# Letter from the President

## Why Not for the Living?

In the TBZ Bulletin in 1970, Rabbi Martin Goldberg wrote a column entitled "Why Not for the Living?". As a 20 year-old college student, it resonated enough with me that I saved it. It read:

We see children who hardly spent a week with Father and Mother in a decade - too busy, too many responsibilities - take a week off to sit in mourning honoring the memory of a parent, and we ask:

#### Why not for the living?

We see members of a family come from all corners of this vast land to attend a funeral, but were too busy to come to a wedding or Bar Mitzvah, and we ask:

#### Why not for the living?

Not long ago two brothers and a sister, long "on the outs" – and how it hurt their Mother – made up at their Mother's funeral and become brothers and a sister again, and we ask:

#### Why not for the living?

Isn't it wisdom to give as much time and energy, to offer as much exertion of heart and mind to the enjoyment of living as we give to mourning and weeping?

The next time we receive a wedding invitation - or remember that we haven't seen Mother in weeks - or consider that our peeve at our brother is causing pain to Father – when we know that we will be spending many Sabbaths in the synagogue saying Kaddish for Mother and Father, but today we let them sit in the synagogue alone, shouldn't we ask ourselves:

#### Why not for the living? Why not now?

Perhaps the article hit me so hard because my mother's family had been torn apart by a dispute over family business. I've shared it numerous times over the years with people who spoke about siblings not getting along or others who might benefit from its simple message.

As my thoughts turn to our new year, I thought what a perfect time to share this with my TBZ family. I hope and pray for the entire Congregation that we can make peace with those we care about – now – while we're living. Certainly life is short. What better way to start 5775 – a new year – than by finding the comfort and joy of resolving a previously troubled situation

I wish you all a happy, healthy, prosperous and peaceful new year.

## Letter from the Rabbi

Little more than a year ago, when I first moved to my wonderful home on a lovely, warm, quiet street in Kenmore, I was absolutely delighted to learn (from almost everyone I spoke to), that everything in Buffalo is only a 20-minute drive away. It doesn't matter where you are; any place you want to go is only 20 minutes away. The other thing that I very quickly learned is that Buffalo is a wonderful place to live. It wasn't just my own street that is lovely, clean, and peaceful. But rather the whole region is buzzing with festivals, events, things to do, places to see, wings to eat, and a healthy heaping helping of good old-fashioned fun. I consider myself really quite blessed.

There is a generations-long tradition in my family of taking Sunday afternoon drives. And though I may not don my Sunday best before getting into my car, a nice little afternoon drive is a tradition that I occasionally keep to this day. Thanks to the everconvenient geography of Buffalo, I am delightfully able to enjoy a relaxing afternoon drive in only 20 minutes! And indeed one afternoon this past summer, I did just that. I got into my car, with no particular place to go, and I decided to simply drive about and explore some area I'd not yet been.

I drove in no particular direction, and in far less than 20 minutes, I found myself on a street lined with homes. I could see how at one time, the street I was on looked exactly like mine. I could easily see how at one point it was lined with healthy trees, well-kept yards, and pretty single-family homes. What was before me, however, was anything but. The few existing trees were unmaintained, and those that had died long ago had never been replaced. The well-kept yards had been paved, left to weeds, or had died entirely. And the pretty single-family homes were either boarded up, falling in, or appeared burnt out—but yet clearly still inhabited. The stores on the corners had bars on the windows. And tired, strained, social service offices and churches appeared sporadically throughout the neighborhood. It was a different world-not one filled with malice or deviance, just poverty. Twenty minutes in Buffalo really can take you anywhere.

Yes, there are SO many wonderful, tremendous things right here in our own back yard. And we all should not only enjoy them, but be proud of them. The other side of that coin, however, is that all of the wonderful things we enjoy about Buffalo draw our attention and focus from the poverty-stricken realities that literally thousands of Western New Yorkers live each and every

I often refer to Wegmans as the Disneyland of food. We generally don't realize that there are people out there who have never heard of Wegmans. And there are many more people who dream of one day being able to go into such a grocery store as Wegman's or Tops to buy their food. These people aren't foreign. They are not addicts or criminals. They are just poor—either born into poverty or have fallen into it by no fault of their own. All it takes is one major illness that an insurance provider won't cover (or cover sufficiently), and anyone may very well fall from the ranks of the middle class and into poverty.

## Remembering Kristallnacht

Thursday, October 30, at 7 p.m. Broder Center

Please join the Western New York Jewish Community as we recall Kristallnacht, "The Night of Broken Glass." A series of coordinated attacks (pogroms) against Jews occurred throughout Nazi Germany and Austria on November 9-10, 1938. Synagogues were burned, Jewish business were vandalized, and windows were broken. The evil deed was carried out by SA paramilitary forces and non-Jewish civilians. German authorities looked on without intervening.

The evening will include a remembrance service led by Rabbi Gary Pokras, Rabbi Adam Scheldt and Cantor Penny Myers. Dr. Eileen Angelini, Ph.D., Professor of French and Fulbright Scholar at Canisius College and new Holocaust Resource Center Board member, will discuss Kristallnacht referring to excerpts from the film *More Than Broken Glass: Memories of Kristallnacht* as well as other documentaries. An internationally recognized presenter and documentary filmmaker, Dr. Angelini has a longtime interest in Holocaust studies and has conducted many interdisciplinary workshops across the U.S. on the teaching of the Holocaust in the K-16 educational setting.

Holocaust Resource Center Speakers Bureau volunteers Marianne Goldstein and Dr. Herman Stone will share their experiences in Germany at the time of Kristallnacht. There will be time for questions and discussion.

This event is free and open to the community.

## New Students Ready for School

The Boys and Girls Club of Buffalo and Daemen College students provided new backpacks with school supplies for children beginning the new school year. In July and August, case managers from Jewish Family Service enrolled 33 children in school. For new refugee kids, having new backpacks and supplies is especially important because this may be the first time they will be attending school. Additionally, each child had a new pair of socks in their backpack, courtesy of TBZers who participated in the Rabbi Scheldt Sock Drive. Children also received hats, gloves and scarves donated from JFS' ongoing collection drive.

### **Sleeves Too Short?**

Now that temperatures are beginning to drop, you go to your child's closet and pull out last year's coat. They try it on, and you immediately see that the sleeves are too short and it's a bit tight in the shoulders. The refugee children who benefited from their first ever school backpacks will experience their very first Buffalo winter soon. Please bring that too-small coat to the bins at the Broder Center or Delaware Building. Jewish Family Service will match up these children with a much-needed warm coat.

## **Powerful Tools for Caregivers**

A six-week instructional program designed to provide caregivers the tools needed for taking care of themselves is now being offered. Temple Beth Zion's Broder Center, 700 Sweet Home Road, will host the classes for people helping older relatives or friends. In the six 2-1/2 hour sessions, caregivers learn to reduce stress, improve self-confidence, better communicate feelings and locate helpful resources. Attendees also learn how to increase their ability to make tough decisions and balance their lives. Sessions are from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. on the following Tuesdays: October 28, November 18 and 25, December 2, 9 and 16.

Class size is limited and pre-registration is required – call 858-2177 or e-mail <u>adina.garfinkel@erie.gov</u> for more information and to register. There is a \$25 cost for the course, which includes a copy of *The Caregiver Helpbook*. Some health insurers cover the cost of the course.

These classes are supported by a grant from the Health Foundation for Western and Central New York and co-sponsored by the University at Buffalo, School of Public Health and Health Professions and the Erie County Caregivers Coalition.


