Letter from the Cantor

Looking Back and Ahead

Each year during Simchat Torah, we unroll one of our beloved Torah scrolls and start back at the beginning. We refresh our minds with the sweet words of Torah and immerse ourselves into the familiar stories that are woven into the tapestry of our people through the delicate parchment. However, it isn't fall, but rather it is July, and we are deep into Bamidbar (Numbers) where we are taking a census and an accounting of our people. In other words, it is an exercise of reflection. We reflect on who we are and where we envision ourselves to be. At Temple Beth Zion, we take this Torah's teaching into concrete practice as our trajectory is to strive for excellence in worship and programming.

JFS Grassroots Garden at TBZ

The next time you find yourself at the Delaware Building, come around to the Barker Street side and you will see the newly installed and planted raised-bed flower and vegetable/herb garden. Funding and supplies for the project were received from Grassroots Gardens of Buffalo, which was founded by Milton (Zeke) Zeckhauser, a past president of Jewish Family Service and an active leader at Temple Beth Zion.

The idea for the garden came from JFS as a means of joining its programs such as refugee resettlement, the licensed mental and behavioral health clinic and the WNY Center for Survivors of Torture with the spirit of tikkun olam (healing the world) at TBZ to create a garden sanctuary to foster healing and community as well as a place for providing a source of food for those in need.

The garden is envisioned as a space for outdoor counseling sessions as well as tactile therapy. It will be tended primarily by the various refugee communities served by JFS, many of whom come from agrarian societies. Many of the refugees served by JFS come from cultures that are community-based rather than individual-based. These new families in Buffalo seek and need community to feel at home, and our Delaware Building, along with JFS programming, fits part of that need.

Over time, possible additions could be made, such as benches, fruit trees and/or flower beds, depending on community need and interest as well as the ability to expand into sunnier locations. We see this as an opportunity for members of the TBZ and greater Jewish community who are most likely confused by, and isolated from, the refugee clients who are resettled by Jewish Family Service.

The garden will be a neutral place where all communities can come together to enhance relationships among communities, learn about different cultures, and foster more positive interactions.

We at TBZ are pleased to be hosting this important JFS initiative and our newest Buffalonians.

Out at the Ballpark

Join TBZ's Kulanu Group on Thursday, July 16, at the Buffalo Bisons' 7:05 p.m. game against the Columbus Clippers. The evening is an initiative of the Bisons organization, which reached out to the Pride Center of WNY to propose the event. The Bisons have billed the game as a celebration of "the vibrancy of Western New York's Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Queer Community." This historic occasion is the first time a professional sporting organization in Western New York has created an official event for the LGBTQ community, and it follows a growing trend around the country.

The Coca-Cola Field gates open at 5 p.m. Tickets are \$12. A block of tickets has been reserved for Temple Beth Zion. To purchase your tickets, contact Rob Kates of the Buffalo Bisons at (716) 846-2032 or rkates@bisons.com.

In order to sit with the TBZ group, mention Temple Beth Zion when you purchase your tickets, and buy your tickets no later than July 15. Tickets purchased after July 2 will be held at will-call until game night. To avoid downtown traffic congestion, you may park your car at the TBZ Delaware Avenue lot and take the subway to the ballpark from the North Street Metro station two blocks from the Temple.

A portion of the proceeds from ticket sales will benefit the Pride Center of WNY, a nonprofit organization whose mission is "to work with the community to make Western New York a safe, healthy and satisfying place for lesbians, gay men, bisexuals and transgender people to live, work and establish their families."

Kulanu (*all of us*) explores the diversity of our congregation through LGBTQ programming, learning, and engagement.
