Letter from the President

During the month of Elul, we all have the opportunity to look into our own souls to prepare for the solemnity of the New Year. I learned that the letters of Elul form an acronym for the words in the verse Ani I'dodi v'dodi li - "I am my beloved and my beloved is mine" (Song of Songs). The idea is that the "beloved" refers to G-d....The sages take this verse to describe the loving and close relationship between G-d and Israel. Elul, then, is our time to establish this closeness so we can approach the Yamim Noraim (Days of Awe) in trusting acceptance of G-d's judgment. I hope you will join us for Elul study every Friday this month.

As I have begun to think about my second High Holy Days as the President of the Board of Trustees, I find myself in a reflective mood. This time leading up to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur is a time for internal housekeeping, a time for considering how we have treated others over this past year. Is there anyone I should apologize to? Are there relationships where my behavior has missed the mark? As President, I have been leading your Board in making some very difficult but necessary changes to the structure of our organization. I am sure that I have ruffled a few feathers along the way. I hope that I have taken into consideration everyone's feelings and the best interests of the Temple community. If I missed the mark, I am sincerely sorry.

We have recently hired a new Executive Director, Jeff Clark; a new PALS-Kadimah Director, Zahava Fried; and Religious School Director, Beth Steinberg. With these changes, there is a new energy that is palpable. Everything is being looked at, re-evaluated and reassessed. I think it is truly exciting and will only benefit our Congregation.

Another change is the addition of a new committee - The Facilities Committee, chaired by Bob Marcus and Steve Steinberg. Their committee is tasked with understanding the needs of our two buildings. It is truly an enormous task that they have taken on. If you see them, please thank them for their devotion to this incredibly important work.

On September 10, the Board, Clergy, Staff and other Temple volunteer leadership will gather for an Engagement Workshop. The workshop, organized by our Engagement Chair, Jody Goldstein, will feature training by Jay Lewis from Hillel International. We will receive practical training on how to make TBZ a more welcoming, warm and inclusive community for our members.

May we all be inscribed for blessings in the Book of Life. Shanah Tovah.

A Spiritual Call to Action

God cries out to us. God demands action. Are we listening? Have we heard the call?

This month we prepare for and begin the holiest cycle of our year.

When we gather together for prayers and celebrations, will we hear the voices of our prophets?

The prophets of our traditions understood that they needed to rouse us to action. Their message had to be heard and acted upon. Our world needs us.

Judaism is a unique way of entering into the world. We instruct through inquiry. We feel commanded and then challenge the commandments. We engage with one another with compassion and debate.

The High Holy Days overflow with multiple meanings and messages: repentance and rejoicing, atonement and aspiration, community togetherness that still allows us moments to be on our own with God.

This year through the month of Elul, the month of preparation for the High Holy Days, we will explore God in our worship, God in our music, and God in our work with our multi-faith and multi-ethnic community.

On Rosh Hashanah we will look at our Jewish God, the nature of Jewish theology, and why we must do more than talk about it, we must bring it to the world.

Conventional wisdom tells us that we must avoid talking about religion and politics in polite conversation. Rabbi Dennis Ross reminds us otherwise with a book titled "All Politics Is Religious" and states: "Faith grows when we uphold its vision for a better world and speak of it in the public square—while keeping church and state separate."

Our Jewish faith is welcoming and engaging, loving and accepting, challenging and advocating for a world filled with justice and mercy, and imbued with power by a profound connection to a God who is the source of all and one that we dare not describe.

We need our Judaism, and the world needs us to bring it out of the synagogue and into the public square.

Our Elul Study Series will feature two special speakers this year. The series will take place during 6 p.m. Kabbalat Shabbat Services at Temple Beth Zion, 805 Delaware Avenue, on Fridays, September 6, 13 and 20 and at the Broder Center on September 27.

On September 6, Cantor Barbara Ostfeld will speak about her new book, Catbird: The Ballad of Barbi Prim. In the story, the world meets an insightful, opinionated eight-year -old who has already taken a few steps toward becoming a pioneer—but also a shadow of her quirky self. With awkwardness, anxiety, and fear in tow, she embarks on an imperfect but continuing metamorphosis and becomes the strong, well-coiffed heroine of her own story.

Cantor Myers leads Elul on September 13 and will examine personal G-D and prayer.

On September 20, we welcome Rev. Joan Montagnes, Minister of Unitarian Universalist Church of Buffalo. The topic will be God in our Multi-Faith and Multi-Ethnic Communal Relationships.

Rev. Montagnes will join us for a service dedicated to exploring the meaning and importance of creating and cultivating connections between our Jewish community and communities of different backgrounds in both ethnicity and belief.

Rev. Montagnes and Rabbi Freirich work together in many community settings and collaborated in last year's "The Righteous Mind" series and on the Crossroads radio show, among other projects in the community.

Rabbi Freirich will lead the final event in the series on September 27 at the Broder Center. The Many Faces of God in Judaism will be the topic of the special service dedicated to the multiple ideas of God and meaning in Judaism.

Income Tax Perk

Our United States tax laws are more complicated than the Talmud or even a wedding seating chart. Yet somehow, hopefully, we've managed over the years to set aside a few shekels.

One perk of the current tax laws is the ability for those who are 70-1/2 years or older to direct their IRA Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) directly to a qualifying charity. By directing a transfer from your IRA to a charity, you get to count that money toward your RMD, but because it's not actually distributed to you, it doesn't increase your adjusted gross income. It can be great way to pay your dues or Kol Nidre contribution.

There is much more to it than that, but I won't pretend to know all the "ins and outs" of it. Suffice to say that I think it's worth your time to find out if it's a good thing to do for your personal situation.

