Letter from the President

The parsha for the first Shabbat of this month is from the book of Numbers, Parshat Korach. Korach was the leader of a rebellion against Moses and his brother, Aaron, during the journey of the Israelites from Egypt to the Land of Israel.

Korach was unhappy that Moses had appointed his brother as high priest. Korach believed that Moses had gone too far, "For all of the community are holy." Additional members of the community Dathan and Abiram joined in the opposition to Moses. G-d provided an immediate solution to the uprising – the ground opened up and "swallowed" the rebels. This grand and dramatic gesture, however, did not end the uprising.

G-d then directs Moses to take twelve staffs, assign each one to a tribe, and place them in a safe place. The next day, the staff assigned to Aaron had "spouted, budded, blossomed and borne almonds." Thus demonstrating that Moses was correct is making Aaron the high priest. Only then did the rebellion end.

Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks proposes that "Korach teaches us that there are two ways of resolving conflict: by force and persuasion. The first negates your opponent. The second enlists your opponent, taking his/her challenge seriously and addressing it." It was the quiet, gentle miracle of Aaron's staff that ended the rebellion. Rabbi Sacks concludes by saying, "There is conflict resolution in Judaism - not by force, but by pleasantness and peace."

This sentiment of peaceful conflict resolution in the parsha is very meaningful to me as I begin my second year as the President of the Board of Trustees. The responsibility of leading the Board of our beloved Temple Beth Zion is sobering. There are many issues to manage, which can be overwhelming. I remain incredibly grateful to those of you who have reached out a hand to join me in working to make our shul the best it can be. I think about the hundreds of conversations I have had over this past year, and I am so humbled that you took the time to share with me your thoughts, suggestions, and concerns. We all have deeply held opinions; many times these opinions differ. I truly believe that we make the best decisions when we take the time to listen to everyone. Most times there is a common thread, and a decision can be made that will be satisfying to most.

Some of the most meaningful conversations I have had with congregants have not been in meetings, but unscheduled encounters, after services during an Oneg Shabbat or at an Engagement Committee gathering. Another chance to have a conversation will be on August 5 at the Summer Celebration. Let's keep the conversation going.

Letter from the Rabbi

The Harshest Season

While summer is a time of rest and relaxation for many Americans, the Jewish understanding about the summer season is very different.

Summer in the Eastern Mediterranean and in the deserts of Israel is hot and uncomfortable, at best. And in the ancient world the winds were favorable for sea travel and waging war. This means that historically we have Fast Days and Days of Mourning during the summer.

Our next traditional celebration will be the Fifteenth of Av, called Tu b'Av in Hebrew, a seldom celebrated harvest festival and day for dancing and matchmaking, which will take place this summer on August 16.

The lowest point of our calendar year comes in the middle of summer, the three weeks between the Seventeenth of Tamuz and the Ninth of Av. 17 Tammuz, a minor fast day – meaning a fast from sunrise to sunset – primarily commemorates the breaching of the walls of Jerusalem during the Roman siege in the year 70 CE. This begins three weeks of mourning that reach their conclusion with the Ninth of Av, Tisha b'Av, the day associated with the destruction of the Second Temple in Jerusalem in 70 CE, and the destruction of the First Temple in 586 BCE, and numerous other tragedies in the history of the Jewish people. Tisha b'Av is the worst day of the Jewish calendar cycle and is marked by a full fast, like Yom Kippur.

How do we reconcile this low opinion of summer with the season of ease that we hope for in our Twenty-First Century Jewish American culture?

We can see it in the same light as the smashing of a glass at the end of a wedding ceremony. Even in the middle of a celebration we need to remember that the world is still broken and needs our attention.

When we are refueling ourselves with the sun and leisure of summer we can also pause for a little bit of reflection on how we got here, what we have survived, and what we might yet have to do to continue to steer the world toward improvement for all.

Pride Weekend Events

Rabbi Mike Moskowitz, Scholar in Residence for Trans and Queer Jewish Studies at Congregation Beit Simchat Torah in Manhattan, kicked off TBZ's celebration of Pride Weekend with a D'var Torah at the Friday evening Pride Service on May 31. Rabbi Moskowitz spoke eloquently about our obligation to take action to build a better society. He challenged us to find the meanings in the spaces between the words of our sacred texts that enable us to work toward a just and inclusive Judaism that recognizes each of us as created in the image of the Divine.

