## Letter from the President

It gives me great pleasure to introduce Mark Hayman as the new Executive Director at Temple Beth Zion. Born in Buffalo and raised at TBZ, Mark comes to us from the Meadowmount School of Music on Lake Champlain and previously from Young Concert Artists in New York City where he served both organizations as Executive Director.

After attending Calasanctius School and then Wesleyan University, Mark built a career leading non-profit organizations. At Young Concert Artists for 30 years, Mark collaborated on programming, strategic planning, and donor relations, while overseeing a staff of 14. At Meadowmount, he oversaw all activities of the residential summer music school including recruitment, enrollment, faculty and staff program management, alumni development, and financial management. In both roles, Mark handled all administrative duties including financial, personnel, governance, compliance, and programming.

Mark grew up in North Buffalo and celebrated his Bar Mitzvah at TBZ. He recalls attending Sunday School at Broder and enjoying our Delaware Avenue synagogue growing up. Mark is excited to be a part of TBZ's and Jewish Buffalo's renaissance and is happy to have returned home, having bought a house in Kenmore 20 years ago.

"I've always felt a strong connection to Buffalo and, with my background running non-profits, this seemed like a natural fit," Mark said. Robin Ostrov, chair of the Personnel Committee and head of the search agreed: "We were very fortunate to find a candidate like Mark. With years of nonprofit leadership experience, combined with a connection to TBZ and a desire to return to Buffalo, we could not have found another more suitable hire."

Letter from the Rabbi

## Seeking Meaning Together

Judaism from its earliest days has always prioritized being together in community. Sharing space in a community is how we celebrate our joys. It is where we go to seek comfort in our greatest moments of despair. It is only through seeking and maintaining a connection to community that we can attain enduring value for our lives. Observing rituals in our individual and collective lives help us to take stock of our value as individuals within the collective.

The evening of July 26 corresponds on the Hebrew Calendar to the 9<sup>th</sup> of Av, Tisha B'Av, the day on the Hebrew calendar that memorializes the worst disasters to ever befall our people—the destruction of both Temples in Jerusalem and the exile of our people. The book of Lamentations, a requiem to the city of Jerusalem, is traditionally read on this day. Yet, even this ode to our darkest moment expresses hope in its most oft recited verse, "renew my days as of old," "chadesh yameinu k'kedem." (Lam. 5:21)

Jewish communal life is filled with contradictions. It is to believe in our specialness and the specialness of every human being. It is to believe in the brokenness of the world but also in the possibility of repair. It is to believe that the darkest moments also contain the greatest potency for hope. In traditional Jewish thinking, Tisha B'Av is not only the day on which our most sacred sites were destroyed but it is also the day on which we believe the Messiah will be born and thereby offer the possibility of redemption.

So much has been lost in recent years. Recent years contained no shortage of challenges and at moments true despair, yet these same moments gave birth to deep fortune and a wealth of opportunities that continue to carry us forward. Temple Beth Zion has experienced a resurgence this past year. We have seen a return to meaningful programming. We have seen a surge in support for our efforts to restore our building and our status in the community.

Temple Beth Zion has a history of being one of Reform Judaism's premier congregations because the generations that came before us generously contributed the resources we needed to attract great partners and to offer the best. We are blessed that Cantor Mark Horowitz has agreed to be our High Holy Day Cantor. We have been blessed by the arrival of a new Executive Director, Mark Hayman, who

(What's Happening at CRS)

The Community Religious School is entering its third year, with increased programming for students, parents, and families! We are welcoming Rabbi Sara Rich to the team, along with Rabbi Brent Gutmann and Rabbi Alex Lazarus-Klein.

Plans are underway for increased programming at the participating synagogues of Congregation Shir Shalom, Temple Beth Tzedek and Temple Beth Zion. After a successful year of participating at community-wide programs with the Jewish Community Center and LiNK, the students and families are looking forward to continued engagement with the community. This year, plans are also being made to collaborate closely with the Kadimah Scholars at Park, hoping it will lead to a grades 7-12 Israel trip in 2 years. CRS's commitment to being inclusive will be reflected in increased staff to work with children with special needs, Jewish adults with disabilities and Jewish seniors in our community. The Ganeinu program for Pre-K children will continue monthly.

