Letter from the Rabbi

Blessing #2 of 6: The Blessing of Celebrating Each Other's Gifts

In the May bulletin, I gave an overview of the biblical concept of "kehillah" – community. This biblical notion of "community" will serve as our guide as I explore six different lessons of how to strengthen our relationships to create a strong, vibrant Temple Beth Zion community.

In the May bulletin, I outlined Blessing Number 1: <u>The Blessing of Great Strength in Community</u>: There is great power, strength and love in community coming together for a common purpose.

This month, I would like to highlight Blessing Number 2: The Blessing of Recognizing, Encouraging and Celebrating Each Other's Unique Gifts.

There's a beautiful story in the Talmud that also exemplifies this: God wanted to bring together the most talented musicians of all kinds to create a celestial symphony. Each musician was so skilled in his or her own right at his or her own instrument. When they each sat down and played, however, the noise they produced was the most discordant cacophony. It took a skilled conductor, a talented musical arranger, a beautiful composition and the ability of the musicians to work together in harmony listening to each other and knowing just when and how to play together to produce the most heavenly, divine music. It is the same for us. When we gather together as a kehillah kedosha, it's about the power that comes from each of us taking our own individual gifts and joining them with those of others to create something that is sacred, beautiful and unique - that will enhance the lives of those in our midst. All of us together must decide what we will create communally with our combined gifts. This will not be an easy task, as each of us joins Temple Beth Zion with our own hopes, our own dreams, our own frailties and our own fears. What we do together as a k'hillah kedosha is meant to shape a world of holiness, dignity and equality for God's children everywhere.

Sometimes, this means putting aside our own personal needs for the sake of the common good. It might mean recognizing that someone else has a unique gift that might be better suited for the work that needs to be done. This requires patience (savlanut), understanding (bina), deep listening (hakshava amuka) and working together in coordinated partnership (shutafut) on many different levels.

He is also a professional opera singer and a visual artist, a composer, and an instrumental musician, and a teacher. "I am delighted to be working with Cantor Labow," said Rabbi Sobel. "I have known him for decades. He is remarkably talented, and will bring beauty and *ruach* to TBZ's High Holydays."

Cofeld's Corner "Images of the past in our present and in our future."

In 1984, Paul Pasquarello took more than one hundred photographs for a catalogue published by Temple Beth Zion that provided a record of many of the artifacts in the museum. Last year, he kindly located his negatives, and gave them to the temple.



These were recently put into digital form so that we can utilize them for online exhibitions. The images are in black and white and are evocative renditions of a range of ritual and historical items, and art and sculpture pieces.



Capturing much of collection as it was in 1984, photographs represent a time capsule of how far the museum had grown to that point. In a program that will build out in stages from June, we will be adding a section to the temple website, so that we can showcase specific collections featured in these photographs, beginning with an online display of Havdalah besamim

or spice "boxes".

What was also a wonderful surprise were additional negative strips that showed new internal images of the sanctuary of Temple Beth Zion. The sanctuary as a worship space has intimate connection for members and it has been the inspiration for poetry by visitors including Yevgeny Yevtushenko, Soviet-Russian poet and novelist, and members like Dr. Joseph Manch, who was a former Buffalo school superintendent. But most of the artistry connected with the sanctuary is photographic, including images produced by Dr. Manch to accompany his poem. In prepandemic times, the sanctuary was a sought-after place for photographers to visit, with images published in journals, books and articles. Our hope, with the help of volunteers in the future, is to document these images across publications and media, and with permission, reproduce some of these for another online exhibition. Check back for more updates on the progression of these projects!

Engagement Committee News

As the calendar turns to June, we realize that Father's Day is on the way. My relationship with my father had mostly fluctuated between distant and difficult, eventually mellowing to a point of acceptance over the past decade or so. Fathers' Day memories, both from my



childhood and during my time of being married include home-made cards... neckties.... and steak cookouts. And later, when I was divorced, it was a time for my children to go to their father's house while I got together with other divorced moms for a relaxing afternoon at the movies.... or a pedicure.... or a ladies-only lunch.

We know that G-d commanded us to "Honor your (mother and) father" but translating this into action may not always be easy. Rabbi Daniel Brenner from The National Jewish Center for Learning and Leadership has stated, "On Father's Day, we honor our fathers not by comparing them to some ideal but by acknowledging them for who they really are. We pause to reflect on their history, remember the challenges they faced, and meditate on what they taught us along the way."

