Letter from the President

The Home Stretch

So much to do, so little time. February 2014 marks the beginning of my final four months as President of TBZ. Although we have accomplished many wonderful things, there is still a lot on the to-do list we created in June 2012. At the same time, I am already thinking of how I can continue to contribute to TBZ in my post-presidential years.

Last year I wrote of the **great potential for the 805 Delaware location** and the importance that the Sanctuary in particular holds in the psyche of our congregation. Since then we were fortunate to be able to complete the Golden Friendship Garden and to add a tenant on the first floor (Canopy of Neighbors). We have had discussions with a funder for an upgrade of the Barker Street entrance but do not yet have a commitment. Most important to our long-term future is adding **an elevator for clients and staff of Jewish Family Service** on the second floor. We have the plan, but at this time there are no funds available to pay for it.

One thing that most people don't realize is that 805 Delaware is really a campus of four interconnected buildings (Sanctuary, Sisterhood Chapel, Auditorium, and the Administrative/ Educational/Cultural connecting building). Each has a mission and needs a place in a new overall vision for what is now an underutilized asset.

As always, I asked for ideas about the building, and a few have rolled in. Most intriguing is the idea of using the vertical space above the auditorium building to create apartment housing. As the congregation ages there will be an increasing demand for accessible housing solutions that allow for access to TBZ, fitness (JCC), our myriad Buffalo cultural offerings, and health care (Buffalo Niagara Medical Campus). There is no better location than 805 Delaware for that combination. In addition, there will be increasing demand for apartment living for students, faculty and staff working at the medical campus.

Let me be clear that nobody yet knows if this is feasible. We are talking to developers and have an architect looking at some ideas. More to come as we get more information.

I hope that you like **our new website** as much as I do. If you have not done so, go to **www.tbz.org** and take the virtual tour of 805 Delaware. Think about this great asset and what else we can be doing together to make it a hub of activity. When you see Deny Adelman, thank this Board member for all his work on both the website and the virtual tour.

I am looking for a small group of congregants with a passion for our spiritual home at 805 Delaware. If you are interested in joining me in this planning process, contact me at president@tbz.org. There's lots to do!

Letter from the Rabbi

There is something amazing happening this month...the Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia. Competition begins February 6. And it is an event that has been emblazoned upon my calendar literally since the dates of the games were finalized. Many of you might know that I spent many years of my childhood and adolescence as a competitive figure skater. I can't pitch or catch; when someone says marathon, I run the other way. And I want nothing to do with a swimming pool - unless of course you freeze it first.

To me, figure skating is perfection. It is the closest to flying that we mortals can achieve on our own. Athletics combines with artistry, physical strength meets human expression, and above all else, it's just one heck of a good time.

People have asked if I was ever Olympic-bound. The answer, in a word, is no. Regardless of all the medals I won, I was always less concerned with bettering my opponents and more concerned with bettering my own ability.

Although I left the world of figure skating when I went to college, my love of the sport never flinched. And several years ago, after a-14 year break, I came back to skating. I hired coaches, returned to the gym, spent time in studios, and threw myself back into my lifelong passion.

When I returned to skating, however, I discovered that there was actually a profound shift that had occurred regarding why I was on the ice and what I was getting out of it. In addition to exercising my body, I found that I was also exercising my soul. And, once that light bulb went off in my mind, things began to change. Now when I head to the rink, I set a few *kavanot* (mindful intentions) for my time on the ice (and my entire day/week too!). I sometimes recite a few pieces of liturgy while I lace up my skates (even if I just hum melodies to myself). And as I hit the ice to warm up, before I really start to practice, I actively engage in mindfulness practices that prepare me for the massive mind-body connections that figure skating demands *and* leave me feeling refreshed and revitalized. As I leave the rink, I am aware of how exhausted I am - but I don't feel it. Instead, I feel renewed and excited to tackle whatever is ahead.

The truth of the matter is that this is a form of "embodied practice." And you certainly don't need to be a figure skater to reap its benefits. Just by adding a little mindfulness to any physical activity, you can very easily deepen and expand the experience of what you are doing. From finding spiritual value in your bike ride to just learning to not hate the elliptical machines when you drag yourself to the gym - even if you are just washing dishes - there are fantastic (and simple!) ways to engage in what you are doing and bring greater meaning to your life. So this month, give it a shot. You don't have to return to a childhood sport, but try bringing a little mindfulness into your physical activity - no matter how small. And, of course, enjoy the 22nd winter Olympic Games!


