Letter from the Rabbi

In two weeks, we will celebrate Purim (see page 4 for details) and next month we'll celebrate Pesach, our Festival of Freedom (see page 6 Pesach Seder details).

Both of these holidays highlight the plight of the Jewish people when living under tyranny and oppression. With Purim, we did not need to flee from Persia until a very long time after the events of the story itself. However, eventually, the Jews did indeed eventually need to seek refuge from Persia/Iran. We re-enact the story of our exodus from Egypt every year at Pesach at our seder "as if each one of us were personally slaves in Egypt."

We know too well what it means to leave home, to have only the clothes on our backs, to seek a fresh start.

Our communal experiences and our Jewish tradition teach us to do whatever we can to welcome the 450 families from Afghanistan who will need to make a new home for themselves in the Buffalo area. We don't want them to do it on their own.

Last month we announced our partnership with JFS of Western New York to sponsor an Afghan Refugee family and help them to resettle and acclimate.

I am proud to let you know that by the end of February, we reached our initial \$5000 fundraising goal for our TBZ/JFS Afghan Refugee Resettlement Project! This is to sponsor one family. These funds go directly to them (via JFS) to help them with expenses not covered by the social service agencies their first year here. We will be assigned our family sometime in March/April and will reach out for volunteers and a list of needed household goods and supplies shortly.

Thank you to all of you who have donated so generously to date. It is so heartwarming to know how many of you have reached out in support of this important *mitzvah*.

Since the need is so great, and since JFS is now going to be resettling more families than originally anticipated and we were able to raise the initial funds so quickly, we are pleased to let you know that we are officially approved to sponsor a SECOND family. We will now re-settle TWO families: setting them up in apartments, procured by JFS, assisting with education, employment, health care, and adjusting to life in a new country. I am overseeing the initial effort. David Goldberg and miriam treger are the cochairs for the overall project. We will have two different volunteer teams: one for each family. You will be hearing more from David and miriam about what will be

Hamantaschen Recipe

3/3 cup butter or margarine

½ cup sugar

1 egg

1/4 cup orange juice

1 cup white flour

1 cup wheat flour

Suggested fillings: apricot,

cherry, apple, raspberry, prune, poppy seed,

chocolate chips, Nutella.



Blend butter and sugar thoroughly. Add the egg and orange juice and blend thoroughly. Add flour, ½ cup at a time, alternating white flour and wheat, blending thoroughly between each. Refrigerate batter over-night or at least a few hours.

Roll as thin as you can without getting holes in the dough (roll it between two sheets of wax papers lightly dusted with flour for best results). Cut out 3-or-4-inch circles and put a tablespoon of filling in the middle of each circle. Fold up the sides to make a triangle, overlapping the sides as much as possible so only a little filling shows through the middle. Squeeze the corners firmly, so they don't come undone while baking.

Bake at 375 degrees for about 10-15 minutes, until golden brown.

Updated Covid Policy

Temple Beth Zion takes the Jewish value of *pikuach nefesh* (preserving life) seriously. To that end, our Covid Task Force and TBZ Board meets regularly to reassess our Covid protocols in light of the ever-evolving nature of the virus and local conditions. Based on what we now know, we realize that the best way to protect 'life' is multi-fold: vaccinations, masking properly, and physical/social distancing.

New Covid Policy:


- * A mask must be worn correctly over both mouth and nose at all times within our buildings. Strongly recommended masks include KN95, N95, KF94, or a surgical mask "doubled up" with a cloth mask. "Gaiters" and bandanas are not permissible.
- * When we gather in person, those attending TBZ services or events in TBZ's buildings will be required to be fully vaccinated. We define fully vaccinated as having received both of the initial Moderna or Pfizer vaccination shots, or the single Johnson & Johnson vaccination. Boosters are encouraged.
- * For everyone 5 years of age or older, **proof of** vaccination can be in the form of either the original vaccination card, the NYS Excelsior Pass, or the NYS Excelsior Pass Plus. Identification must also be presented for those 18 and older.

Temple Beth Zion's policies may evolve as CDC guidelines, New York State laws, and Erie County Covid rates change. We look forward to the day when this virus will be a distant memory and we gather together as a united community in health and safety.

Cofeld Corner

Some people have an inbuilt collectors' eye. Yet behind this skill, those same individuals read voraciously, have a passion for a particular subject, are able to discern trends, and can spot the right object or image to fill in a gap here and there. Mortimer and Harriet Spiller were just such individuals and also a devoted couple that utilized their enthusiasm and time to collect and curate the Benjamin and Dr. Edgar R. Cofeld Judaic Museum. They also encouraged members and non-members alike, businesses and professionals to contribute their own family materials in order to tell the sweep of Jewish history and Judaic practice locally, across North America and around the world.