One of the happiest times I shared with my father was during Thanksgiving, 2016. My son and I spent five wonderful days in Delray Beach getting to know him as a person in a way that had never happened before. It was the first time (seriously!) that my father ever let me borrow his car (and I

From the Director

And that's a wrap! Twenty-four sessions of Religious School from September 2020 to May $2021 - all \ online$.

While I was planning last summer for this recently completed school year, nobody had any decent idea how, or for how long, COVID would continue to affect us all. The only choice that felt appropriate to me was to rely on the advice of pandemic scientists and medical experts who stressed the importance of remaining vigilant in our efforts to protect ourselves and each other. With the support of our TBZ leadership, I determined that we would act, as demanded by our Jewish values, in the safest manner possible.

As I wrote in this column, "We may wish it were otherwise, but this virus doesn't care about economics, mental health, or any other of our human concerns. Opening Religious School at Broder in September — even partially — has the potential to endanger the health and well-being of students, teachers, and families. These are not risks that I, or the leadership of TBZ, are willing to take."

But, how would it all work? The questions were overwhelming...

- Would our students stay enrolled in Religious School? Would they feel welcomed and engaged with their teachers and peers? Would they benefit from attending Religious School online? Would their understandings of Jewish concepts increase and their levels of Hebrew competency improve?
- * Would my faculty be willing and able to adopt new curricula and new styles of teaching? Would I keep the same curricula that we had used in person or make changes to our content?
- * Would parents appreciate or resent us being fully online? Would we be able to return to our classrooms at some point during the year? How would materials be distributed to students?
- * And how could we foster the community aspect of worship... of singing, praying, and learning together in a *k'hillah*?

It was time to re-evaluate and re-invent almost everything we knew about Religious School. Many parents just couldn't put their kids in front of a screen on Sunday mornings. (As I've written before, this was disappointing to me, but I understand. Parents must make the best decisions they can for their children. There isn't always a "right" or "wrong" choice.)

Most of my faculty was open and willing to trying new things, and I commend them for growing each week in their abilities. Most students attended most sessions, and many of them grew to embrace the weekly La-Bri'ut Activities and Challenges. Some of them even learned to post their mini-videos on our Flipgrid!

I admit we had a rocky start technologically. I was so embarrassed at the time, but my wounded ego found comfort in having since experienced many other Zooms led by experienced, capable professionals where *their* tech didn't work the way they'd planned. (Not that I would wish that embarrassment on anyone else, but it was a relief to know that no matter how smart you are or how well you prepare, the tech can fail you at any time!)

Bottom line? We made it through. And we did so with many successes. As I popped in and out of breakout rooms (the online equivalent of the school principal meandering up and down the hallway, poking in and out of classrooms to see how things are going) I saw most of our students responding positively to their teachers' prompts, engaging in thought-provoking conversations, sharing their enthusiasm and ideas, and developing great Hebrew fluency. And smiling! (Never underestimate the power of a smile on Zoom.)

And now we look towards the future! The leadership of TBZ, Congregation Shir Shalom, and Temple Beth Tzedek are working to make the new Community Religious School a reality come next fall. There are countless logistical and financial elements still in flux, but we all continue to pursue the vision of a combined school that provides all of our students and families a rich and valuable experience. Please watch your emails and this column for Registration and other information — I promise it will be shared with you as soon as it can be!

The Board of Trustees met via Zoom on Tuesday, April 13, 2021. Also present were Jeff Clark, Judy Henn, Irv Levy, Rabbi Sharon Sobel, and Beth Steinberg.

After the Prayer Before a Meeting, various news including a report from Jeff Clark that the roof repair project at Broder is underway. Jeff also provided an update on our buildings and grant opportunities.


Summer Celebration Co-Chair, Ken Polk, updated the Board on plans for the August 2 event.

The membership report provided by Jeff Clark shows that we currently have 704 member households, vs. 748 at the beginning of the fiscal year 7/1/20, representing a drop of 5.9%. Our reduction from 12/31/19 to present is 7.1% and is comparable to many congregations of similar size also impacted by Covid.

Jeff Clark provided an update of the current year finances. It has been a challenging year, but there have been opportunities for savings and also funding through PPP loans. Ken Graber, Board Treasurer, reminded all board members of their fiduciary duty and responsibility to review the financials in depth.

Irv Levy of the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies presented on the Grinspoon Foundation's Life and Legacy Program.

Minutes from the March 9, 2021 meeting were approved. The meeting continued in Executive Session.
