirkei Avot*, "The Chapters of our Ancestors" (2:5), it says:

Hillel teaches:

Do not abandon community.

Do not be certain of yourself until you die.

Do not judge others until standing in their place.

Three wonderful habits to work on all year long in place of resolutions. We can even read them positively:

Stay connected with family and friends.

Embrace questions and be open to ideas from others.

Keep an open, welcoming, accepting, and curious mind about other people. Find out more.

Building good habits takes time. Let's choose good ones and work on them together.

#### **Meeting Notes**

The Board of Trustees meeting was held on November 13, 2018. After the meeting was called to order, Amélida Weinmann provided an update on the total dollars pledged to the Kol Nidre Campaign, and Jody Goldstein shared an update on the current engagement initiatives underway, including a new member welcome at the December 7 Chanukah service.

The remainder of the meeting focused on discussion of the multiple aspects related to security. Amy Schaefer shared the specific tactics initiated on the morning of October 28, when staff first learned of the Tree of Life attacks, including all exterior doors being locked within minutes and the quick response by local and state law enforcement. In addition, enhanced security procedures have been put in place, and professional and volunteer leadership is evaluating short-term, mid-term and long-term actions. Julie Weinberg announced that a new Security Task Force is being implemented (*Post-meeting note: The task force has been formed under the leadership of Michael Wisnock, who is chairing the committee*).

Evaluations will begin by both the Security Task Force and the Building Task Force working together to determine the most appropriate enhancements to our facilities. The next Board Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, January 8, at 7 p.m.

#### Winter Kallah

Representatives of TBaZY attended the NFTY-NEL Winter Kallah in Cleveland. Our TBZ youth were able to meet new people, reconnect with friends and enjoy fun, interactive activities. They sang their hearts out at song sessions and had the chance to voice their opinions at the Asefah (business meeting), which helps us guide our movement forward.

#### **Kulanu Winter Service**

The annual Kulanu Winter Service once again brought light and warmth into a dark and chilly evening. The service was dedicated to the memory of Matthew Shepard, a young gay man who was pistol-whipped, lashed to a fence and left to die in 1998. Shepard's murder, along with the murder of James Byrd, a black man who was brutally murdered by white supremacists the same year, provided the impetus for the expansion of the 1969 United States federal hate-crime law to include crimes motivated by a victim's actual or perceived gender, sexual orientation, gender identity or disability.

Shepard and 36 transgender persons who were murdered in 2018 were recalled and honored. Despite these grim reminders of how far the United States and the world need to go to eliminate bias and hatred against LGBTQ persons, the service was a peaceful, loving celebration of the diversity of all of us who are created b'etzelem Elohim – in the image of God.

At the service, Rabbi Freirich revealed that the next major Kulanu event will take place at Purim. Stay tuned.




