Delaware Building Parking Lot

Construction is set to begin in our Delaware building parking lot at the end of June, beginning with the JFS side of the lot along Barker Street. Much of the usual lot will remain available. After roughly 2 weeks, the JFS part of the lot will reopen and the Linwood side will close for 2 weeks.

We will also be replacing the stairs to our entrance from the Linwood/Barker lot. As needed, members will be able to park in the spaces alongside the Chapel and in the JCC lot.



Letter from the Rabbi

The Book of Numbers, also known by its Hebrew name, *Bamidbar* literally meaning "In the Wilderness," contains what may be the most significant biblical narrative on the topic of group formation. Describing the mishaps, ordeals, and triumphs of the Israelites, this book forms a thirty-nine year long bridge between the Mosaic revelation that was received on Mount Sinai and the conquest of the promised land of Canaan. Moreover, the wilderness is a necessary moment of liminal transformation as our ancestors transition mentally from slavery to freedom.

The transformation the Israelites experienced took decades and was full of challenges. Along the way they confronted obstacles such as intimidating enemies, thirst, biting snakes and more. Moreover, God revealed to Moses that most of the Israelites were not even meant to make it through the wilderness, and those who emerged to lead the next generation into the promised land—Joshua and Caleb—merited this position on their faith in the capacity of the Israelites to overcome tremendous odds.

This month marks one full year since I began serving as the Senior Rabbi of Temple Beth Zion. We have been through and continue to experience tremendous changes. We have affirmed the vitality of our congregation as we continue to chart our way through the wilderness. At the end of a year, our board leadership remains strong, our members are engaged, we have rededicated the Cofeld Judaic Museum and you threw a killer Installation party for me, but we have not yet reached the promised land.

Major goals remain. Work will continue over the summer at 805 Delaware Avenue repairing the parking lot and skylights, replacing the furnace and climate control systems (which are on their last legs), and making many other physical improvements. Furthermore, our Personnel Committee continues the search for our next Executive Director and begins the search for an additional Cantor or Rabbi to join us in July 2024. Achieving these goals is possible only because of your continued support.

I am so grateful for your gracious care for my family and my own personal wellbeing in this pivotal time. As part of my annual summer leave, I will be participating in my fifth Rabbinic Torah Seminar in Jerusalem in early July at the Shalom Hartman Institute. Judy Henn will be on call for congregational and community pastoral needs while I am gone and I look forward to returning reinvigorated and freshly inspired to continue our journey together.

Cofeld Corner

In the early 1960s, the Warner family commissioned a new piece of music by Darius Milhaud to premiere in April 1967 at the opening of the new sanctuary at 805 Delaware Avenue. This month we feature an article by Museum Research Assistant, Noah Kotzin. He is a former PALS participant and became bar mitzvah at TBZ in 2016. He is a junior at Bard College, majoring in Film Studies and Music Composition.

Darius Milhaud and the Cantata from Job by Noah Kotzin

Darius Milhaud (1892-1974) was one of the 20th century's most prolific composers. With hundreds of compositions to his name, Milhaud was also eclectic and an important link in the neoclassical style that came to dominate mid-20th century classical music. As important as Milhaud was to French music, however, he made a significant impression on music in America after moving to the United States as a Jewish refugee in 1947.

In France, Milhaud grew up in Aix-en-Provence, learning violin, then completed his studies at the Paris Conservatoire. But it was in Brazil and England, that Milhaud found his artistic voice incorporating Brazilian folk music and jazz into his own classicism. Milhaud's interest in expanding the bounds of classical music brought him into the circle of *Les Six*, a group of French composers all of whom were interested in polytonality. As the only Jewish member of the group, Milhaud and his family were forced to flee France in 1940, just as his opera, *Medee*, was being staged. Making a home for himself at Mills College in America, he taught students that included Steve Reich, William Bolcom, and jazz pianist Dave Brubeck.

In America, Milhaud also began to embrace his Jewish roots, writing a number of works on Jewish themes. The *Cantata from Job* (1965) was commissioned by Temple Beth Zion and is scored for baritone solo, chorus, and organ. Despite Milhaud's interest in simplicity, his works often displayed a baffling complexity rivaled only by Schoenberg, leading one critic to remark "there is simply so much (sometimes too much) going on at the same time." The *Cantata from Job* is replete with polytonality and divided into two movements. At the premiere, Lawrence Bogue sang the baritone solo in Hebrew, while the chorus sang in English. Hans Vigeland of Westminster Presbyterian Church was the organist. The composition was dedicated to Nellie B. Warner and Eugene Warner. Confirmation

During Erev Shabbat services on a beautiful Shavuot evening in late May, three Temple Beth Zion teens participated in the ceremony of Confirmation. An invention of the Reform movement in the late-1800s, Confirmation is significantly different from B'nai Mitzvah. As high school students, confirmands are more mature, and have had more life experience, than 13-year-olds. Following several months of exploring Jewish traditions and texts with Rabbi Gutmann, as well as learning about the development of Reform practice and theology, these students were ready to come face-to-face with their own beliefs to make a statement of commitment to Judaism, to living Jewish lives, and to the Jewish community. And they did so not as individuals, but as part of a class, a *k'hilah*, a sacred community.

