Letter from the Rabbi

Tu B’shvat and Remembering Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

“...And All Shall Sit Under Their Vine and Fig Tree and None Shall Make them Afraid.”

On January 17, the observances of the Jewish festival of Tu B’shvat (the “birthday of the trees” – similar to Arbor Day) and the day for commemorating Martin Luther King, Jr. Day coincide.

At first glance, the two observances appear to have nothing in common: Tu B’shvat celebrates nature, the day the first almond blossoms appear in the land of Israel. In its more contemporary setting, Tu B’shvat is about climate change. It gives us an opportunity to focus on our relationship with the environment, our connection to God and how these two are inextricably intertwined. On MLK Day, we commemorate the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr: the great civil rights leader, social justice activist, pastor, preacher, husband, father, scholar, orator and dreamer.

This same week, it is also no coincidence that the Jewish people have just finished reading the section of the book of Exodus in our weekly biblical reading where the Israelites were freed from slavery in Egypt.

So how are Tu B’shvat, the observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day and the story of our people’s struggle for freedom all related?

It was a long, hard road for our people to find their way from Egypt to the Promised Land of Israel. A road fraught with disappointment, frustration and set-backs. Yet, on this road, our people, the Jewish people, was born. Our nation found its path toward building a covenantal relationship with God. We discovered some of the greatest eternal truths that still guide us today, thousands of years later.

Many peoples have experienced struggles of slavery, oppression and bondage. Many people have had to walk that same road our people did so many years ago. As we are all too well aware, the struggles are still not over.

The Jewish people’s story of oppression and redemption strongly resonates with the lessons taught by Dr. King. Dr. King often spoke with a prophetic voice echoing those biblical values, morals and ideals. He fought for what was just, right and fair. Many rabbis and ministers, priests and good people of all religious and ethnic backgrounds walked

alongside him. His message still cries out to us today, in
our broken, hurting world.

Our relationship with the environment and with nature
teaches us that there is always hope for the future. Tu
B'shvat in particular reminds us that we are blessed with
what we have today because of those who planted seeds
before us. These seeds can be the literal seeds for food, or
the symbolic seeds of justice, peace, harmony and hope.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. often spoke about those seeds
of justice, he tried to grow a field of hope. He caused the
sun to shine on a forest of dreams for so many people,
creating a positive environment of potential and
opportunity: just as the Israelites saw their potential of
opportunity as they marched on their journey toward the
promised land.

So today we affirm our pursuit of justice, as well as our
commitment to protect our environment. As the Rev. Dr.
King taught:

*"Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are
caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single
garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all
indirectly." (Birmingham, Alabama, April 16, 1963).*

This is my prayer for these dual observances: "Let
violence be gone; let the day come soon when evil shall
give way to goodness, when war shall be forgotten, hunger
be no more, and all at last shall live in freedom." As the
prophet Micah reminds us: Then all shall sit under their
vines and fig trees and none shall make them afraid.
(Micah 4:4)

Our teens paid tribute and honored our Veterans by placing flags at Forest Lawn Cemetery on Veteran's Day and being present at the service following.

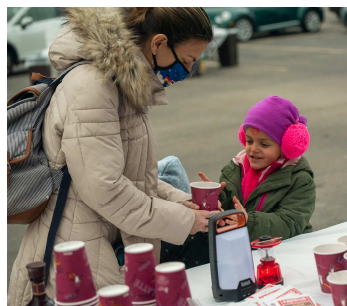

Chanukah Happened

Thank you to everyone who filled the 8th Night with light at the PJ Library/PJ Our Way Chanukah Happening! It was a spectacular evening of scavenger hunting, warm drink sipping, Jewish learning, donut filling, Chanukah menorah lighting, re-connecting, and dance partying in the Broder Center parking lot. More than 225 people attended!



Tu B'Shevat, beginning at sundown on Sunday, January 16 this year, was way ahead of its time. It is the first Earth Day. The birthday of the trees. Although the rituals most closely identified with Tu B'Shevat originated in the 16th century, it is even more relevant today as we try to embrace our role as stewards of the planet.

Over the past century, Tu B'Shevat has been closely associated with the environmental movement. Many celebrate by planting trees in Israel in honor of loved ones and eat foods from the Seven Species of Israel that are mentioned in the Torah: Wheat, Barley, Grapes, Figs, Pomegranates, Olives and Dates. Dried carob is also popular.

It's also the perfect time to commit to making changes in environmental practices, like reducing, recycling, and reusing. We also like to work on moving towards a Zero Waste

Tu B'Shevat is a special day not only for celebrating trees but also for celebrating everything the earth provides for us; all of our fruit and vegetables, nuts and seeds, wheat and barley, etc. Below is a simple and gluten-free recipe we hope you might like to try.



Almond Cloud Cookies

Ingredients:

- 1/3 cup almond paste
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 large egg whites
- Pinch of salt
- 1/2 cup sliced almonds, optional

Preparation:

1. Preheat oven to 300° F.
2. Combine almond paste and sugar in a food processor or blender and process until crumbly and sand-like.
3. Add in egg whites and salt until combined.
4. Drop by tablespoonsful onto parchment-lined cookie sheet.
5. Top with sliced almonds (optional). Bake for 25 minutes

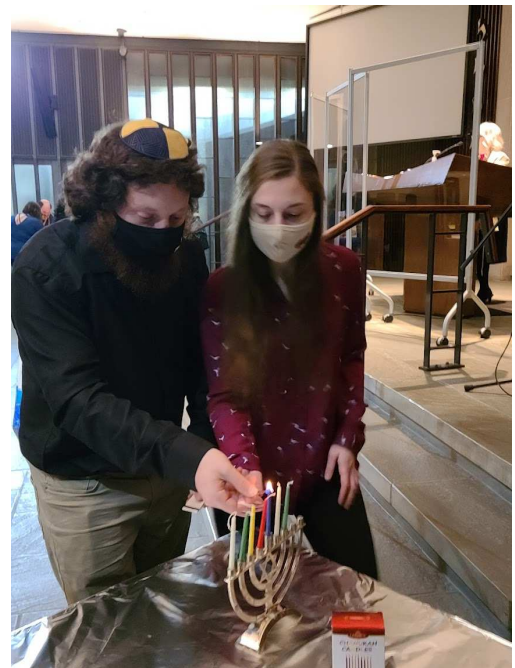
