Letter from the President

Each June, people across the world celebrate LGBTQ Pride. The struggle for LGBTQ rights is truly at the forefront of the modern civil rights movement. Temple Beth Zion is committed to securing civil rights for LGBTQ individuals. We are guided by the basic tenet that all human beings are created b'tzelelm Elohim, in the Divine image, as it says in Genesis, "G-d created humans in G-d's image, in the image of G-d, G-d created them: male and female G-d created them."

Here at Temple Beth Zion we are celebrating Pride Shabbat in a really special way on Friday, May 31. We have a very interesting special guest, Rabbi Mike Moskovitz. He serves as Rabbi at Manhattan's Congregation Beit Simchat Torah. He will share his story at our Pride Shabbat service and march with us in the Pride Parade on Sunday, June 2. I hope that you can join us for this special weekend.

When most of us think of "tzedakah" we think of charitable giving. The term tzedakah actually originated from the notion of "righteous behavior" and is often paired with "justice." In Jewish thought "tzedakah" is a commandment. On Friday, June 21, we are going to honor the Legacy gift of Theo Kahn (z'l). The gift from Mr. Kahn's estate is the largest bequest received in the history of Temple Beth Zion, and is a tremendous example of charitable giving and righteous behavior. We will also honor all of our congregants who, like Mr. Kahn, have included TBZ in their estate planning. I hope you will join me in celebrating this very special Shabbat.

Our generous donors clearly do not take what our synagogue has to offer for granted. Likewise, the horrendous acts of anti-Semitism at the synagogue in Poway, California, and the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh exactly six months earlier, demonstrate that we can no longer take the security of our sacred spaces for granted. The Security Task Force continues its methodical work to make our buildings as safe as they can be. Our Ritual Committee has been regularly meeting to discuss how best to meet our spiritual needs. Our Engagement Committee continues to work on developing ways to help ensure that our synagogue continues to be a warm, welcoming place for all of our congregants.

The board is always looking for ways to improve the membership experience of our congregants. Letter from the Canton

This month we will conclude the seven weeks of daily counting of the omer (a biblical unit of grain that is counted up every evening from the second day of Passover until Shavuot) and celebrate the revelation of Torah at Sinai - basically, the receiving of the "10 Commandments" ...(cue the thunder, lightning and the ever-dapper Charlton Heston as Moses).

As one of the three pilgrimage holidays, shavuot isn't as well known as its counterparts: Sukkot and Passover. Shavuot is vitally important in our Jewish calendar and our identity as a people, especially at TBZ for our observation of Confirmation. So, here to get us in the mood for this Chag Habikkurim (holiday of first fruits) are a few fun and interesting facts to prepare us for this exciting festival.

- 1. Shavuot is a holiday when we don't build anything or use any objects for rituals like we do at Sukkot, Passover or Rosh Hashanah. In Reform Judaism, this is a special time for our 10th Graders to participate in a special Confirmation service, reaffirming their Jewish identities. Check out the decades of Confirmands on our walls at the Broder Center.
- 2. It is customary to eat cheesecake, dairy kugel and lots of cheese blintzes despite the fact that most Ashkenazi Jews are lactose intolerant OY!
- 3. The "10 Commandments" are actually called *ascret hadibrot*, which translates to "10 utterances", with the first being merely a statement rather than a command. "I am your G-d who brought you out of the land of Eqypt."
- 4. Shavuot is the only holiday mentioned in Torah that doesn't reference a specific date in our calendar but only that it occurs seven weeks after Passover.
- 5. In Israel, Shavuot is the most showcased holiday for agriculture. You've never eaten so well of nature's bounty than one does in Israel during the festival Shavuot.
- 6. Tikkun leil Shavuot! (The all-nighter.) It is a custom in many communities for all Jews to come together and learn all night. Come join us Saturday, June 8, at Temple Beth Tzedek (details on page 10).

The hero of this holiday wasn't Jewish, or even an Israelite. We read the special scroll Megillat Ruth. Ruth (King David's great-grandmother)was a Moabite and is attributed to "the first conversion." She is an exemplar of loyalty and devotion to her mother-in-law, Naomi.

We hope you will join with us in our many opportunities as we celebrate this incredible holiday of zman natan torateinu (time of giving of Torah) together.

Pride Weekend

All members of the Jewish community are welcome to a weekend of events at Temple Beth Zion.

On Friday, May 31, at 7 p.m., Rabbi Mike Moskowitz, a "deeply traditional and radically progressive advocate for trans rights and a vocal ally for LGBT inclusivity, will speak at the annual Pride Service at the Delaware Building. Rabbi Moskowitz will lead Torah study at 9:15 a.m. on June 1.

On Sunday, June 2, he will march with the Jewish Pride of Western New York contingent in the Pride Parade. In his own words:

"I'm marching because I grew up watching videos of my people being forced on death marches while others were silent and didn't stop it. I'm marching because in my home state of Virginia, Heather Heyer, an American woman, was murdered by a Nazi. I'm marching because the other "pride" rally for the white, straight, you-can-now-leave-your-hoods-at-home type motivates me to refocus my faith in G-d and rise up, because never again is now!"

On Saturday evening, June 1, the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus will return to the Temple Beth Zion Sanctuary at 805 Delaware Avenue for "Singing With Pride." The concert begins at 7:30; doors open at 7. General admission tickets are \$20 and may be purchased at the door or online at www.buffalogaymenschorus.com/events.



On Sunday, June 2, Temple Beth Zion will join at least 13 other synagogues and Jewish organizations to march in the annual Pride Parade. Marchers assemble in Buffalo State College parking lots R13 and R14 beginning at 10 a.m. The parade steps off at noon, and

Update

The service to honor our teachers, madrichim and volunteers, Shabbat Halimud, was held on May 3 at TBZ Delaware. We had a very nice turnout to celebrate all our staff. Our last official day of Religious School was May 19, when we had a combination of learning with our visiting Rabbis from the Halpern Scholars in Residence and a schoolwide picnic to celebrate the school year ending.

Our Religious School/PALS Kadimah Flower Sale was a successful partnership, and the flowers were beautiful. We are evaluating the fundraiser and hope it was successful enough to continue next year.

Congratulations to our 3rd grade class for collecting the most Tzedakah all year. The class has decided to donate their collection to five separate charitable organizations: Oshei Children's Hospital, The Friends of Night People, Jewish Family Service (to help refugees), the Town Square Food Pantry, and the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The Religious School classes collected a total of \$519.95 throughout the year. Money collected is used to help support our monthly Mitzvah projects and then donated at the end of the year to specific charities the class chooses.

Our 6th & 7th grade students participated in a joint program with Congregation Shir Shalom and Gesher at TBZ Delaware for Yom Hashoah on May 5 before the Community Commemoration event. We had a wonderful turnout from both schools. Our local survivor-speaker, Sofia Veffer, explained the importance of being an Upstander and not a bystander. The students also created kindness rocks, discussed social issues and had some powerful discussion time in groups. In addition, Rabbi Freirich gave a tour of the Cofeld Judaic Museum (photo on page 11). It was an emotional day, but the message for change was heard loud and clear.

In June, we will be sending out year-end reports and registration information for the 2019-2020 Religious School year. Keep a lookout in your mail for them. We are excited for the next year and some new programs we are planning. *Mark your calendars. Our first day of the 2019-2020 Religious School year will be September 15.*
