etter from the President

The Power of Music

Whether it was TBZ Sunday School, or as a child at Camp Centerland or Camp Lakeland, music played a big role in my Jewish upbringing. And now, as we head into our High Holy Day season, I realize even more what a vital role music plays in Reform Judaism.

Of all the key aspects of music, I think its primary role is enhancing the spiritual experience of the congregation. Music has the power to elevate the soul, and to create an emotional connection. Through the use of melodies and harmonies, congregants can express a range of emotions, from joy to sorrow, making worship more meaningful and accessible to a broader audience. The inclusion of musical instruments, such as the organ, piano, and guitar, further enriches the worship experience. These instruments, to me, help to create an atmosphere of reverence and beauty, making the service more engaging and dynamic.

While I can't play an instrument, nor carry a tune, I strongly believe that singing together as a community fosters a sense of unity and shared purpose, reinforcing the values that are central to Reform Jewish identity. Moreover, music serves as an educational tool, helping to teach Hebrew language, Jewish history, and religious concepts in an accessible and memorable way.

In addition to Rabbi Gutmann's own musical talents, I'm confident the addition of Cantor Susie will help guide us even more in prayer through song. The cantor's role is to inspire participation from the congregation, making music a communal rather than a performative aspect of worship. I know first-hand from the services I've attended, and watched on-line, that this is in fact the case.

Through the integration of musical instruments and a diverse repertoire of songs, music helps to create a vibrant and spiritually enriching environment for congregants. I look forward to seeing you at services and, of course, encourage you to enjoy the music during the High Holy Day season. I also strongly encourage you to reach out to Cantor Susie if you are interested in joining the choir or playing in the band.

Letter from the Rabbi

You Are Good

The weather is cooling, yet our world is still on fire. This month, we will mark the first anniversary of the most shocking atrocity committed against the Jewish people since the Holocaust. The aim of terror is to terrorize, to undermine our confidence and to intimidate. Terror imposes anxiety like a fog of war clouding our judgement, causing us to forget ourselves until the opportunity arises for us to be called back by the still small voice.

Each year as we approach the High Holy Days, the sound of a shofar helps to push away the fog. The voice calls to us. It asks us, have you conducted yourself honorably? Have you been faithful? Have you learned? Have you grown? Have you helped to sustain our world? Do you still believe in redemption?

As we hear the sound of the shofar this year, it is my foremost hope that it reminds us of who we are. Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel reminds us, "We are a people in whom the past endures, in whom the present is inconceivable without moments gone by. The stories of Abraham and Sarah and our other ancient ancestors lasted just a moment, but it was a moment enduring forever. What happened once upon a time happens all the time." (Israel: An Echo of Eternity, page 128)

Rosh HaShanah celebrates not only the birthday of the world, but the opportunity to bear out a new world. This is our belief that what is broken can always be fixed—that *tikkun olam* can be accomplished. We believe that people are more good on balance than bad—that the image of God inhabits each of us. This is not meant to deny all the wars and all of the cruelty and all of the violence. We won't look away from any of that, but we can still recognize something beautiful about being what we are.

History is soaked in blood. The future probably will be, too. But for every atrocity, there are a thousand small kindnesses that no one noticed. A hundred souls who spent their time loving and caring for each other. A few moments of true grace. Maybe it's only a little more good than bad in us, but even if it is a little, we can shine light. We can be among the righteous. We can listen for the call. We can lift each other up. We will keep the fire at bay with our coolness. Together, we will find our way through the wilderness.

Shana Tovah U'metukah Tikateivu! May this year be good and sweet, and may God inscribe all of us in the Book of Life! Rabbi Brent Gutmann

- Members of the Ritual Committee will lead Tashlich at Hoyt Lake, across from the AKG, following the Rosh HaShanah Morning Service on October 3.
- Join us in Glen Park at 5 PM on Thursday, October 3, for a 10-minute meaningful Tashlich ritual. We will sound the shofar and toss bird seed into the water, as we symbolically rid ourselves of the transgressions of the last year. NOTE: Glen Park strictly prohibits the throwing of bread or breadcrumbs as it is a hazard to the ducks and other

wildlife. Please do not bring these items. Everyone is welcome to celebrate the New Year with this beautiful ritual.

Glen Park is at 224 Glen Ave., north of Main Street and south of Glen Avenue, between Mill Street and E. Spring Street/Rock Street. We will meet below the waterfall. Parking is available off of Glen Avenue, near Nature Play at Glen Park -- a playground designed to encourage children to climb, crawl, and let their imaginations run wild.

• A memorial service will be held Sunday, October 6, at 11:30 AM in Forest Lawn Cemetery (section Z). Rabbi Brent Gutmann will lead a brief service in memory of beloved members of our families. This service offers comfort to the living while remembering our departed loved ones.




Sunday, October 20
