Letter from the Rabbi

Let There Be Light

As the days get shorter and the nights longer, we look forward to our Festival of Lights. I think it makes sense that we celebrate Chanukah at this time of year, because our inclination is always to bring light to darkness. And we are not alone in this approach. Cultures and spiritual traditions from around the world approach the Winter Solstice in a similar way; consider for example, the *evergreen* tree covered with lights for Christmas. In our own tradition, we are supposed to add to the light of Chanukah each night, so that the light grows faster than the dark. Even more, we are supposed to place our *hanukkiot* on our windowsills, so that the light can be seen not only in our homes but in the world.

When the world is dark, we need light – and this is so primal that it is reflected at the beginning of Torah, where light is the very first thing that God created. In fact, taking a closer look at the play of light in the Creation narrative can be quite revealing! (Sorry, I know it was a really bad pun, but I can't help myself). On the first day, God creates light, separating it from darkness. But God does not create the sun, the moon and the stars until the fourth day. The classical rabbinic commentators wondered: If there were no heavenly lights, then what kind of light did God create on the first day? The consensus was that it was a kind of light that we do not see.

I would suggest that this Chanukah we can reflect the image of God to each other by creating more than one kind of light ourselves. We can, of course, light the candles of our *hanukkiot*, and if you have more than one you can use them all! Also, you can bring your *hanukkiot* with you to our Shabbat/Chanukah/Consecration service on December 19 at 7 p.m. in our Delaware Avenue building. That said, there is another way we can bring light into the darkness, which is to help people who are in need. There are two ways in particular we can help this month. The first is to participate in our Chanukah Night of Giving on December 19 (yes that is during the same special service I just mentioned). All you have to do is to bring an unwrapped present to be donated to a local refugee child via Jewish Family Services. If you have children, please encourage them to bring an unwrapped present for a similar aged child.

The second way we can bring more light into the dark is to feed the hungry. As you probably already know, we are collaborating with Catholic Charities to open the Town Square Food Pantry, and we need more food. Our PALS (preschool) community has organized an Eight Generous Nights program, asking for specific donations on specific days. Specifically, we are seeking oils (olive, vegetable and corn), canned vegetables, cereal (hot and cold), grains (like rice and pasta), condiments (ketchup, mustard, etc.), canned soups, dried soup mixes, snack foods and sweet treats. May we all celebrate the Festival of Lights with joy, and share that light with those who need it most.

Consecration 2014/5775

Each year we welcome our students in kindergarten – third grade who are beginning their religious studies at Temple Beth Zion. The ceremony used in Reform congregations to mark the beginning of formal Jewish education is called Consecration. At the Consecration service, the students will sing a number of prayers and songs, are called to the bima for a special blessing by the Rabbi and are given a small replica of a Torah to symbolize the start of their own study of Torah. This year, Consecration will take place on **Friday, December 19**, during our Chanukah Shabbat Service at the TBZ Delaware Building.

B'nai Mitzvah Projects

Becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah is an important milestone in a young person's Jewish education. But what does it actually mean to "become" a Bar/Bat Mitzvah? That is the question all of our students are asked as they begin their formal B'nai Mitzvah preparations. To help them understand the additional responsibilities that are expected of them as they become young Jewish adults, they are each asked to take on a special Mitzvah project. We try to help them create a project by remembering A-E-I-O-U*:

Active – Take an active role in making the project happen, i.e., contacting a local organization, collecting items in their school or neighborhood to be donated.

Engaging – The project should be one that you want to be involved with, that includes your interests, hobbies and values.

Influential – Can you make a difference in people's lives through your project? Can you get others to help you?

Ongoing – The project should take place over a period of months and, hopefully, will continue past your Bar/Bat Mitzvah!

Unique – Be creative and design a project that hasn't been done before; make this YOUR project!

Through creating and putting into practice a project that is meaningful to them, we believe that our students will develop the habit of doing mitzvot throughout their lifetime.

Back by Popular Demand: Membership Directory



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
