

Letter from the Cantor

Do the Wave!

We have just finished our High Holy Day marathon... but wait, there's more!

A mere five days after Yom Kippur, we observe the seven day festival of Sukkot. I love this holiday for many reasons.

The first and foremost is that the festival of Sukkot is a Jewish holiday that is mostly experiential, as opposed to solely reciting prayers. The Torah tells us to construct booths (sukkahs, "sukkot" in Hebrew), and we are urged to break away from the creature comforts of our homes to dwell in our temporary shelters. Now let's face it, this is Buffalo...in October. OY! Well, G-d doesn't want us to be miserable in our sukkahs, so we make do with our tolerance of the elements and then we go back to the safety (and warmth) of our homes.

Second, we are commanded to invite guests into our sukkahs (hachnasat orchim). This mitzvah is one of the most important that we can fulfill, and it gives my whole family such joy to host Erev Sukkot for our Temple Beth Zion family.

Third is the waving of the lulav and etrog, the three fragrant branches of myrtle, willow and palm, and the citron, a large a lovely citrus fruit. If you've never seen these, you must come to the Temple to check them out. They are a feast for not only the eyes but for the nose. Many folks, myself included, have used etrogs in baking after Sukkot is over. There are even folks who make jams, jellies and schnapps!

Once again, we hope you will join Bennett, Hunter, Saul, Corrinne and myself along with our awesome TBZ rabbis and celebrate Sukkot with us.

As a congregational family, we look for ways to let our members reach out to each other in meaningful ways. If you would like our clergy to read the name of a family member in need of healing, please call Jennelle Torrey at 836-6565, Ext.132, with the name by Thursday at 5 p.m.

In order to respect people's privacy, we will only accept names from members of the immediate family. To make sure the list is current, and we are not reading the names of those who have healed, you will need to call the name in every week.

For members of our TBZ family who, unfortunately, find themselves in the hospital, please let us know so our clergy may visit you. Each week, our Temple office contacts local hospitals for the names of TBZ members who have been admitted. However, HIPPA Privacy Rules often prevent the hospital from sharing that information with us. If you or a loved one is admitted to a local hospital, please contact Jennelle at 836-6565, Ext. 132, to let us know.



Thursday Afternoon Service at Broder (5:30 p.m.) is an informal worship experience led by our own congregants. The Broder Center Auditorium is the location for this wonderful opportunity to worship, meet new people and reconnect with your TBZ friends.

PALS-Kadimah

Parents choose preschools for many reasons. Some Jewish families choose to send their children to religion-based preschools when the traditions, culture and faith hold personal meaning to them. Others may choose a Jewish preschool to help "fill in" some gaps, while another family may choose a Jewish preschool, because of its reputation in the community. In the PALS-Kadimah classroom, we honor all families and all backgrounds through an engaging curriculum that seamlessly blends the Judaic with the secular.

We embrace our traditions, faith and culture from the moment we enter the classroom until the moment we go home. One of the first activities we do in the morning is greet one another with a boker tov (good morning) and sit on a ritzpah (rug). We also sing the Shema, Modeh Ani and Penny in the Pushka. Our children start their day with music, language learning, faith and tradition.

The High Holy Days (Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur and Sukkot) are one of our favorite times of the year in the PALS-Kadimah classroom, as they are rich with opportunity for engrossing ourselves in tradition and showing the interconnectedness of Judaism with daily life. When we learn about the sweetness and joy of starting the new year, we also learn about apples and learn how to count, classify and observe qualities of apples based on color, shape and taste. We invite a beekeeper to our school to teach us about bees and honey production. For Yom Kippur, while learning about forgiveness, we also write our own stories (early literacy) about blessings and learning how to say "I'm sorry." Finally, during Sukkot, we read stories about our ancient ancestors, we learn about the harvest and practice sequencing the growth of plants. We build our own sukkah (architecture, physics and creativity).

At PALS-Kadimah we also learn and practice our core Jewish values (human values) like taking care of the sick. When a classmate is sick we call the child, make cards and gifts wishing him/her well. We model and practice positive language and practice conflict mediation. We teach generosity while caring for our tzedakah garden and donating our Shabbat tzedakah to other agencies around the world.

Children build a foundation in their early years of who they are, how they are going to learn and where they fit into this world. At PALS-Kadimah we are proud and honored to provide routine, ritual and the necessary building blocks to that precious foundation.

The Buffalo Jazz Collective - Dr. John Bacon, George Caldwell, Jim Colemon, Mark Filsinger, John Hasselback Jr. and Bobby Millitello - opened the Jazz at TBZ Jewish American Songbook series on September 7 with music of Buffalo native Harold Arlen. The virtuoso sextet presented a range of Arlen compositions, including such favorites as "It's Only a Paper Moon," Stormy Weather and "Get Happy," many in original arrangements. A "Wizard of Oz" tribute included an achingly beautiful rendition of "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" by Millitello on flute and Caldwell at the keyboard. The full ensemble concluded with a delightful and upbeat interpretation of "If I Only Had a Brain."

The Jazz at TBZ Jewish American Songbook series is the brainchild of TBZ's new Assistant Music Director, Jacob Jay, a product of TBZ's Religious School and Buffalo State College's Music Department. Jacob created the series to bring together people from Buffalo's different communities, introducing many in the community to Temple Beth Zion and the rich legacy of Jewish American composers. The series also provides an opportunity for the TBZ community to experience the Jewish American contribution to the American Songbook via a jazz interpretation. The kickoff concert brilliantly realized his vision. Despite late publicity, more than 60 TBZ and community members enjoyed an evening of first-class jazz and mingled afterwards for a light reception.

Richard Rodgers was an American composer of music for more than 900 songs was born into a prosperous German Jewish family in Arverne, Queens, New York City. He is best known for his songwriting partnerships with the lyricists Lorenz Hart and Oscar Hammerstein II. Rodgers was the first person to win what are considered the top show business awards in television, recording, movies and Broadway—an Emmy, a Grammy, an Oscar, and a Tony.

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
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
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
