Letter from the President

In December, I had the distinct pleasure of attending the URJ Biennial in Chicago. This was my second Biennial, and once again, I found the experiences that were most meaningful to me were those I had not anticipated.

I attended a few gatherings of synagogue presidents, and I recognized many of the attendees as fellow participants of the Scheidt Seminar I had attended the April before I began my term. Most synagogues across the country are facing similar joys and challenges. Whether a 30-family synagogue in a small, rural community or a large synagogue in an urban area, we are all dealing with similar issues: how to remain relevant to our families, how to deal with our aging buildings, how to connect with millennials, etc.

One seminar I signed up for on a whim was called "What's Your Story? Using Personal Narratives to Build **Relationships".** The purpose of the workshop was to help us understand how powerful storytelling can be and how sharing stories can help bring our congregants together.

Something quite unexpected happened when we were randomly assigned to our 10-person "Group 5" by our "What's Your Story" facilitators. Our small group of strangers connected emotionally and spiritually in a way that we could not have foreseen. One group member, Larry, shared that he and his family were made homeless after the horrific events of 9/11. He and his family moved in with his in-laws in New Jersey. His family was "adopted" by his inlaws' shul, where they found spiritual comfort at a devastating time in their lives. Congregants even held a "shower" for his family to help them get back on their feet. Larry became so connected to his new congregation that he became president of the shul.

The last person to share was a beautiful woman named Davida. She shared her amazing journey of coming to understand that although she was assigned male at birth, her neshama was female. Davida shared how her rabbi led her through this process Jewishly, including going to the Mikva and doing a naming ceremony in which Davida renamed herself to match her true identity. We were all in tears at the conclusion of her emotional story. Larry collected our addresses and we have maintained contact since the conference.

I found this experience incredibly moving. We at TBZ can become a closer, stronger community through sharing our narratives. I invite you to join me in a storytelling workshop on March 13 at 6 p.m. at Broder before our Spirituality Shabbat service. What's your story?

Engagement Committee News



It's February, and even though it is an historically Christian holiday, my thoughts cannot help but turn to Valentine's Day. Rabbi Benjamin Blech stated, "When I am asked as a rabbi if I think it's a good idea for Jews to celebrate Valentine's Day, my standard answer is, 'Yes, we should celebrate love... every day of the year.' As long as one day has been singled out to emphasize the meaning of love, this might be a wonderful moment for us as Jews to remind ourselves of its deeper meaning as a commandment."

Love for the major Talmudic Sages represents the ultimate mitzvah. When a non-Jew asked Hillel to "teach the entire Torah on one foot," his response was essentially the idea implicit in the verse in Leviticus (19:18), "love your neighbor as yourself." There are two instructions given here. The verse is commonly used to remind us to love others, but we ignore, at our own peril, the first necessary step that has to be taken in order to accomplish the goal of loving others. Love your neighbor, the Torah teaches, as yourself.

When I joined Temple Beth Zion, I did not feel loved by my spiritual home. I attended Shabbat and holiday services and brought my son to Religious School, but I felt a lack of connectedness. Only by loving my synagogue as I love myself, did I feel loved by and connected to it. I joined committees. I volunteered for projects. I baked cookies and visited the sick and prayed with the bereaved. Eventually, I joined the Board of Trustees, and by doing so I began to see my efforts of loving Temple Beth Zion as I love myself make a true difference.

Our community is looking for connection, and connection will continue through monthly events. But let's not wait for these events to form connections. Let's find connection by stepping up and loving Temple Beth Zion as we love ourselves. I promise that the love you receive back will more than exceed your efforts.

From the Director

Religious School

I am so grateful that I was able to attend the URJ (Union of Reform Judaism) Biennial in Chicago in December, where "... thousands of Jews from across North America and around the world gathered to learn, pray, share ideas, dance and sing, hear from inspiring speakers and leaders of our Movement, reunite with old friends, create new connections, and make decisions about the policies of the Reform Movement."

