Letter from the Rabbi

Do, Think, Feel, and Inspire

Four words – doing, feeling, thinking, and inspiring – these are the models by which we seek and establish good for ourselves and the world.

Temple Beth Zion offers us many opportunities to do all of these in the coming months.

Our Social Justice Team, as well as members of the Congregation Chavurah Social Action Committee, met in the beginning of November with Russ Agdern, the Senior Organizer for RAC-NY (the Religious Action Center for the State of New York) to evaluate how we might make New York more compassionate and just by exerting some influence on the next legislative session. We looked at improving our schools, seeking justice for immigrants, setting limits on solitary confinement, working on reforming parole, and opportunities to improve health care for New Yorkers.

We will reconvene with Jewish activists in our region, including Rochester, Syracuse, and Binghamton, in mid-December to help decide on which of these issues we will work on for 2020 – stay tuned. Our big event will be Monday, March 16, when we travel to Albany and lobby our legislature – everyone is invited. Please let me know if there are other issues that you feel our Jewish values should be motivating us to act on.

The Racial Equity Roundtable will hold its Annual Day of Racial Healing on Wednesday, January 15, at 7 p.m., at Elim Christian Fellowship. Richard Rothstein, the author of a most important book, *The Color of Law*, concerning the legal aspects of racial segregation will be speaking and giving us much in the way of intellectual and emotional fuel for actions to come.

Inspiration comes from many sources, and I hope that you will join me as we gather for the first of our spirituality events of 2020, on Tuesday, January 7, in the library at 805 Delaware Avenue. Our topic will be "The Future and the Zohar." (See details on page 4).

Good actions, emotions, thoughts, and spiritualities are developed interdependently to provide greater individual and communal wholeness. Let's embark on these journeys together.

Engagement Committee News

When I joined Temple Beth Zion seventeen years ago it was pretty much a non-event. Sure, I signed membership forms and agreed to pay dues. I signed my son up for Religious School and I agreed to pay tuition. We attended services for Shabbat and holidays...and my tiny family sat together, but alone. We were, of course welcome to be there, but we were never formally welcomed. Temple Beth Zion was our spiritual home...but it never quite felt like a home. We were not a legacy family, and we were not big donors... so we were never really made to feel important. When I was asked to serve on the Board of Trustees, I agreed to do so only if I could make it my mission to never allow another individual or family feel like we often felt. I have formed and chaired our Engagement Committee with the goal of helping our members to feel welcome and included.

As Jews, being welcoming is and always has been an integral part of who we are. Welcoming the stranger is one of Judaism's most time honored virtues. Our tradition supports, in fact commands us, to be welcoming, warm, open, and inclusive people. Our literature is filled with references to these values and the people who displayed them. The commandment to be hospitable appears in the Torah 36 times, more than any other commandment. And, welcoming guests is one of the few *mitzvot* described in the Talmud for which we receive blessing both in this world and in the world to come.

Monthly engagement events are planned to connect members of our Temple Beth Zion family, new and not-sonew, through meals and other events. We have had bagel brunches, Shabbat dinners, Havdallah services, an Erev Yom Kippur pasta dinner, and lunch in the Sukkah. While these events are fun to attend, I hope that their greater purpose of connecting people and enabling us all to feel welcome and wanted comes through as their true mission. I hope many of you will join me on Friday, December 6th at our Delaware building for our New Member Shabbat Service to welcome our newest members. And, while you are there say "hello" to those who you may have seen for years, but never had a conversation with. Sit with someone who may be sitting alone. See if someone needs a ride to an event, perhaps to our upcoming Hanukkah Havdallah. Our community is looking for connection. And, connection will continue through monthly events. But let's not wait for these events to form connections. Let's focus on making connections with members new and not-so-new our priority.

From the Director

Chanukah is still a few weeks away, so there is time to plan for some special activities and celebrations (besides the ones that you will be attending at Temple Beth Zion!). Not all of it has to involve shopping and wrapping presents.

When my children were little, we would designate different nights of Chanukah in different ways. Two nights were "sponsored" by their two different sets of grandparents. One night would be a Book Night -- a great time to give the kids books I'd bought earlier at a book fair and had hidden on a closet shelf too high for them to see. Another night would be Pajama Night - making gifts out of items I would have had to buy for them anyway. And one night would be Tzedakah Night - a night for us to make donations to charities that were important to them.

