Letter from the Rabbi

Within Judaism, we often think in terms of action, of religious law and of history. Our *halakha* (religious law) fleshes out our *mitzvot* (commandments), and thus begins the structure of living Jewishly. We add to that layer upon layer of history—both our people's literal experience throughout time as well as our people's Biblical foundations. But what of the Jewish soul? Where is our sense of, or our engagement with, spirituality in our understanding of Jewish life and Jewish living?

Because Judaism exists in our lives (one can't just think Jewishly or feel Jewish, but rather being Jewish requires us to *actively live* our Jewish identity in some way), let's take a look at a couple of the things that we live and do in our community.

This month, together with our partners, we will be having an open house to honor our food pantry and all the amazing things that happen there. It continues to be a phenomenal place that not only feeds those in need, but also lifts them up, connects them with caring people and builds community. The open house will be on May 20 at 2 p.m., and everyone is invited to stop by. In the brief months that we have been engaged in the Town Square Food Pantry, we have seen some truly amazing community building within TBZ through an outpouring of donations (keep 'em coming!) and other rich activities. But most importantly, the food pantry allows us to engage the mitzvot of welcoming the stranger, helping those in need and providing greater justice in the world.

And, with equal excitement, we are already looking toward June 7, when scores of TBZ'ers will march in Buffalo's annual LGBT Pride Parade. Last year was a resounding success, with over 40 marchers and a successful booth at the festival. This year, our lead organizers are thrilled by even more support, an improved presence at the festival, and (yes, you're reading this correctly) a float in the parade! It looks to be a wonderful (and fun) afternoon.

As a synagogue community and as Jews, we take part in things like food pantries and pride celebrations to engage mitzvot and to make the world a better and more just place. But in reality, there is value added that we often overlook. In fact, our food pantry and the Pride Parade are essentially and truly reflections of the same thing—the spiritual landscape of Judaism. When we lift up those in need by giving them food, we are opening ourselves to be lifted up as well—but in a spiritual sense. When we have a great time showing our support by marching in a parade, we are celebrating the diversity that God has implanted within humanity. We broaden our minds and we broaden our lives through bringing about social change and justice. And we cultivate our Jewish souls by engaging the mitzvot that cheers us on to do so.

As Jews, we cultivate our souls and engage our sense of spirituality when we act Jewishly—when we find joy by bringing it to others; when we find solace in comforting those who need it too; and when we simply open our awareness to the spiritual growth that comes from living Jewishly.


