Letter from the President

Thoughts on Being Jewish

As we all begin to celebrate a new year, our community gathers with warmth and reflection. Whether at TBZ or at home, many of us are able to make ourselves take time to look back and look ahead in a meaningful and Jewish way. This wonderful part of being Jewish, the reflection of ourselves and our actions, is meant to propel us forward and make us better humans. We identify where we missed the mark, where we failed to be the best that we can be, AND we reach out to make amends and make ourselves ... more us. Part of our practice is to celebrate our success and kvel in others' achievements as well, and this is the really cool part.

It is easy to be happy for family and friends, easy to gather (of course eat) to recount and share a personal accomplishment, a newly trained puppy and child's first ... well first anything is exciting. It is this mix of external and internal feeling that makes us whole as we approach with humility, understanding and compassion. YES – It is amazing to celebrate yourself. We all have varied home-based structures and living situations, and in today's world it seems that we are wondering what people think of us, are we being judged? Are we judging others? How is it that we have this amazing commonality of Judaism and, from the Reform perspective, can take as little or as much as we choose, begin to label ourselves as cultural Jews, observant Jews, spiritual Jews, agnostic Jews, etc.? We let labeling get in the way of our engagement with others in our daily world.

Growing up, it was clear that being Jewish meant something different. My household was one of human values every day. I believe that in the first four months of having the honor of serving as President I have heard so many stories and histories of the very same mantra: "human values." So many of us who raise families, teach and learn, and interact in the workplace are known as Jewish. Is it the same for other religions? I asked myself, "Why?" My answer starts to unfold with a simple idea. Being Jewish isn't a Shabbat and holiday event, it is how I make my decisions each and every day. Do I choose to stand up for what I believe in or do I sit silently? Is it worth the aggravation of engaging with negative feelings and behavior, and to what end? Will I hurt anyone through my words or actions? Now I'm not advocating that other religions do not have these values, but I can only speak of mine.

As we gather on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur in synagogue and see our pals from pre-school and Religious School and the community at large, we catch up and chat about our lives and wish each other a sweet and healthy new year. Let's try to help each other throughout the year to do exactly that – have a sweet and healthy year. Think about the holidays that follow: the harvest festival of Sukkot and the Torah cycle, Simchat Torah. (Have you been a part of history and held the Torah as it is unrolled in our amazing Sanctuary? Yes – we do that!)

I leave you with this wish: May this year move toward healing of the world through each of our thoughts and actions.

Letter from the Cantor

Ladino Shabbat

This past July, I represented Western New York and Temple Beth Zion on a special Mission to Spain that included over 70 cantors and 300 Jews from across the world. In keeping with the spirit of our last mission to Germany in 2012, our goal was to reconnect and revisit the cities that at one time boasted a prosperous Jewish population and to witness the new centers of Jewish culture.

In just under two weeks we covered Barcelona, Girona, Cordoba, Grenada, Madrid and Seville. We were able to see the remains of these once-flourishing Jewish communities that were present over 1,000 years before the Inquisition in 1492. In the larger cities of Barcelona and Madrid, we connected with the Jewish communities there as we walked the roads of their relatives and gave concerts in synagogues and theaters that were, at one time, prohibited for our use.

On **Friday, October 21**, please join us for a special Ladino Shabbat, which will incorporate the sounds of our Sephardic history as well as a reflection of the Mission to Spain. As always we will have a happy half hour (with Sangria) at 5:30 with **Ladino Shabbat at 6 p.m.**

Security

Special Blessing for Spouses, Parents Who Happen Not to Be Jewish

We will recognize the extraordinary efforts non-Jews at TBZ make in order to create Jewish families and raise Jewish children by offering a special blessing during the main Yom Kippur morning service. If you are one of these wonderful people, we hope that you will plan to attend so that we can call you up to the bimah to honor and bless you before the Congregation. The morning service will begin at 11:30 on Wednesday, October 12, in the Sanctuary.

Parking

Please respect the need to reserve parking in the Temple parking lot for those congregants who are 70 and older or who have handicap permits.

You may drop off passengers at the Delaware entrance or at the parking lot steps for all services. Please enter the lot from Barker Street and exit onto Linwood or Delaware.

On-street parking will be available during all services on both sides of Delaware Avenue and Linwood Avenue between Bryant and Summer streets as well as both sides of Bryant, Barker and Summer streets.

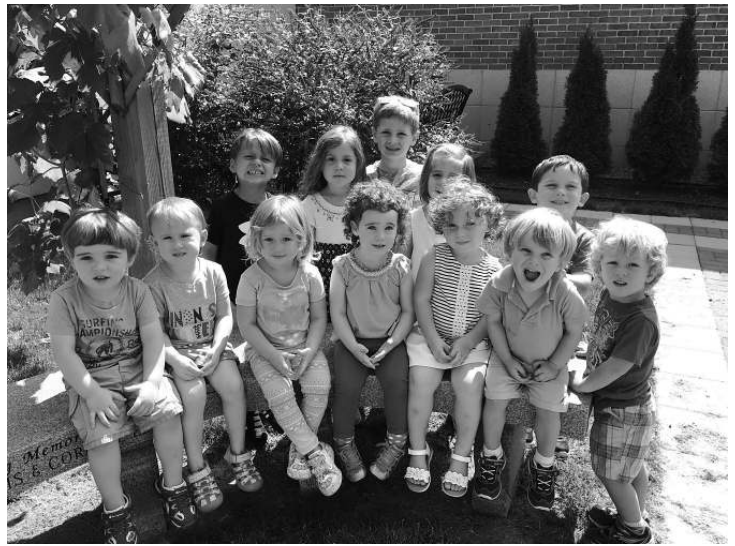
Yom Kippur Food Drive

Bags will be collected from 8:30 a.m. to noon, and TBaZY volunteers will be at each entrance to accept your food donation. Food brought after noon will go to the Food Pantry also.

Please be sure to check expiration dates, as we are required to dispose of items that are past the date. We will take anything we can get, but we have a need for these items in particular: Peanut butter, jelly/jam *, soup *, rice, brownie mix, stuffing mix, instant potatoes & gravy, matzo, canned yams, vegetable oil, beets/borscht, beans, pasta & pasta sauce, canned tuna, salmon or sardines, canned fruit (peaches & pears), new toiletries (deodorant, soap, toothpaste), toilet paper & paper towels. * Items always in high demand

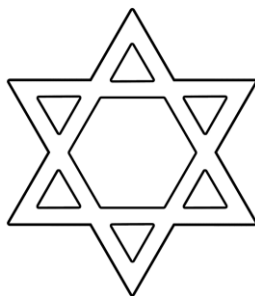
