Letter from the President

Letter from the Rabbi

"Just because you're paranoid doesn't mean they aren't after you."

Joseph Heller, Catch-22

The celebration of Purim and the Book of Esther, including the heinous anti-Jewish villain, Haman, reminds us every year that irrational hatred towards Jews is both ancient and not finished.

I prefer a slightly less alarmist approach to Joseph Heller's observation: Don't panic and be vigilant.

Recent national and international politics has shown a clear rise in both right-wing and left-wing anti-Jewish expressions, and we must take note.

On the right, the slow renewal of Jewish life and culture in Europe takes place among advancing populism that has plummeted toward ethnocentrism, anti-immigrant fervor, and right-wing nationalism, all of which raises the specter of anti-Semitism.

The rise of American brands of white supremacism and right-wing nationalism causes drastic alarm.

Meanwhile, the left in both Europe and at home continues to embrace a narrative that makes Israel into the colonialist villain and paints Jews as behind-the-scenes manipulators of the powers-that-be for Israel's benefit.

Esther's own reluctance to come out of the closet as a Jew in the ancient story of Purim shows that publicly owning our Jewish identity has always been risky. Still, Esther's reluctance reminds us that in order to share a truth about ourselves, we need to build trust and familiarity.

We sway people with the hard work of building connections. We must call out anti-Jewish expressions in the public sphere. We must create a better narrative about who we are as Jews and supporters of Israel. And to do this we must spend the time and effort to reach out to those around us, to be the good friends and neighbors that we are in as many ways as possible, so that others will trust that what we say about who we are comes from a place of integrity and compassion.

"How to win friends and influence people" is a single piece of advice from Dale Carnegie. We have more influence with our friends.

Wishing all of you a joyous Purim, and joining with you to work on a world filled with more friends,

URJ Survey Results

In January, a meeting was held to present the results from the URJ congregational assessment. Our goal for this project was to identify the things we do well and where we need to improve based on your feedback.

The assessment included a congregational survey, sent via email in February 2018, a Board assessment, and an evaluation of TBZ's operations and staffing. TBZ's results were compared with other congregations of similar size and location.

In total, 206 members responded out of the 800+ members who were emailed the survey. This represents a small glimpse into our Congregation. Overall, our results show that compared with other congregations nationally, fewer of TBZ's members are strongly engaged and active within the TBZ community. Results also show some uncertainty within our Congregation over the last several years due to the frequent changes in staff and clergy. We recognize that these changes have impacted many of the relationships, often making it difficult to connect with TBZ spiritually and Jewishly.

Results show that the number of legacy families is a strength as many of our members are and will continue to be members because "they have always been members of TBZ." While this is an attribute of TBZ which many other congregations do not have, for those members without long family connections or who are new to Buffalo it can be difficult to build connections. Sometimes this can lead some to feel like they are "outsiders" within the TBZ community. The results do show that a majority of those responding feel welcomed by the professional staff, yet fewer feel the same sense of welcome from lay leadership and others. We are confident it is our members' intention to make everyone feel welcome whether they have been a part of TBZ for years or months and we can all make a conscious effort to include everyone.

Financially, TBZ is both collecting less per member for dues and spending less per individual. Yet TBZ is more reliant on dues and contributions vs. fundraising. Nationally, in other congregations 54% of revenue is from dues and 22% from fundraising, compared with TBZ collecting 62% and 15%, respectively. Additionally, these congregations spend \$460 more per member than they collect, whereas TBZ spends \$129 more than collected. This indicates that the changes made since 2016 have made TBZ more financially stable. While we continue to spend within our means, we recognize that our reduced spending can impact the services provided. We must identify additional revenue so that we are able to fulfill our mission and care for our TBZ families.

Board members and professional staff take this feedback seriously. We commit to making the changes needed to strengthen our TBZ community. Over the past several months, we have identified three key priorities and have already taken steps toward them.

1. Engagement

Our office staff and clergy continue to dedicate themselves to our TBZ families with an effort to offer opportunities for learning and programs. We began an Engagement Committee, led by Jody Goldstein. The committee has already offered welcome gifts to new members and is developing a Shabbat Dinner Club. There are monthly potluck dinners before Friday services with participation from each Religious School class. Over the summer and fall Havdalah services were held throughout Buffalo, which was a success, and we will schedule them again. Many committees are re-engaged, whether it is Building/Facilities, Security, Social Action, Membership Engagement or something we haven't thought of yet. We can try any idea. If you have something of interest, let us know!

2. Financial Awareness

This year more information was provided during and after the Annual Meeting about the budget. Revenue and expenses are closely monitored so adjustments can be made if actual numbers are tracking off the plan. Board meeting summaries are included in the Bulletin, and quarterly Congregational Forums are held so you can ask questions of the leadership. We are committed to share this information. We took action to refinance and pay off old debt. There is a plan to re-energize planned giving through the Fink Legacy Society.

3. Buildings and Security

New task forces were created to focus on buildings/ facilities and security. These groups are working independently but collaboratively to assess physical structures to identify necessary maintenance and enhance the security of Delaware and Broder buildings. The Building Task Force is looking beyond what is needed to maintain our facilities to ensure our facilities meet the needs of our members. The Security Task Force is assessing our physical spaces and working with staff to update our safety procedures.

Our goal is to work with you to build a healthy and welcoming TBZ community where we come together to learn and support our individual Jewish identities. We cannot do this without your participation. We will continue to try new things; some will be successful and some will not. Please let us know how we are doing – we value your feedback. Meeting Notes

The January Board meeting was held on the 8th. The meeting was called to order and miriam treger provided the month's D'var Torah.

Our ultimate goal is to make worship services fulfilling and meaningful for our members.

At PALS-Kadimah, we spent time in January learning all about snow and ice, hibernation and Arctic animals. What color would you think a polar bear is? It's white, right? Well, if you attend PALS-Kadimah, you know it's just not that simple. We just completed an experiment to find out why polar bears don't get cold in the frigid temperatures of the Arctic. Truth be told, their fur is actually transparent and holds no color. It only appears white because it reflects light. Polar bear skin, however, is black and absorbs heat from the sun.

As you see in these pictures, the children first dipped their hands in our "Arctic Coastal waters," which were extremely cold. The next step was to encase their gloved hands in a bag filled with vegetable shortening (also known as fat). Amazingly enough, the ice water was not cold anymore. Why? To keep them warm, under their skin, polar bears have a thick layer of fat that can measure up to 11.4 centimeters, or 4.49 inches. We refer to it as blubber.

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
