Letter from the President

The Challenge of Diversity

At 165 years young, Temple Beth Zion continues to evolve. Indeed, our (mostly German) ancestor founders would not recognize TBZ in 2016. Truthfully, they would most certainly not be happy with where we are religiously or probably culturally.

Just at this moment in time, there are 3, 4 even 5 generations represented within our Congregation. We have many families who have been here for generations. I am the fifth generation of my family here, and my son, Jeff, and his wife, Deb, are the sixth. And we have new people and families joining all the time. Several are even newly converted Jews.

Trying to plan services and programs for such a large and diverse congregation is an enormous challenge. We know congregants engage (and disengage) throughout their lives. We all want and expect different things from our engagement as our lives change. We want Temple to name our babies; educate our children; see our children become Bar or Bat Mitzvah; marry us; visit us in hospitals; console us when loved ones are taken from us - even bury us. We want to study Torah – or yoga. We want a place to meet with people with whom we share thousands of years of heritage, even if we just met them. Some of us want to give back to the Jewish community or the community at large. And some want to show their children the value of giving back. And some are concerned with preserving Temple Beth Zion for generations yet to come.

As your Board of Trustees wrestled with the new model of staffing - a shared clergy partnership model and a reliance on congregational involvement - we firmly believed that enough of you want to help for us to be successful. Early indications show we are correct. More of you offered to serve on the Search and Implementation committees than we could include. For those who weren't chosen and for those who want to help but haven't yet reached out, do not despair. There will be many, many more meaningful opportunities for engagement in the very near future. By next month I expect I will be able to give you updates on our progress. Stay tuned!

Letter from the Rabbi

Dear Friends,

Here at TBZ, many of us take great pride in our long history and our position as the largest synagogue community in Western New York. Temple Beth Zion was founded just over 165 years ago, and as we have grown we have become a spiritual home for generations of Jews, and also a physical home for many beautiful *sifrei Torah* (Torah scrolls).

There is something mystical about a Torah scroll, handwritten letter by letter on parchment by a specially trained *sofer* (scribe). *Sifrei torah* connect us to the mysterious origins of our tradition, to the generations of Jews who have come before us, to the narratives that define who we are as Children of Israel. That's why our *b'nei mitzvah* read from the scroll rather than from a printed book, why we parade with the scrolls during every Torah service, and why we take all of the scrolls out of the ark on *Kol Nidrei* as we stand before God seeking forgiveness.

The mystique of the scrolls is intensified because we keep them concealed behind the doors and curtains of the Holy Ark. Even more, we are taught from a young age never to actually touch the parchment because the oils that our skin naturally secretes can make the ink fade and crack.

Our scrolls are truly beautiful, and can last hundreds of years if they are properly maintained. Over the past few years, and thanks to the generosity of the Sisterhood and Brotherhood, we have invested thousands of dollars in Torah scroll repairs, and will need to spend even more to bring the remaining scrolls back to kosher status. We can continue to pay thousands of dollars to

bring in specialists to maintain our scrolls, or we can do a significant portion of the work ourselves. When our *sofer* was here doing some repair work a few years ago, he trained a number of our congregants to be what he called 'Holy Rollers.' Anyone can be a Holy Roller. There are no restrictions on who can touch a scroll, even the parchment, as long as our hands are freshly washed and we have focused our full attention on the scroll before us. Holy Rollers can clean, inspect and even handle minor Torah repairs so that when the *sofer* does come, there will be less for him to do.



You can be a Holy Roller. You can, in the most hands-on way possible, help ensure that our scrolls last for generations to come. If you missed the training with the *sofer* we would be happy to train you ourselves – it is not difficult and can be incredibly rewarding. Please consider becoming a Holy Roller. We will be holding an informational and organizing meeting at the Broder Center on Sunday, February 28, at 9 a.m.

Interfaith Congregational Conversations Going Deeper: The Current Issues Driving Israeli-Palestinian Relations

The next events will explore some of the pressing issues that led the Presbyterian Church to divest of three corporations doing business in Israel that aid or maintain the construction of the fence of separation and, more generally, issues driving Israeli-Palestinian relations today.

The February 28 event will be a simulation of the Israeli Knesset. The purpose of this exercise will be to provide a 'handson' experience of the complexity and inner workings of the Israeli political process.

The April 10 event will be a simulation of a Presbyterian Church (USA) General Assembly. A simulated 'hands-on' experience of how the GA works and how issues get discussed, presented and voted upon.

A future event will provide the opportunity for guided discussion around the Boycott Divestment and Sanction movement as it affects Israel today and the question of Presbyterian involvement seeking to influence Israeli-Palestinian relations.