Mortimer and Harriet Spiller were members of Temple Beth Zion for more than fifty years and ran an advertising and sales promotion product company. Harriet was born in New York in 1926, and Mortimer (Mort) in Le Roy in 1922. Beginning with a newsstand paperweight company in New York City in the late 1940s, by 1954 the now incorporated Mortimer Spiller Company had expanded into market research alongside manufacturing promotional items and ephemera. Manufacturing and central operations were relocated to Batavia, NY by the 1950s as well, where the Spillers also manufactured products for a broad range of companies. Eventually only the factory would remain in Batavia while their headquarters moved to Eggertsville, NY. Success in business allowed the Spillers to collect American art. In 1976, they donated over 280 objects of art relating to Charles E. Burchfield and Burchfield's daughter, Catherine alongside other well-known WNY artists to the Charles Burchfield Center. Both Harriet and Mort were patrons of the Center from 1966 and had a close association with the Burchfield family. In the art corridor at 805 Delaware Avenue hangs a group of Charles Burchfield drawings donated to the museum in honor of son Harley J. Spiller's bar mitzvah in 1972.

But just as art was an abiding interest, so too was the lived experience of Jews in communities around the world. Here, the Spillers' own identity and the love of collecting came together in their work for the Cofeld Judaic Museum where they oversaw its expansion from the 1980s. The museum grew with the addition of more cases in the 1990s and 2000s, and soon the board room and corridors were part of the museum space. Items were also loaned to other museums for exhibitions including Yeshiva University Museum. In contrast, the 40th Anniversary of Israel's founding in 1988, provided the opportunity for the Cofeld to become a host site when a special exhibition about Mordecai Noah resulted in a loan of the Ararat stone from

the Buffalo History Museum. Indeed the collection grew so large that much of it remains to be catalogued and put on display. The goal of the new redesign is to provide ways to access more of these hidden collections and allow for greater interpretation than was possible in the past.

A key volunteer project for the Museum after the 2022 High Holidays is the organization of the Harriet and Mortimer Clipping Collection. This significant collection of clippings from newspapers and journals will provide us with a particular view of museum collecting, artifact history and Jewish museum display over the course of 30 years. It will also provide us with more information about the selection of pieces that have built the comprehensive museum collection we have today. In this way we can further honor the work of the Spillers and support an appreciation of our museums' many artefacts and the stories of our members. From the Directors

Jewish law is clear: *pikuch nefesh doheh et ha-kol*, "the saving of life outweighs every other principle."

-Rabbi Robert Harris (Professor, The Jewish Theological Seminary)

This principle is far-reaching. According to Rabbi Harris, the Talmud explains that *Pikuach Nefesh* not only applies to the actual moments of saving the life of another, but to a broad expanse of moments when serious circumstances, if allowed to persist, could cause the destruction of everything any decent person holds dear (death being the ultimate loss). You do not need to perform CPR or carry a baby out of a burning house (G-d forbid) to perform the act of saving a life. There are moments we face all the time in which we are required to act so that another's life is not destroyed.

Your CRS Co-Directors have faced a number of these moments. We've carefully followed Erie County's rates of infection and vaccination, especially among kids. We watched what the public schools were doing and honestly evaluated our capabilities to follow their practices. Some of the measures that we observed comfortably in the fall did not feel safe enough given the Omicron variant. Others, like testing-to-stay, simply weren't feasible for us.

We had to make some tough decisions and we knew there was no perfect response that would make everyone happy. We knew that our decision to go remote, at first for two sessions at the end of January and then for another two sessions at the beginning of February, would not please everyone. We knew that if our decision was to be in person for those sessions, it would not have pleased everyone. But we knew we had to follow *Pikuach Nefesh*, as we, with the consent of our leadership team, felt it applied to CRS.

So, we went on Zoom for Tu B'Shevat. Students in younger grades listened to the story of "Honi the Circlemaker", identified the fruits of Israel, and sang "It is a Tree of Life". Students in upper grades also read "Honi the Circlemaker", but drew much bigger teachings from it, helping them to shape their concept of G-d (a higher power, or a friend?). Attendance was good. Teachers and students alike looked so happy to see each other's smiling faces, to

say hello, and to continue the work of their classes. There was an infectious energy, an enthusiasm in every class we visited, and in the Tefilot.

Because our time online on Sunday mornings is shorter than our time in person, we instituted one-on-one Hebrew Tutoring for our first and second graders. All reports so far have been very positive, and we are grateful to our leadership team for approving this unplanned expenditure.

This positive feeling continued through our second CRS Zoom session. One kindergarten student actually logged on from the road! He'd been out of town for the weekend with his parents and attended CRS from his car seat while on the drive back home to Buffalo. Wearing headphones and connecting via iPhone, his Hebrew packet on a lap desk in front of him, he was fully engaged and fully participative.

As of this writing, Omicron rates are, thankfully, going down. The last two weeks of February were never on our calendar (mid-winter break). We expect to be back in person in March and we can't wait! Our CRS Purim Celebration is scheduled for Sunday, March 13. Watch your emails for details — and start planning your costumes!