Wearing white robes and carrying flowers, our three confirmands were each escorted into the sanctuary by an adult of their own choosing – someone who has been significant in the confirmand's life as well as in the life of the congregation. All three participated in leading parts of the service and each shared their own thoughts about the meaning of being Jewish and of their relationship to TBZ.

Avery Field, daughter of Jenn Field and Adam Field, spoke of her life-long connection to the spiritual community at TBZ and what a blessing it is to her. She is especially appreciative of the music she hears and sings at temple, as it has comforted her during difficult times and helped her celebrate during joyous times.

Theo Bellavia-Frank, son of Gina Bellavia and Eric Frank, shared his appreciation of the "Reform Jewish encouragement to follow doctrine only after careful examination, assessment, and reconciliation with one's personal values..." Theo loves Judaism because of its teachings of ethics, of justice, of fairness, and of the concept of *b'tzelem Elohim* – that we are all created in the divine image of Adonai.

Lillian Weinmann, daughter of Amélida and Peter Weinmann, talked of her deep sense of belonging to the Jewish community in Buffalo and at TBZ, and how the traditions, culture, and lessons of Judaism have shaped her into who she is today. Celebrating holidays with friends and family, attending religious school, performing acts of *tzedakah* and *tikkun olam*, gathering with her peers at summer camp and through NFTY, all of it has helped to form her strong identity... her strong Jewish identity.

The future of Judaism lies in the hands of thoughtful, caring, energetic young people like these three. We should all be proud and celebrate their Confirmation!

Observations on Rabbi Brent Gutmann's Installation

The gleaming temple soul and the Hebrew prayers that enveloped it, the joyful and attentive and appreciative congregants filling the synagogue, the glitz and glamour of Saturday evening's festivities, and the heartfelt meaningful and gracious comments from visitors afar: all the result of, all coming together for the installation of Rabbi Brent Gutmann, the 11th Senior Rabbi of Temple Beth Zion. But celebrations fade, days become memories, and toasts vanish with the wind. We are left with our newly installed rabbi – and how fortunate we are to have his legacy begin.

The installation began with a mix of the solemn, soulful, and splendiferous Friday evening services. Memories of past moments in those pews danced about in so many minds – of previous rabbis, meaningful sermons, Sabbath beginnings, Hebrew prayers and chants, relatives and friends no longer about. The Ben Shahn stained glass and imposing twin pillars of the Commandments added reverence and delight and Jewish history and selfreflection. Suddenly, all were gently placed on a shelf as our new rabbi spoke. He offered confidence without hubris, intensity without confusion, insights without braggadocio, humor without giddiness. His stature as Senior Rabbi grew that eve, a wonderful beginning.

And finally came Saturday, an upscale dinner event with white tablecloths, servers at the ready, wine and more wine, and excellent food. Rabbi Gutmann began with a short Havdalah service, marking the end of the Sabbath. And then, as if a fireworks of happy had exploded, all were suddenly laughing, discussing, reminiscing, conjecturing with one another: family members, congregants we knew, and congregants new to us. This was all about joy, all about a new genesis. More than a celebration, we bonded on the dance floor that night. Pure celebration could be seen, could be felt, could be inhaled in each nook and cranny, on every face, with every breath. Evenings always end, but with this one went souvenir memories for each of an exuberant, dedicated, and meaningful rabbi.

Can there be such a thing as a perfect beginning and a perfect ending? The two days sounded a horn of plenty with no "This should have been done," "That was way off," or "No, no – that's not right!" To the congregants and visitors and service leaders many kudos for the right tone Friday eve, and a tip of the yarmulke goes to Joni Shatkin and Jenn Field for the without-a-glitch Saturday eve. These were perfect bookends for the beginning epic tale of Rabbi Brent Gutmann. It is now his temple, we are now his flock – and both look forward to a Temple Beth Zion that fortifies and grows its Jewish heritage, to go boldly into the future.
