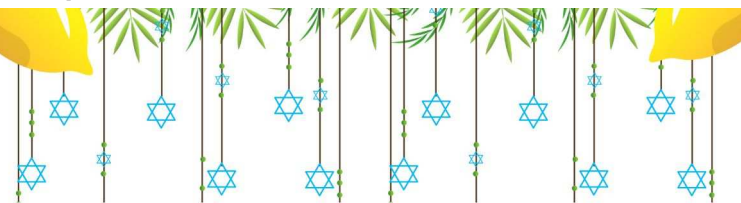

Letter from the President

Fall is my favorite season. I'm not sure if it is because of the changing colors of the leaves or the start of the school year. It might be because of the beginning of football season! And, as I ponder our Jewish tradition, I think it is because of the chance to begin anew each year with the High Holy Days. How lucky we are to get two chances to celebrate a new year, not only with reflections, but also with goals and resolutions.

At Temple Beth Zion, your leadership has been looking forward! With a new rabbi and a large number of new board members, we have been working to build a future of which we can all be proud. Part of that pride comes with our cherished buildings. I know of no other symbol for our TBZ family that means more than our spiritual home at 805 Delaware and, as we head into the new year, I wanted to share an update.

This summer, a small group of TBZ leaders had an opportunity to meet with representatives from the Benderson and Zemsky families. While much has been done with the renewed JFS lease and the reconfiguration of the Cofeld Museum, there were parts of the building that we all realized needed further attention.

With a plan in place, three subcommittees were created. The Building Committee, led by Steve Yonaty, will take a hard look at what has been completed and what still needs to be accomplished. The Strategic Planning Committee, led by Barry Singer, will think about the goals and vision of our building, and the Community Partnership Committee, led by Dave Goldberg, will work with volunteers from Jewish Family Services, the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies, the Buffalo Jewish Federation and the Jewish Community Center to figure out short, mid and long-term ways to best utilize our building in the future.

While our work has just begun, I'm confident that the restoration of 805 Delaware, and the future of TBZ, are all in good hands. I'm thankful to those who have been asked to serve on these committees and look forward to sharing updates in the coming months.

So, as the season turns to fall, as the leaves change colors, as the school year begins, and as the Bills start the road to the Super Bowl, please know that we are all working to ensure a better 5783. It's an exciting time to be at TBZ! Wishing you an easy fast on Yom Kippur and a joyful Sukkot and Shemini Atzeret season.

Letter from the Rabbi

Appreciating the Moment

I appreciate the majesty of the High Holy Days. I love the opportunity it gives us to gather together as a community, but Sukkot is my favorite holiday of the year. The four species of the Lulav and the erection of a temporary outdoor dwelling (a *sukkah*) and schmoozing characterize the festival. Sukkot offers a slower pace and joyful intensity. I also love that it is an excuse to get out my power tools.

Six years ago, I designed and erected the sukka of my dreams. Designing a sukka is not particularly arduous. It can be engineered by a luddite like myself and will stand completely fine for a week. Starting with a wood frame kit from the Sukkah Project, I finished it with mahogany panels, electric heaters (quite important for Michigan and Buffalo), and my children are great decorators. It's large for a sukka—almost 200 square feet—and I have always been satisfied with the results.

Building a sukka is good exercise, a good use of mental energy, whoever has helped me build my sukka have inevitably become good friends, and, once finished, the best part begins. The ritual obligation of the sukka is to do the things one would ordinarily do, only inside of it: to eat in it, pray in it, to read in it, or even watch tv in it, and—if you have the courage to tempt the weather—sleep in it. And then after one week, it is all over.

At the end of the first Sukkot in our dream sukka, I was starting to disassemble my sukka. Perched on my ladder and with my power drill in hand, my daughter, Daria came out screaming and in tears. “Daddy, why are you taking apart the sukka? I don’t want to take apart the sukka. I like it.”

I remember getting off the ladder and giving her a hug. Then, instead of focusing on her sadness, I remember discussing the things we enjoyed about the week: the nice breezy weather and all off our friends who had visited. I remember her telling me how beautiful she thought the sukka was, and I shared with her that a big lessons of this holiday is that nothing lasts forever and so we must enjoy it while it does.

The psalmist tells us, “Teach us to count your days so that you might acquire a heart of wisdom.” (Psalm 90:12) This is a message to appreciate both those moments that are special as well as those moments that are challenging. It is a reminder to live in the present. It is a reminder to measure our days not by the pleasure or adversity we experienced, but by the lesson that experience brings and how they are taken to heart.

(What's Happening at CRS)

The Community Religious School excitedly opened the door for its second year on September 11th. Students were ushered into the building by a canopy of Talitot, held by their parents. Seeing our students' faces as they return to Hebrew School, eager and thrilled to see their friends and embark on an enriching Judaic program, was very exciting. This year, the Community Religious School more than doubled the number of projected unaffiliated students! The inclusive and welcoming school policy and program objectives, along with planned events at TBT, TBZ, CSS and the greater community is off to an amazing start. Our September activities included High Holiday program, Zoom Parent Orientation and apple picking, just in time for Rosh Hashanah!

Our 1-on-1 tutors for more than 100 children have been meeting and teaching our students remotely. It is wonderful to see parents join their children at Zoom meetings to learn Hebrew alongside their children, thus setting an example, reinforcing skills, and engaging in Jewish learning as a family. This endeavor is made possible by community donors and in part by a grant from Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies and the Buffalo Jewish Federation.

Tikkun Olan is an important component throughout the school. Better Together has been an important part of the Middle School curriculum. In this program, students participate in various learning and inter-generational activities with seniors. This year, all CRS families have also been invited to participate in TBT's Outstretched Arm Succot program for adult Jews with disabilities. "If I am only for myself-what am I", our students demonstrated compassion and the true essence of *K'lal Israel*.

The Madrichim, our grades 8th-12th students are setting a wonderful example to the younger children. We are also excited that a good number of them are participating in advanced Jewish studies courses through Brandeis University with whom we partnered for this year.

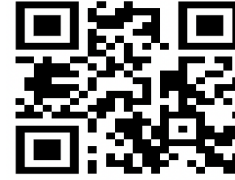



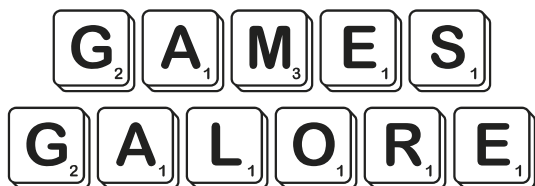
