Letter from the President

It was great to see so many of you at the High Holy Days. Time ran a bit short during High Holy Day services for me to share a full update, so I include it here.

I start by recognizing how magnificent it is to have our full clergy team in place. Cantor Susie has been the impetus to creating the dedicated choir and has enhanced services through her musical talents. She's also got a temple band started and just began working with the Community Religious School children as well.

Through the Blum Jewish Education Project, the Board recently had a chance to experience this hour-long program with Jill Gutmann. We not only learned about our history and architecture but walked away with a sense of pride and renewed sense of passion. The work we are doing to bring Jews and non-Jews into our spiritual home to educate them on the history of TBZ, our architecture, and the history of Jews in Buffalo is unmatched, and I encourage you to schedule a tour with some friends, classmates, or co-workers.

I also want to recognize our Sisterhood. The work they do, the commitment they have, and the connections they've made truly demonstrate what a best-in-class auxiliary organization should look like. With that said, let me share that we are in the process of restructuring the TBZ Brotherhood. New board member Michael Adler is working on some programs and ways to engage all men within TBZ – young and old, new members or legacies, old guys like me with grown kids, and fathers like Mike with young families. You'll soon hear more about their first program – a good one that involves Israeli whiskey tasting – coming up in December. My thanks to Ken Graber, Erroll Sull, and Norm Weingarten for their past and continued support.

You may have noticed that we established a new way of greeting and ushering through the creation of the TBZ Ambassador program. Thanks to Rabbi Gutmann, Kerri Blabac, and Christina Akers-Dicenzo, we have an active group of people who've volunteered to welcome and assist service attendees. Not only does this provide an additional layer of security, but it also creates a warm and welcoming atmosphere. If you'd like to volunteer as an Ambassador, or in any other way, please reach out to me directly and I can point you in the right direction.

On November 1 and 2 we'll be celebrating Cantor Susie's installation with her formal installation on Friday night and a fun-filled cabaret-style event on Saturday night. I encourage you to join us as Cantor David Goldstein, formerly of TBZ, will be here on Friday November 1 for the installation ceremony.

I also know it is out there but want you to save the date – May 17, 2025 – for our first annual spring gala. This year, the gala will be focused on celebrating our 175th anniversary and we are excited to create a social event you won't want to miss. We'll be looking for event and table sponsors, auction items, and of course your participation. More details to follow as we turn the secular calendar.

I would be remiss without a word about finances. Thank you to those who have already contributed to the Kol Nidre campaign. These dollars are critical to our success. And, as we create more programs, we need more financial support. Your contribution, regardless of the amount, is much appreciated. We cannot exist on dues alone, so our annual fundraising campaign supports our operating budget each year. My thanks to Sam and Joni Shatkin and David and Paulette Gordon for leading the charge.

Speaking of dues, I want to thank those who are groundbreaking members of our newly created Cornerstone Society. With contributions at \$5k, \$10k or \$18k, we have 16 individuals who have stepped up to show their love and passion for TBZ by committing to annual dues above sustaining membership. If you would like to learn about this initiative, I'd be happy to discuss it with you.

And finally, there are two other initiatives that we are incredibly proud of. The first is our involvement with the Grinspoon Foundation's Life and Legacy Program. To date we have about 50 individuals who have made a pledge to leave a gift to TBZ through their individual retirement fund, life insurance policy, or a will or trust. These commitments will create an endowment ensuring TBZ's financial health for years to come. My thanks to our partners the Buffalo Jewish Federation and the Foundation for Jewish Philanthropies.

The last update is in regard to the Capital Campaign that we've had for two years now, which initially was designed to repair, restore, and rebuild our spiritual home here at 805 Delaware. From the new parking lot and entrance stairs to the fixed roof (no leaking water running down the walls anymore), to a new HVAC system, we successfully completed many projects to ensure this building remains the "jewel on Delaware" and a symbol of Jewish Buffalo. With plans to bring our administrative offices downtown, build a new conference room and gift shop, enhance security, refresh the Fink Auditorium and more, we're in the middle of Phase Two with a goal of raising a total of \$12M. Be on the lookout for more information on how you can help contribute to this campaign which continues to include an amazing matching gift.

None of our plans matter without you. Thank you to all you who generously volunteer your time, treasure, and talent to benefit Temple Beth Zion.

Letter from the Cantor

Pushing the Envelope

Over the years when I have extended the invitation to join the Adult Choir, there would inevitably be individuals who would say to me, "When I was a kid in school, the choir director told me to "mouth the words." Often, others would laugh out loud at the thought of being part of a singing ensemble. It is my belief that anyone who has the desire should at least give it a try. After all, desire is that "spark", placed into each one of us by God, that kol d'mamah d'akah (still, small voice) which guides us. When we listen to it, we are sure to become our best selves, and will feel fulfillment.

Our volunteer choir has exceeded expectations! Many of them were afraid to "push the envelope" and join. Each week, I was in awe of the amount of people who would come to participate in our weekly rehearsals. Some came reluctantly, not sure whether or not they would fit in with the group. Some felt as though they did contribute to the group, but that if they had to miss one of the services, they would not be missed. My answer was, when building a house, if even a single builder on the team steps away for a second, everything has to be revamped, often totally changed or in some cases, the building will not happen. The same holds true for the choir. Whether experienced or not, they learned to listen to one another, to correct one another kindly, and to sing as one voice. For the first time, they sang at one of the most poignant moments of the entire High Holy Days Kol Nidre, with so many new elements added in without rehearsals, such as our amazing cellist Roman Mekinulov. Some of them were surprised to be singing for this moment, and to that I said, "As long as there is breath in my body, I will have a choir accompanying me for the Kol Nidre prayer."