The Past Is Present Painting and Prints by Harold L. Cohen

A special exhibition by artist and Temple Beth Zion member Harold L. Cohen is on display at the Burchfield Penney Art Center .



Through Thursday, October 31, you can view the exhibition *The Past is Present:*

Paintings and Prints by Harold L. Cohen, which focuses on work created by the artist over the last twenty years. After retiring from teaching, Cohen has focused on painting, printmaking, and sculpture. The prints included in this exhibition were created using various techniques. These include intaglio, dry point etching, plastic engraving, linocut, woodcut and wood engraving. These works focus on the past atrocities committed by authoritarian regimes. Numerous works from Germany and Europe reflect on the horrors of the Nazi genocide during World War II and its aftermath. Concentration camps in Belgium, Germany and Poland are depicted. Images from Israel of some of the historically important sights that the artist visited are included as well. These represent both the struggles of the Jewish people and the solace that the historic homeland provides.

From the Director



Shmi (My name is) Beth Steinberg and I am truly delighted to be saying Shalom to old friends and new ones as the recently appointed Director of the Temple Beth Zion Religious School.

I come to TBZ after teaching in the elementary grades at Kadimah

Academy for the past 13 years. While my content area at Kadimah was always in Secular Studies (English Language Arts, Math, Social Studies, Science...) I relished the Jewish atmosphere of the school and the Jewish influence on every aspect of my work. Whether it was the Hebrew or Yiddish phrases that I heard (and used myself from time to time) in casual conversation, the strains of familiar tunes that wafted down the hallway, the smells and tastes of traditional holiday foods, the days off for Jewish holiday observance, or the teachings of Torah that guided our decisions and actions, school always felt like home to me.

I had no idea that my next job would also be in the field of Jewish education and that my new place of employment would so quickly also feel like home. How lucky am I?

It clearly helps that I am not a total stranger to TBZ or to the Religious School. Prior to working at Kadimah, I taught Hebrew at both Temple Beth Am and Temple Beth Zion. All three of my now-adult children attended Religious School here, my two younger ones celebrated becoming Bar and Bat Mitzvah here, my older daughter served as President of TBaZY, and all three of my kids were confirmed at TBZ. Every day I am here, I am happy to re-establish connections with people who already have a connection to me and my family. (Of course, establishing new connections with people I haven't yet had the opportunity to know and work with is an honor and a pleasure!)

According to our Mission Statement, the goals of the TBZ Religious School are... 1) to create a loving and caring learning environment fostering a love of Judaism, Jewish community, fellow Jews, and the world, 2) to learn Jewish traditions and blessings, and 3) to develop a deep bond to our Jewish history and Jews everywhere. We call these three pillars *Ahava* (Love), *Torah* (Learning), and *Israel* (People and Land.) It is my intention to welcome all of the young people in our Congregation, from preschoolers through those in high school, into our tent, with activities and programs that bring them together to meet these goals in ways that are age-appropriately interesting, inspiring, and informative.

As a classroom teacher, my first priority in the classroom always was to create a safe and supportive *Kehillah* (community.) Each student must feel that she or he is a valued and valuable participant before learning and growing can occur. My promise to the students in our Religious School is that I will work with all of our TBZ teachers, clergy, and personnel to make sure that each one of you feels safe, welcome, valued, and valuable. Only then can we pursue the Jewish learning, Jewish identity, and Jewish connections that are vital to our future as individuals, in our families, and in all of our larger communities.

L'dor vador, a familiar phrase from our liturgy comes to mind. Literally translated as "from generation to generation," l'dor vador emphasizes the responsibility of passing our Jewish knowledge and traditions on to our children. L'dor vador is essential to sustaining our people.

Parents, we need you to be partners with us in *l'dor vador*! Our dedication toward creating engaging and inspiring lessons, projects, and programs can only work with your support and involvement.

If we haven't yet met, and even if we have, please come to "Bagels with Beth!" on Sunday morning September 8, from 9-11 at the Broder Center. We'll have coffee and bagels, and some activities to keep your kids amused while we chat. RSVP to Kara@tbz.org by September 5 so we know how many to expect!

I look forward to saying *Shalom* to old friends and new ones in person, whether on that morning or at any other time.

How We Worship at TBZStanding and Sitting, Coming and Going

This is the second installment in an on-going series prepared by the Ritual Committee.

Why do we stand for some prayers and not for others? If I have to leave the Sanctuary should I do it while the Congregation is sitting or standing? What's going on with Kaddish?

Jewish worship has always had a kinesthetic component: as far back as the Book of Exodus, the Israelites were commanded to put unleavened bread and cakes into the hands of Aaron and his sons and wave them before God as a "wave offering." (Exodus 29:23-24). Our weekly worship today involves our bodies as well as our minds, spirits and voices.

The most common physical components of worship involve standing at particular points of the service – for those who are able to stand.

At Temple Beth Zion, we customarily stand during the last verse of L'cha Dodi on Friday nights when we rise and turn toward the door to welcome in the Sabbath bride. We also stand at a designated point during the Chatzi Kaddish, for the call to worship (the Bar'chu), during the Amidah ("Standing prayer"), whenever the Ark is opened, during Aleinu, and for Kaddish. The service leaders cue the Congregation at the appropriate times.

Because these are key points of the service, many long-time members of Beth Zion recall learning that you should not leave the service during times that the Congregation is standing. It is also customary to never turn one's back on the Torah as a sign of respect. Thus, if one needs to leave the service briefly to attend to personal needs, it is preferable to not do that while the Torah is out of the Ark.

In some congregations only those mourning a recent death or a yahrzeit stand for Kaddish; in others, the entire congregation stands in recognition of those who have no survivors to say Kaddish for them. Although the custom has varied somewhat at TBZ, generally the entire Congregation rises for Kaddish.
