Letter from the Rabbi

United Against Hate

Our story is woven into the American story. Jewish roots in America stretch back to when Jewish colonists such as Asser Levy arrived in 1654 and won Jews citizenship and the right to serve in defense of the fledgling colony of New Amsterdam. Or, when Polish-born Haym Salomon financed the American Revolution before attending the Continental Congress to give Jewish voice to the Declaration of Independence. Temple Beth Zion itself is 173 years old and a charter member of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, which became the Union for Reform Judaism, today, still the largest movement of Judaism in America. We are as one with America as the words of Emma Lazarus are on the base of the Statue of Liberty. With quiet lips she says:

Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me,
I lift my lamp beside the golden door!

We aspire for this country to be a beautiful, diverse collective—a mixed multitude which extends kindness, equality, and the respect that sees each person as created in the image of God. These ideals are etched into our worldview that we read "you shall love the stranger" "v'ahavta l'reecha kamocha" more than 36 times in Torah. And, as Jewish Americans, we share our yearning for a fair and just society with others.

We, whom God brought out of Egypt, know what it is like to endure the harsh brutality of slavery. We know what it is like to be treated as a stranger—a second-class citizen who is denied the right to participate fully in the prosperity our country has to offer. We have won equal rights in this country through hard-fought battles over ideas, ideals and the law. We have fought hard for them and we must continue to defend them. At every turn, we have sought to steer the soul of our nation towards love and fairness.

As we begin our seventh month together, I reflect on how our vision of America is being threatened—on how violent, uncivil and unequal our society remains. This month we will commemorate the first Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day since the racially motivated mass shooting at the Jefferson Ave. TOPS Market. As Jews, let alone as human beings, we empathize with the enormous pain suffered by our neighbors. This was not the vision Dr. King believed in, and this is not the America we believe in.

Letter from the President

Responsible to Exceptional

Back in July, one of the first things I did as TBZ's president was to coordinate an orientation for the Board of Trustees. Knowing that we had a new rabbi and many new board members, I approached past president and governance committee chair Ken Rogers to assist in putting something together that would not only be important for us as board members to learn and to know, but also something that would be meaningful in its purpose.

As I look back at my first six months, one thing that stuck with me from Ken's training was a concept of moving from a "responsible" board to an "exceptional" one. Ken defined a responsible board as one that can achieve what it has set out to do, has staff with sufficient guidance to do their job well, avoids what is unacceptable to the "owners" of the congregation, and is not negligent. He continued that a responsible board shapes mission and strategic direction, ensures leadership and resources, and monitors and improves performance through policy and decision-making/oversight.

Ken then shared the responsibilities of board members, having worked not only with TBZ but other non-profit organizations around the Buffalo community. This was important information as we created bonds between new board members, but I wanted more. I wanted great. I wanted exceptional. So, what is "exceptional governance?" What does an exceptional board look like?

Ken explained that the key to moving from responsible to exceptional includes taking steps to be thoughtful and engaged leaders. With principles like intentional Board practices, strategic thinking, being mission-centered, having accountability with integrity, continuous learning and being result-oriented, an exceptional Board is one that members value and want to be a part of.

I knew back in July that this was my goal. I'm striving to have an exceptional board. A board that is thoughtful and engaged, with members that are as well. While I am not sure we are there after only six months, I do know that we are making progress every day. Rabbi Gutmann is making inroads in our community and with TBZ congregants. Our board has a seriousness of purpose, and our committees and our staff are doing meaningful work. Exciting things are happening at 805 Delaware and programming in 2023 (for young families to adult education) is being developed. We are on our way to becoming exceptional. I encourage you to join me on our journey.

Coming Full Circle

Temple Beth Zion recently received a National Historic Register bronze plaque which completes a six-year quest. Realizing in 2017 that the Temple Beth Zion Sanctuary and building complex were eligible for a National Historic Register listing, Bob Skerker worked with his close friend and then SUNY Distinguished Professor of Fine Arts, Frank Kowsky, to obtain a listing at a national level. Frank Kowsky is the author of *The Best Planned City in the World: Olmsted, Vaux, and the Buffalo Park System* (2013) as well as editor of the now classic, *Buffalo Architecture: A Guide* (1981) among many other books and articles.

The process of gaining a National Historic Register listing is a major research undertaking which included using the Temple Beth Zion archives at the University at Buffalo as well as other research sources. You can find this report on the Temple Beth Zion website (www.tbz.org/about-tbz/tbz-places-spaces/) along with a photo of the plaque and official certificate. Jennifer Walkowski, the Western NY Region analyst within the Survey and National Register Unit of the Historic Preservation Program under the Parks and Historic Preservation provided guidance and issued the certificate.