On Saturday morning, June 1, Rabbi Moskowitz led Torah study, explicating the tension between the commandment to keep the Sabbath and the commandment to save a life - or heal a person in need of healing. Discussing representative texts from more than 1,500 years of Jewish tradition, Rabbi Moskowitz argued that there is no conflict, because the commandment to save a life is more fundamental than the commandment to keep the Sabbath.

On Saturday evening, the TBZ Sanctuary hosted the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus for yet another return engagement. "Singing With Pride" celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising in New York, which is widely seen as the beginning of the Gay Liberation movement in the United States. The concert included both inspiring and humorous works, and concluded with the current Chorus members joined by alumni for a stirring rendition of "How Can I Keep From Singing!"

On a cool and cloudy Sunday morning, June 2, TBZ members assembled with other organizations and members of the Buffalo Jewish Community for the annual Gay Pride parade. Braving a soaking rain that began at about 11 a.m., more than 40 people assembled, representing more than 20 different Jewish organizations. As has happened in the past, the rain stopped just as the parade stepped off at noon, and the weather turned beautiful. The TBZ B'etzelem Elohim float was greeted by cheers along the parade route, and additional TBZ members and other friends offering bottled water as the Jewish Pride of WNY contingent passed Congregation Beth Abraham.

Meeting Notes

The Board meeting was held on May 7. The meeting was called to order, and Jody Goldstein provided this month's D'var Torah speaking to the idea that engagement is an integral part of our Jewishness, sharing the story of Rabbi Pinchas and how he came to realize that it is vital to balance the priorities of ourselves with those of our communities.

Andy Shaevel, Chair of the Governance Committee, attended to present a report on the nomination process of trustees and which four current trustees are eligible for reelection and presented the new trustees who will be nominated for election by the Congregation at the Annual Meeting. In addition, in the fall the Governance Committee will present a handful of amendments to the bylaws for consideration.

Amy Schaefer presented a budget update for Fiscal Year 2019 as of the end of March. In addition, she reported that the Jewish Federation's new Security Coordinator, Susan DeMari, has met with her and toured both buildings as well as having discussions with TBZ and JFS about 805 Delaware. A motion was made later in the meeting to provide a donation to the Buffalo Jewish Federation to support community security initiatives.

Several committee reports were provided by Susan Bruckheimer and Jody Goldstein, each highlighting upcoming events. Rabbi Jonathan announced the planned visit by Rabbi Mike Moskowitz to participate in the Pride Service and weekend festivities.

The proposed Fiscal Year 2020 operational budget was reviewed and approved for presentation for congregational vote at the June 14 Annual Meeting.



TOUR THE TONAWANDAS AND CRUISE ABOARD THE QUEEN OF PEACE

Hear some fascinating history about North Tonawanda and its location on the Erie Canal on this special tour followed by a cruise on the Erie Canal aboard the Queen of Peace. How did we become associated with lumber? And what years did it surpass Chicago as the Lumber Capital of the World?

Walk streets named after early land owners and influential citizens. Pass late 19th-century and early 20th-century homes with interesting architecture, and learn a little about their former residents.

Admire the stained-glass skylight at the Carnegie Art Center. View the graves of the Herschell Family in an historic cemetery, and stop inside the Allan Herschell Carrousel Factory Museum. Also stop at the earlier Herschell-Spillman Motor Company Complex, now transformed into the 21st-century canal-side residential Remington Lofts. Our tour will take us to the six buildings listed on the National Register of Historic Places in North Tonawanda, with other places of historic significance along the way.

After our tour we will stop for lunch at Webster's Bistro followed by a transfer to the Western Gateway of the Erie Canal to board the Queen of Peace. Trained historians will inform you about the area's earliest pioneer settlers and the associated rush of immigrants that poured into the area establishing the Twin Cities of Tonawanda and North Tonawanda. Back on shore enjoy a guided tour through the gracious 10 room homestead of pioneer Benjamin Long built in 1829.

This tour meets at the **Carnegie Art Center** 240 Goundry Street, North Tonawanda, NY 14120. Parking is available on the surrounding side streets.
