## Letter from the Rabbi

I know that it is December, but I would actually like to bring our minds back to July. In July, my little garden was in the height of its bloom. My favorite flower, the daylily, a flower whose blossoms last only one day, was at its height. The days were warm and bright. And those daylilies were filling me with excited expectation. Each flower only opening for 24 hours or less, and I waited with bated breath to see each one shine, knowing that I would only get a brief chance to see each blossom.

As some may know, daylilies really only bloom during July and the first part of August. This year, a daylily that I bred myself bloomed for the very first time. But strangely enough, it did so very, very late - in the last weeks of October. I was completely shocked. Nonetheless, cold weather ebbed and flowed, buds developed and matured, and one day the most beautiful lavender and wine color flower began to open - it was stunning!

I went to bed that night with a smile on my face - so happy to see a beautiful blossom from my favorite kind of plant at a time when I thought it was impossible. I woke up, got myself ready for the day, left the house, and saw that the flower was still blooming without a single blemish in sight. Suddenly this incredibly unlikely blossom became a full-on miracle!

I awoke the next morning and found that the miracle daylily was still going strong! A three-daylily, a miracle indeed. (Perhaps the best part, is that this miraculous little flower kept producing buds and blooms throughout November.)

An unlikely piece of beauty and light, meant only to last one day, and instead lasted day after day after day. Sound a little familiar? If it does, then you and I might be thinking the same thing - Chanukah, a holiday whose origin story draws us toward the unlikely victory of the Maccabees, who then took only one day's worth of oil for the Temple's menorah, and it miraculously lasted seven long days. My garden experience made me think of this very holiday, and similarly, growing closer to Chanukah has invited me to return to thinking back to my garden.

Life never ceases to amaze. The wonders of tradition intersect with our lives. The points of access that life offers us bring Judaism to the forefront of our minds and deepens our connections to it. So many small (and maybe even larger) miracles that we encounter as we move through each of our days - we each have a multitude of opportunities to see and live our Jewish identities, letting them breathe and deepen and enrich our lives.

In this season of light, these very points of access seem to multiply. Chanukah is one of those times of the year when an entire world of connective metaphor enters our lives: a season of celebrating warmth and light when winter's chill has set in; a time of giving and family; a time when we invite nearness and celebration - all thanks to a miracle of oil and light surprisingly lasting day after day after day. May this wonderful season of light bring us all the most delightful encounters with the miracles that surround us. May we be enriched by them. May our minds drift back to all the wonder that our pasts hold. And may it all warm and enlighten our hearts! Keyn y'hi ratzon, may this be God's will.

### Consecration 2016/5777

## B'nai Mitzvah Projects

Becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah is an important milestone in a young person's Jewish education. But – what does it actually mean to "become" a Bar/Bat Mitzvah? That is the question all of our students are asked as they begin their formal B'nai Mitzvah preparations.

To help them understand the additional responsibilities that are expected of them as they become young Jewish adults, they are each asked to take on a special Mitzvah project. We try to help them create a project by remembering A-E-I-O-U\*:

**Active** – Take an active role in making the project happen i.e. contacting a local organization, collecting items in their school or neighborhood to be donated.

**Engaging** – The project should be one that you choose to be involved with, that includes your interests, hobbies and values.

**Influential** – Can you make a difference in people's lives through your project? Can you get others to help you?

Ongoing – The project should take place over a period of months and, hopefully, will continue past your Bar/Bat Mitzvah!

**Unique** – Be creative and design a project that hasn't been done before; make this YOUR project!

Through creating and putting into practice a project that is meaningful to them, we believe that our students will develop the habit of doing mitzvot throughout their lifetime.