Historic plaques are expensive to buy, but a special program created by the William G. Pomeroy Foundation helps fund the purchase of these plaques to organizations who meet their criteria and can demonstrate their organization's historic status. We successfully applied to the Pomeroy National Register Signage Grant Program in July 2022, following the collation of historic materials and the report of Frank Kowsky. Franklin Bronze Plaques manufactured the plaque that will be placed in the lobby of Temple Beth Zion within the sightline of the Sanctuary.

The Museum Committee is in the process of obtaining funds to re-erect the sesquicentennial historical marker in front of the building which was badly damaged by a car in 2019. This plaque was originally unveiled as part of events celebrating Temple Beth Zion's 150th anniversary in 2000 through by the work of Cofeld Museum curators, Mortimer and Harriet Spiller, and with the support of the Buffalo History Museum and the Karnofsky family.

Our deep appreciation to all of those, past and present, who have supported the recognition of Temple Beth Zion as both an architectural and spiritual gem in Buffalo. As you browse this issue of the Bulletin, please note the number and variety of programs starting in January, all of which further our mission to provide you with lifelong learning opportunities. I hope you will discover something interesting and meaningful to you. (And if nothing we're doing so far excites you? I invite you to let me know what you would like to see!)

For those with young children or grandchildren, we are introducing "Mazel Tots". One Sunday morning each month, Jill and Rabbi Brent Gutmann will lead an hour of stories, crafts, music, fun, and friends for pre-K kids and a grown-up.

For our teens, we are offering two very special programs. L'Taken is a social justice weekend presented by the RAC (Religious Action Center of the Reform movement). Rabbi Gutmann and I will chaperone a group of teens traveling to Washington DC in late February. At L'Taken, along with other Reform Jewish teens from all across the country, our group will explore current public policy issues and learn how Jewish values guide our responses to them. The weekend includes preparing to deliver remarks on a topic of their choice to our representatives on Capitol Hill. L'Taken is known for significantly impacting Reform Jewish teens and providing them with skills that will serve them well into their futures.

The second offering for teens is Confirmation, a uniquely Reform ceremony with a long and revered history at TBZ. Following five monthly classes devoted to exploring significant issues such as Gender & Diversity, Theology, Antisemitism, Religions of the World, and Reform Judaism, our confirmands will individually and collectively affirm their commitment to the people of Judaism during services on Friday, May 26, 2023. Confirmation 2023 is open to TBZ'ers in 10th – 12th grade who haven't yet been confirmed.

Lunch 'n Learn returns to TBZ in January with "Jews in the News". Bring your lunch and join the conversation! No fees – no reservations.

We are delighted to offer Jill Gutmann's "Jewish Medical Ethics" class once a month on Thursday mornings. Jill, a bioethicist, will lead discussions on contemporary medical issues through engaging discussions while looking at science, politics, Jewish commentary, and other relevant sources. This informative and entertaining class will make you think and leave you wishing the discussion could continue long after the class has ended.

Have you ever thought about the value of having a Jewish community or what it means to be a part of a Jewish

community? Have you ever wondered about the importance of Jewish statehood in your own life? Do you think Israel is living up to the highest standard of Jewish values, morality, and democracy? If any of these questions resonate with you, consider enrolling in iEngage: Together and Apart, which Rabbi Gutmann will begin leading in January. The iEngage program seeks to establish a new narrative about the significance of Israel and Zionism to Jews in North America and across the globe, based not on crisis response, but on Jewish values and ideas. This very intriguing class is scheduled once a month on Thursday evenings, and could very well be the beginning of several years of study employing course content from the Shalom Hartman Institute's iEngage Video Lecture Series.

No dates have yet been set, but we are also delightfully anticipating Rabbi Gutmann's first Adult B'nei Mitzvah cohort at TBZ. Open to Jewish men and women who have not celebrated a Bat or Bar Mitzvah, the group will explore Hebrew, Torah, liturgy, and ritual as they plan to celebrate this very meaningful lifecycle event together.

As Rabbi Emily Langowitz, Jewish Engagement and Learning Manager at the Union for Reform Judaism, wrote recently, "One of the most empowering things about pursuing Jewish education as an adult is finding Jewish language for the topics you are already knowledgeable or passionate about... Finding ways to bring [their] lives to bear on Judaism, and integrate Judaism into their lives, is an incredibly meaningful process."

Let us help you find the avenue for Jewish discovery that means the most to you!

There was a beautiful Havdalah at TBZ for students in grades Pre-K to 2nd grade, led by Rabbi Gutmann. The Madrichim (Grades 8 -12) gathered for an ice-cream social on a Sunday afternoon and had an opportunity to share how they see and express their own Jewish identity. In December, six students in our Better 2 Learn Program traveled to Brandeis (all-expense paid) and participated with teens from around the country in a 4-day intensive study.





At the very top of Mt. Masada where a group of Jews fled to avoid persecution from the Romans.




We met with a representative of Ethiopian Jews who made aliya with her family and shared her story and her culture, then dressed us in traditional Ethiopian attire.