I love the ideas suggested by our friends at PJ Library for how to celebrate eight nights of Chanukah – and NONE of them are presents. I've adapted them a bit. I hope you find some ideas that will enhance your family's Chanukah celebration!

First Night, *Decoration Night*: Beautify your home, inside and out, with store-bought or home-made decorations in blue, white, and silver. Make em glittery and sparkly!

Second Night, *Memory Book Night*: Start a Family Chanukah Scrapbook. Take photos, draw pictures, add quotes from every member of the family to commemorate Chanukah 2019. Bring it out again next year to reminisce and add to it!

Third Night, *Family Tree Night*: Tell family stories. Encourage your kids to ask questions about their relatives. Draw the tree and the branches and list everyone's names and where they came from.

Fourth Night, *Look at Lights Night*: Get out of the house! If the night is clear, look up at the stars. If not, take a drive in the car. Notice all the lights on houses, businesses, streetlights, and signs.

Fifth Night, Song and Dance Night: Who in your family plays an instrument? Can they play Chanukah music? Everybody sing along. Or hunt up some Chanukah music online. There is SO much you can find...children's music, Yiddish music, Israeli music, Chanukah parodies, and more.

Sixth Night, *Latke Night*: It's what you've all been waiting for... LATKES! Go traditional or go with some new varieties: sweet potato latkes, green latkes, cheese latkes, waffle iron latkes, mini latkes, butternut squash latkes, pasta latkes, Mexican chocolate latkes, cinnamon apple latkes... I even found a recipe online for s'mores latkes!

Seventh Night, *Gratitude Night*: What are you grateful for? Your family, your friends, your favorite foods, your favorite books... the list could go on forever. Use colorful markers and index cards to write and draw what you are most thankful for – put them up and make a Gratitude Wall.

And maybe, dedicate this seventh night to doing things for others. Donate canned or boxed foods to Food Gnomes or the Town Square Food Pantry. Read a Chanukah story to a younger sibling or a pet. Make a pot of soup or a casserole and deliver it to a friend or neighbor who may not be feeling well. Make thank you cards for the police officers or firefighters who help to protect your neighborhood.

Eighth Night, *Cookie Night*: Break out those Jewish Star cookie cutters and get everyone in the house together for a cookie baking and decorating party.

I hope something on this list has piqued your interest. Think about adding something different to your family traditions, and maybe create some meaningful new traditions! *Chag Uri Sameach*/Happy Festival of Lights!


The Award will be presented during the Annual Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration program on Sunday, January 19 at 6 p.m., in Kleinhans Music Hall.


The community is welcome and invited to attend the program. This year's theme is "A Journey Traveled by Many, A Dream Living In All."

Cantor Barbara Ostfeld To Receive URJ Highest Award

Cantor Barbara Ostfeld will be among a select few to receive Reform Judaism's highest honors at the 75th URJ Biennial in Chicago.





Cantor Ostfeld will receive the Debbie Friedman Award for Contributions to Jewish Music. What was it like for her to become, at age 22, the first woman ordained as a cantor? Now that Cantor Ostfeld is 66, the Reform cantorate is 336 women strong! Cantor Ostfeld served for 27 years as a cantor in congregations in Clifton, New Jersey, Great Neck, Rochester, and Buffalo, and then for 10 years as the placement director of the American Conference of Cantors. She is the author of *Catbird: The Ballad of Barbi Prim*.



Chanukah Blessings

Candles are added to the hanukkiyah (menorah) from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first and then the Shabbat candles.

Light the shamash (the helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Chanukah lights.

As you do, say or sing:

Baruch Ata, Adonai Eloheinu, melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitsvotav v'tsivanu l'hadik ner shel Chanukah.

Blessed are you Adonai, our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, and commands us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

Baruch Ata, Adonai Eloheinu, melech haolam, she-asa nisim lavoteinu bayamim haheim bazman hazeh.

Blessed are you Adonai, our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

For first night only:

Baruch Ata, Adonai Eloheinu, melech haolam, she-he-chiyanu v'kiyimanu v'higiyanu lazman hazeh.

Blessed are you Adonai, our God, Sovereign of all, who has kept us alive, sustained us, and brought us to this season.

We kindle these lights because of the wondrous deliverance You performed for our ancestors. During these eight days of Chanukah, these lights are sacred; we are not to use them but only to behold the, so that their glow may rouse us to give thanks for Your wondrous acts of deliverance.