Students in 1<sup>st</sup>-7<sup>th</sup> grades will be participating in the successful 1-on-1 Hebrew tutoring. That initiative has been so successful! Our school was used as a model for this in other communities in the US and Canada. Additionally, the *Madrichim* volunteer program for 8<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders will continue with a greater emphasis on social interaction opportunities.

## **2023 Annual Meeting Review**

For those of you who could not attend or view the Temple Beth Zion Annual Meeting on June 29<sup>th</sup>, I share a recap of the evening.

After an opening prayer and remarks from Senior Rabbi Brent Gutmann, I invited Cindy Stover, who represented Sisterhood, to share some of the year's highlights and plans for the coming year. A generous donation check was presented to Temple Beth Zion on behalf of the TBZ Sisterhood.

I then presented my President's report. My focus in looking back was to thank the many individuals who contributed to a tremendous first year of my presidency. From Kathy Ellis and Cindy Stover and Ken Rogers to Jill Gutmann, Ellen Goldstein, Joni Shatkin, Jenn Field, and Sam White, these individuals went above and beyond. Additionally, I thanked Irv Levy, Sarah Gelman Carney, Susan Adelman, Larry Rubin, Chana Kotzin, Randy Benderson, and the staff for their leadership this past year. I also thanked the entire board of trustees, with a special shout out to Steve Yonaty, Barry Singer and Robin Ostrov for their committee work this year.

Looking forward to the 2023-2024 fiscal year, I highlighted a few exciting things including some news about High Holy Days. First, Cantor Mark Horowitz will be joining us as a guest cantor. Second, we have plans to hold our alternate Rosh HaShanah service at Centerland. That's right, we're going back to the future. After 10 years at Becker Farms, we've been in talks with the JCC Amherst about hosting a fun-filled family day on their campgrounds. Finally, I shared the news that we will not have a paid choir this year for Rosh HaShanah or Yom Kippur. Plans are underway to try to support a volunteer choir, but budget constraints forced us to make some difficult decisions.

A few other things to look forward to next year include our Blum Family Educational Program whereby middle and high school students will come to 805 Delaware to learn about TBZ's history, architecture, and the history of the Jewish Buffalo community. This fully funded program from a donor who grew up at TBZ is an exciting way we can leverage the Cofeld Museum in a unique and special way.

Before turning things over to Larry Rubin for the Treasurer's report, I shared the importance of dues collection and encouraged congregants to put a plan in place for dues and/or tuition as we need to become more stringent in this area.

Larry Rubin presented the annual Treasurer's report. Two key items to share are that we are increasing dues 3% (first time in four years) and implementing a security surcharge of \$54 for all family units. He then opened the floor to questions regarding the operating budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023, as approved by the Financial Planning Committee and the Board of Trustees. The budget was approved by the congregation as presented.

Ken Rogers, chair of the Governance Committee, introduced the slate of nominees for the Board of Trustees which included returning board members David Gordon, Aaron Mango, Stephen Yonaty and Robin Ostrov. All were elected to a three-year term, except Robin who accepted a one-year term. Cindy Stover and Errol Sull will continue as representatives of Sisterhood and Brotherhood respectively.

The last item on the agenda was regarding an update in our TBZ bylaws which was approved by the congregation.

As directed by the bylaws, the Board had a brief meeting immediately following the Annual Meeting to select their Officers for 2023-2024. The Board accepted the Governance Committee recommendations for the following: President -Kenneth Polk; Vice Presidents – Sharon Schwartz, Barry Singer, Stephen Yonaty; Treasurer – Laurence Rubin; Secretary – Ken Graber and Immediate Past President – David Goldberg.

With Senior Rabbi Brent Gutmann at the helm, the board is ready to continue their work in finding meaningful ways to engage our members and we look forward to this new fiscal year. Thank you for your support.