It is a fact that the beauty and cohesiveness of the music of these holidays was due to Paul Dykstra, my longtime musical collaborator and colleague from Chicago. He has a unique gift of making the organ sing, and has an innate ability to accompany singers unlike any other. Many commented that the organ was extraordinarily in sync with the Cantor and choir this year. Paul and I have done this together so many times that we could do it in our sleep, but it would not have been as easy if not for our team of Sound Professionals headed by our very own Larry Scheur, who we are so incredibly grateful to, for donating his time, equipment, and heart. We were doubly blessed to have Jarret Izzo accompanying the choir and me at the piano with his amazing, improvisational playing and his talent

for making the pieces of our contemporary worship just come to life. You may remember "Heal Us Now" as sung by the choir. Jarret and Paul allowed the choir and me to make such musical moments that truly felt as if we were transported into Heaven.

It had always been my dream to have an all-volunteer choir for High Holy Day services. Synagogue choirs often achieve this goal for regular and special services during the year, but will hire professionals to enhance the holidays. Our High Holy Days are such extraordinary times when we get to reconnect with members who we do not see as often. Seeing one's peers singing this classical style, extraordinary music encourages participation by all, and makes moments in the worship participatory rather than experiential. I want to thank each one of them, and give a special thanks to Errol Sull who provided delicious desserts for us for each rehearsal. Special thank you to Beth Steinberg, who worked tirelessly to provide snacks, communication, and kept us running. Thanks goes to Sue Stone for her hard work of getting things organized for us to have our weekly rehearsals. And, of course, to our amazing choir: Ryan Bonetto, Michael Bruckheimer, Amy DeLury, Matthew Eichhorn, Jennifer Field, Janet Frankel, Grant Golden, Ellen Goldstein, Jody Goldstein, Ken Graber, Daria Gutmann, Chana Kohen, Charlotte Long, Amélida Ortiz Weinmann, Anna Marie Richmond, Gary Richmond, Jennifer Ross, Victory Ross, Adiel Sanchez, Tizzy Schechter, Sara Schultz, Terry Small, Milo Smith, Beth Steinberg, Errol Sull, and Samantha White.

Of course, during the High Holy Days, we hear the voice of the Cantor a great deal, in the many listening moments of our worship. My album producer and long-time sound engineer, Mike Konopka advised me when making my album that the ear tires of hearing the same voice on repeat. It is important instead to invite others into the mix. I was honored this year to be able to sing with our wonderful volunteer soloists: Jay Mesnikoff, Sara Schultz, Amélida Ortiz Weinmann, Cantor Barbara Ostfeld, Daria Gutmann, and of course our awesome Aaron Pieri, who gave my son Zev the wonderful opportunity of singing *Adonai Roi* with him for Yizkor.

It is not too late to join our awesome choir. We meet every Tuesday at 7:30 at the Broder Center for fun, community, and music. Stay tuned for more from our choir, including my installation on Friday November 1

Thank you so much for the beautiful, warm welcome you have given to me and my family. Cantor Ostfeld told me that if I ever had the chance to come to Buffalo, that I should run, not walk, to it, because it is such an amazing community. How right she is!



Mah Koreh B'CRS (What's Happening at CRS)

The new initiatives implemented at the Community Religious School are reflecting the core educational values set forth by the Education Committee, the clergy and the parents. This year, students in grades 4-7 were asked to select electives that interest them. The chosen electives demonstrate how, through creativity and collaboration, a school can meet its students where they are; and facilitate for them a path forward. The electives chosen in the fall semester include: make your own Talit with Cathy Shuman Miller and Bible study-examining judges, prophets and kings of Israel with Rabbi Gutmann. Rabbi Rich will be teaching an elective on Animals in Judaism, exploring Biblical sources, Mitzvot and rabbinic literature. Rabbi Alex will be leading an elective for creative Jewish writing. CRS staff will be leading an elective on Jewish communities around the world.

While the students are getting introduced to Musar values, they also have had opportunities to put them into action. Students learned about Chesed and participated in Temple Beth Tzedek's Outstretched Arm program for Jews with disabilities and delivered Rosh Hashanah meals to seniors at Amberleigh Senior Living. Learning about Chesed is one thing, true absorption of its meaning is when you put it into action. Really, actions speak louder than words...

The month of November will include family education programs led by Rabbi Alex. These opportunities for crossgenerational learning have been successful for the students and the parents. Our CRS choir, led by cantors Susie and Arlene, has been meeting after CRS session and has inspired a growing number of students to join and participate. The Ganainu once-a-month pre-k program with Morah Ashirah provides enriching learning and engaging opportunities for children and their parents and caregivers.

We donate approximately \$10,000 every year to help with security, scholarships for students, programs and many other things. We gave \$50,000 to refurbish the Sisterhood Chapel. 
TBZ Sisterhood Dash's Receipts Fundraiser

To date, we have raised over \$1,400 to benefit Sisterhood sponsored activities for Temple Beth Zion. Thank you for your continued support!




