Letter from the President

Lineup for Elul

As the summer sun wanes, the final new moon of the Hebrew year rises. Traditions abound from Sephardic Jews who sound the shofar each morning (from this point rather than the start of *Selichot*), to the mystics that say God goes "walking in the fields" to convey God's receptiveness, accessibility, and approachability as we approach the new year. In Elul, we experience God's nearness as we open our hearts to the possibilities of transformation. Elul is a gift—a chance to realign with our values, take action, and embrace this period with hope, growth, and renewal.

Contained in this bulletin are details for our fall class offerings, as well as opportunities to get involved in upcoming programs. Each of these programs presents its own chance for hope, growth, and renewal. We have many classes starting this month:

For Adults: Our monthly Lunch & Learn sessions resume, as well as our weekly Wednesday morning deep dive into modern Israel, with iEngage 3.0: Jewish Values & the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict. You need not have attended iEngage last year to join, and I believe this section is the best course of the entire series.

For Kids Grades 1-7: Aleph Champ begins this month, offering the chance to learn Hebrew in an easy and engaging way with our Cantor and me.

For Men: I am excited to join Rob Goldberg in offering a monthly Thursday evening Men Gathering group meeting in local watering holes and homes for learning and fraternity.

For Everyone: Cantor and I will co-teach our first class, Music & Mysticism, monthly on Wednesday evening. You need not be 40 years old to attend!

For High Schoolers: Next month we will announce more information about this year's offering to High School students, just in time for the High Holy Days.

And that's hardly all! Our Bulletin is chock-full of opportunities for Young Families, offerings from Sisterhood, and a special lecture coming on September 18.

So, hear the call of the Shofar – devote yourself to the love of learning, and deepen friendships at Temple Beth Zion this year as we recommit ourselves and God joins us on our journey into the month of Elul as we get ready for the Days of Awe and an awesome year ahead!





Mah Koreh B'CRS (What's Happening at CRS)

The Community Religious School serves the students of Temple Beth Tzedek, Temple Beth Zion, Congregation Shir Shalom and unaffiliated families. One community, one community school. CRS provides engaging curriculum which includes Holidays, Israel, Torah, Ethics/Values, Life cycle, History, Art and Music. The Hebrew curriculum is taught as private, remote lessons to students from 1st through 7th grade. Hebrew is reinforced during T'fillah time on Sundays.

As the Community Religious school is embarking on its fourth year, new initiatives are being implemented. An engaging high level of intensives are going to be selected by the students in grades 4-7. These intensives include courses taught by rabbis Alex, Gutmann and Rich. They will include opportunity for advanced Hebrew conversational from Israel called Ulpan-Or, as well as a pilot program from Israel integrating Jewish texts with Jewish economic leadership. Our partnership with Buffalo's Jewish Federation is expanding to offer the Student to Student initiative, along with adult Jewish courses at CRS.

Opening day for the 2024-2025 school year is September 15th. Our Ganainu will meet on September 29th. We are looking forward to CRS at TBZ's Cofeld museum on September 22nd.




