Lots of things beginning to happen at TBZ.

In March, we were privileged to receive an extensive security audit by Secure Community Network. SCN is an organization devoted to the safety and security of Jewish organizations across North America. They spent one day at 805 Delaware Avenue and the next day at the Broder Center. We toured with them, taking notes and learning a lot.

Once their full report is completed, we will begin to share with you the details and the needs. Some of the fixes are extremely simple and have already started. Some are much more costly and extensive. We promise to keep you apprised as we begin to get more involved.

The Afghan Re-Settlement program is well underway. We have a three-page list of items that we will be looking to collect to help get our families comfortable and set up for success. Details of where to deliver these items will be coming, but in the meantime, feel free to put them aside for us. Think about moving into a brand-new home. What do you need to get it set up? That is what they will need.

The list is extensive, and we will be setting up two families! Furniture, bedding, hangers, towels, cleaning supplies, cutlery, pots and pans, sponges, blinds, waste baskets, brooms, cutting board, can openers, dishes, glasses, Kleenex, and much much more!

We are excited to be involved in this rewarding endeavor, and there is plenty of room for plenty of volunteers. Keep an eye on this space, the weekly messages, and other communications as all of this gets closer and closer.

We are also starting the planning for our annual Summer Celebration! Our big social event includes lunch, a wine/brewery/distillery tour, golf, and of course, our dinner party and auctions. This is a great way to socialize with our temple family and other members of the community. This event is in its 23rd year, and remains one of our premier events of the year.

Behind the scenes, we are starting to formulate our welcome of Rabbi Brent Gutmann and his family to our Beth Zion family. They have purchased a home here and are hard at work packing up their home in Detroit and getting ready for the move to Western New York.

Letter from the Rabbi

Dear Friends:

I am beginning the process of “winding down” and transitioning the leadership and you, the TBZ community, as well as working with Rabbi Brent Gutmann, your incoming Senior Rabbi, to begin a successful and prosperous journey together.

On January 1, 2021, I shared these goals:

As Interim Senior Rabbi, my three primary areas of focus are:

Congregational Rabbi – I am your rabbi. I will do all those things that a rabbi does: lead Shabbat and holiday worship services, provide pastoral care, teach classes for adults and religious school students, and help represent the synagogue in the community.

Affirmation – One of my main roles will be to LISTEN on multiple levels. First, I will meet with whomever wants to speak with me and listen to your thoughts and feelings about any issue: personal, congregational, and communal. The goal is to enable people to share feelings in a safe and confidential environment, try and resolve issues where possible and figure out a way to move forward in a healthy manner. Second, my role is to help TBZ articulate why your ideals, best practices and traditions are so important.

Visioning/Planning for the Future – Finally, our time together will provide us with the opportunity to reflect, study, strategize and plan for TBZ’s long-term successful future with a settled rabbi. Synagogue growth is a process which should be sensitive and inclusive. We will engage in a thoughtful, strategic process to enable us to accomplish this goal.

As I began my early work with the leadership, I illustrated my goals for our 18 months together - see the blue boxes on this page.

When we look back at our time together, we realize that despite the fact that I began during the height of the global pandemic and worked 100% remotely, we accomplished many of these goals. I provided workshops, training programs, a congregational retreat, *divrei Torah* and other learning opportunities, weekly and monthly writing to address every single issue outlined. We did a lot of work together, despite the pandemic and other on-going issues.

In my remaining time here, I’m working with the leadership, TBZ president David Goldberg, incoming president Ken Polk, and incoming Rabbi Gutmann on the following:

- Staff/leadership relationships: a sacred partnership
- Creating a culture of welcome and trust for new clergy

Intentional listening	Observation of meetings, interactions of staff, email correspondence, relationships between lay leaders and congregants, lay leaders and staff, congregants and clergy and so on. One-on-meetings with congregants and staff
Defining the roles/responsibilities of the Board, Executive Committee and Committees	Learning how we work together: individual styles and preferences
Challenges and Opportunities: Letting Go and Moving Forward	Examining TBZ’s cultural norms
Research into congregational history	Sessions/Workshops with: Board, Committee Chairs, Staff and Congregation on a variety of topics
Defining the Guiding Principles for Standards of Conduct	Reflecting on the History of TBZ and how it impacts who we are Today
Relationship Building	Accountability with decision making and leadership processes

- Transitioning the new clergy
- Other issues around transition

Of course, I am still teaching, writing, leading Shabbat and holiday services, doing pastoral care and all those things that a rabbi does – as well as preparing for my move (more about that next month!).

These past 18 months have been an interesting and sacred journey for all of us. I feel blessed and privileged to have had this opportunity to serve as your rabbi.

I look forward to our final two months together and to welcoming Rabbi Gutmann as TBZ’s next Senior Rabbi.

From the Directors

How did this happen, that we are already at the last month of the inaugural year of the Community Religious School?

At the beginning of this year, I wrote in this column that our mission for the first year of the Community Religious School was to create a *kehillah* (community) of learners and guides where everyone would feel welcome, safe, and comfortable.

To that end, even as COVID hindered many of our plans, we, our faculty, our clergy, and our lay leaders worked to integrate students from three different congregations, to welcome back to religious school students who hadn't attended at all last year, and to welcome in unaffiliated families. We enlisted help from our friends at Peaceful Schools. We greeted families in the parking lot at drop-off and pick-up. A group of interested parents hosted voluntary parent gatherings outside when the weather was nice and at Wegmans when it wasn't. We took students on tours of an unfamiliar building. Most of all, we worked to make sure that all of our students felt secure, valued, and part of our CRS community. I think we did a good job.

I saw *kehillah* when a new student joined the kindergarten class a few weeks into the school year. Another student took her hand and led her into the circle to sing and dance with the rest of the group. They held hands throughout the morning and again the next session!

I saw *kehillah* recently when a student's father, picking up her younger brother who wasn't feeling well, asked if he could pick her up early as well. She obediently gathered up her things and left the building. Five minutes later she was back, having persuaded her father to let her stay!

I saw *kehillah* when three of Rabbi Gutmann's daughters visited us on the day the Matza Factory came to visit. Within minutes, each of the girls was enthusiastically welcomed into the class she will join next year. I couldn't be prouder of our teachers and our students for their kindness. Pictures I took during the morning (shown on the right and on page 8) show the girls and their classmates quite happily engaged in the day's activities.

Back in September I wrote, "The success of this opening year should be measured in smiles. By kids who feel seen, heard, and valued. By kids who make new friends. By kids who feel happy and safe at religious school."

Todah Rabah (Thank you) to everyone who has helped to make that happen!

Remodel Progress

- The roof area over the JFS area has been replaced and is now complete.
- As of Friday, April 1, the four new HVAC units were installed. Final hook-ups being completed.
- The men's cloak room is shaping up quite nicely into the new women's restroom.
- The Fink Auditorium has a roof leak. It appears that roof drainage is part of the problem, in addition to natural aging. The team is working on determining the best way to resolve the issues and resolve.
- Beginning this month, the Barker Street entrance is getting a makeover. The old concrete stairs and ramp will be demolished and replaced. Also, the two wing walls at that entrance will be demolished so that they can be rebuilt and secured properly.