The collective energy of so many involved and enthusiastic Reform Jews can't be experienced anywhere other than at a Biennial. Biennial isn't just for clergy and other Jewish professionals. Everyone is more than welcome to attend! The next Biennial will be held December 8-11, 2021, in Washington D.C. I certainly hope to be there and it would be wonderful if you were there, too.

At Biennial I participated in several sessions devoted to Jewish education and engagement, including seminars on Transitioning from Early Childhood to Engaged Congregants, Post-B'nei Mitzvah Engagement, The Art of Gathering, Tot Shabbat: Multi-Generational Community Building, and Saving Confirmation: A Way Forward. I was exposed to incredibly meaningful worship experiences, thought-provoking speakers, and an abundance of Jewish and Israeli music. I have much to sift through and much that I look forward to putting into practice here at TBZ.

Those of you with children in Religious School may notice some minor changes to our Sunday schedules. Focusing more intently on our core mission to create a loving and caring learning environment where our students and families grow a love for Judaism, their Jewish community, and the world in which we live (*Ahava* – Love), learn Jewish traditions and blessings (*Torah* – Learning), and develop a deep bond to our Jewish history and to Jews everywhere (*Israel* - People & Land) demands that we provide our students and teachers ample time in their classrooms for deep and meaningful engagement. I have recently fine-tuned our schedules to accomplish this. In the future, I will examine other aspects of our education programs so all of our families and students feel they have a significant place in our school and our synagogue.

On a practical note I am delighted to share that we now have a Religious School bulletin board. It is located across the hall from the Conference Room at the Broder Center. Please visit and enjoy our first display - the interpretation by our 3rd Graders, expertly led by their teacher Ms. Rachel Lipman - of the *Modeh/Modah Ani* prayer. *Modeh/Modah Ani* offers thanks to God for restoring one's soul and is traditionally recited when one awakens each morning. I think you will be very impressed by their work!

The Jar of Hearts

It can be so difficult to find a silver-lining in our world these days. As I write this article, I find myself desperately trying to think of goodness and kindness and, more importantly, where it can be found. It is easier to focus on negativity, but as we all know, just because something is easy does not mean it is best. So, let me pose two questions, and then we will walk through the answers together.

1. When do we teach kindness?

The simple answer to this questions is ALWAYS, but the more specific answer is during the early childhood age. Between the ages of 2 to 3, children develop an ability to understand empathy as their socio-emotional skills become more advanced. By teaching children empathy they begin to understand it is of the utmost importance. Children learn *chesed* (loving-kindness) through acts of love, such as sharing, taking turns, and maybe even hugging a friend who is sad and injured. As they perform these actions, they learn to practice kindness throughout their daily routines. There is a lovely Hebrew phrase that demonstrates this phenomenon: "Mi'toch sheh'lo lish'ma ba lish'ma." In English, this translates to "By repeatedly doing something not for its own sake, one eventually does do it for its own sake."

2. How do we teach kindness?

There are multiple ways to teach kindness to children. For example, one technique is modeling kind behavior; another is using puppets and putting on a play. In the PALS-Kadimah classroom, we have a Jar of Hearts. The Jar of Hearts is featured at the entrance of the preschool classroom, and is decorated with paper hearts that the children designed themselves. Whenever a teacher notices a child performing an act of kindness, that child is rewarded with a heart to place inside our Jar of Hearts. Once the Jar is full, the children will have a Kindness Party. Very quickly, the teachers noticed something incredible. Initially, the children were almost excessively kind in order to get a heart because the reward itself was exciting and the positive attention that went along with that reward was even better. Now, let's go back to the Hebrew phrase from before: "Mi'toch sheh'lo lish'ma ba lish'ma." The kids wanted the hearts. They didn't initially care about being kind for their own sakes. But within a couple of weeks, we noticed the children being kinder just because they wanted to be kind. I even had a child tell me that she didn't need a heart to put in the jar, she just wanted to give a hug to a friend who missed his mommy. When she said those words to me, my heart melted.

I say, let's go back to preschool. Let's remember to be kind, and notice kind acts no matter how small. Perhaps by becoming more mindful of kindness, we can help our world become a kinder place.

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
