Letter from the Rabbi

Making Space

In the 11th year of his rabbinate, Rabbi Stephen Pearce became Senior Rabbi of Congregation Emanu-El in San Francisco. During his 30-year tenure, he grew the congregation from 1400 to 2700 households. Describing his success, Rabbi Pearce responded, "I finally realized it's not all about me." He explained with a story that he once congratulated a congregant on her son's recent Bar Mitzvah.

"Thank you," she responded, and then asked, "Do I know you?"

"I'm Rabbi Stephen Pearce, the Senior Rabbi."

Embarrassed, the congregant exclaimed, "I'm so sorry I didn't recognize you, Rabbi!" But he saw it differently. Why would she know him? His Associate Rabbi and Cantor had prepared the family. Rather, he saw not being recognized as evidence of a job well done.

Tzimtzum, or "contracting" is among the most important mystical concepts of Judaism. The Zohar explains that God needed to 'contract' to make room for creation. Similarly, "making space" for others is among the most challenging tasks of a leader. It runs contrary to our ego's urges, yet good leadership is defined by understanding our role, and, even more importantly, others' roles.

Since arriving at TBZ, I have regularly repeated, "I'm just here to be the rabbi," and have depended on our staff and lay leaders to carry forward our mission. In response, our members have stepped up remarkably by their participation, their volunteering and their donations. And, as Cantor Susan Lewis-Friedman and I establish our partnership, we make space for understanding, collaboration and innovation.

Serving as clergy to this incredible congregation is a deeply humbling privilege, especially as I now share it with an incredibly talented cantor along with all of you. Because of your incredible devotion and talents, our future is once again bright. May our partnership remain strong, and together may we see our mission fulfilled.

Letter from the Cantor

Sacred Partnership

Whether we know it or not, we are always in sacred partnership. We talk about the "Kol D'mamah Dakah", that "still small voice" in the Unetaneh Tokef poem which is recited on the High Holy Days. That voice is God, coming to us in many different forms. Sometimes it is by way of our conscience telling us right from wrong. Other times, it is an extraordinary individual, sometimes a complete stranger, who just shows up to help in a time of crisis.

We are all created "B'tzelem Elohim" (in the image of God), and are thus God's Children, each of us possessing that divine spark within. Even when we encounter individuals who are more challenging, often adversarial, we look no further than Torah to see the great challenges God placed before the Israelites. The ultimate goal? To make them better individuals, and to draw us closer to the Divine, allowing us to respond to these challenges and come out better for them as individuals and as a community.

A Rabbi and Cantor form a sacred partnership like this. When one of us is in need, the other will show up to help. We will inspire and challenge each other, learn from one another, and become closer to the Divine as a result. I am blessed to have a sacred partnership in the form of a mentorship with Cantor David Goldstein. One of the most important pieces of advice he gives me is to "make it all about them", meaning, listen to you, respond with what will help you shine, and ultimately, help you to live in sacred partnership.

Rabbi Gutmann and I are here to serve you, to help you shine, to help you find that Divine spark and personal relationship with God. We are here for you to listen, laugh and cry with, and to be your partners in our Temple Beth Zion Community. We will be offering many different opportunities for musical and liturgical participation. If you get a feeling in your kishkes to explore any of them, just assume that this is the Divine utzing you to do it, and just give it a try!

My hope and prayer is that Rabbi and I will maintain our partnership by listening to that "still, small voice" within each of us, which will guide us to serve you in the greatest possible ways, and in turn, inspire you to partner with us to help Temple Beth Zion to become a house of prayer, hope, and a beacon of light not only for Buffalo, but for the entire Jewish community.

• provide bimah greetings and announcements on behalf of the Board of Trustees at least once per calendar quarter;

 attend or financially support the TBZ Annual Gala and at least one additional Temple-based social/cultural event per year;

 attend religious services, funerals, and shivas based on personal availability;

participate in Congregational programs based on personal availability;

• contribute to, and participate in, the annual Kol Nidre campaign;

• financially support one or more other Buffalo Jewish Community agencies/organizations and proudly represent TBZ at Jewish Buffalo community programs and events;

 participate actively and appropriately in Board meetings, and publicly accept the majority decisions of the Board of Trustees;

• act in accordance with my role as a board member and distinguish that from my role as a Temple volunteer or Auxiliary member;

• prepare adequately for board and committee meetings so that my participation is meaningful;

• exercise discretion in dealing with sensitive matters and ensure that matters requiring confidentiality are unequivocally respected;

 maintain positive relationships and open communication with my colleagues on the Board and on the professional staff;

• have a good working knowledge of TBZ history, its bylaws and its policies;

• work collaboratively with the clergy and professional staff as well as members of the Congregation.

If we, as a Board, strive to achieve these things, I'm confident we will continue to grow as congregation. I also invite all congregants to consider these commitments and how you, too, can be a part of the growth and vitality of Temple Beth Zion. The Community Religious School is gearing up for an exciting year, full of new initiatives and opportunities of engagement and enrichment for our parents and students. Our theme for this year is *K'lal Israel-* The community of Israel. More than ever, we are all recognizing how interconnected our Jewish community is around the world. How events in one place have a dramatic impact on us, whether we want to admit or face it.

Plans for this year include adding exciting electives for the students in grades 4-7 to select throughout the year. Some of the electives taught by Rabbi Brent Gutmann, Rabbi Alex Lazarus-Klein, Rabbi Sara Rich, Cantor Susie Lewis-Friedman, and our staff, include sessions on theology, animals in the Bible, Choir, Jewish Gaming, Talit making and sessions on antisemitism and Israel advocacy. This year we are also introducing *Ulpan Or*, a pilot program for conversational Hebrew.

The *Ganeinu* program for Pre-K children will continue monthly. Our students from 2nd grade will continue to participate in the 1-on-1 Hebrew tutoring. That initiative has been so successful! What Creates Hate?

Jealousy, ignorance, differences and misunderstandings. In this time of growing hate and antisemitism there is only one way to tackle this hate, and that is through education. Temple Beth Zion's Blum Jewish Education Project has actively been targeting antisemitism through education to a wide-spectrum of the community, from preschoolers to retirees. Each person who participates in the program learns about the history of the Jews of Buffalo, Judaism and the architecture of Temple Beth Zion. From this program, we foster dialogue and understanding and open lines of communication and trust.

A few weeks ago, we had over one thousand visitors to Temple for the Explore Buffalo Twilight Mansions Tour and over 500 visitors participated in the Blum Project. One commented to Yzzy, a TBZ staff member, "He was pleasant.... for a Jew." That comment, although incredibly offensive, showed the scale of antisemitism in the community, but also the impact of a positive interaction to begin to change the narrative.

Over the seven months since the Blum Project began to bring groups to Temple, we have learned how little knowledge most of our community has about Judaism and the Jews of Buffalo. Many are surprised that Jews have lived in Buffalo since the early years of the city. Others are fascinated by our collection of artifacts from all over the world and the fact that Jews are not all white Europeans. Mostly, there has been openness to discussion and learning and powerful conversations about Judaism and Jewish practice, the architecture of our Temple and the legacy of the Jews in our community who had the foresight to build a museum and monumental building in the heart of our city. This vision has afforded us the opportunity at this moment to do the work that is so needed in educating our community so that we can truly be the City of Good Neighbors.

The Blum Jewish Education Project brings Western New Yorkers to the Cofeld Museum of Judaica and Temple Beth Zion to learn about local history, architecture, and culture and to gain a deeper appreciation for Jewish heritage.
