Or would you rather I say Happy Dodransbicentennial, or Septaquintaquinquecentennial? How about I just say, "Happy 175th!

As the secular calendar turns to 2025, we celebrate 175 years at Temple Beth Zion, having been founded in 1850. With a quick visit to https://www.tbz.org/about-tbz/ history/, you will learn how TBZ grew into one of the oldest and largest Reform congregations in the nation, having reorganized in 1863 from the Orthodox movement. You will learn how Rabbi Fink, followed by Rabbi Goldberg, led us through tremendous growth from 1926 through 1994, and how the fire at 599 Delaware in 1961 led to the creation of our beautiful sanctuary at 805 Delaware today. If you have not already watched the "Legacy of Light" documentary that was created when we opened the re-imagined Cofeld Judaic Museum, I strongly encourage you to visit our history page and scroll down to watch it on YouTube. In a short 14 minutes, you will learn about the history of TBZ, the history of Jews in Buffalo, and about our beautiful sanctuary that has been called the "jewel of Delaware."

With that history, now it is time to celebrate! As you turn your calendars to 2025, please mark May 17, 2025 for our First Annual Spring Gala, with this year's focus on celebrating our 175th anniversary. We are especially thrilled to honor longtime members John Laping and Toby Fink Laping. A formal invitation will be shared soon, but know that we will be looking for sponsorships, auction items and, of course, your participation. A fun-filled evening in our Fink Auditorium awaits! A final thought: The number 175 in Hebrew is written as "Aharon." Translated, that means "light bringer." Letter from the Rabbi

A New Logo for Our Temple

Healthy synagogues are not simply ones with balanced budgets. Neither are they ones that attract hundreds of worshipers every week. Nor are they ones who successfully retain clergy for decades. Rather, healthy synagogues are learning synagogues. They are confident, even in the face of challenges as they recognize their strengths and their opportunities to grow.

This month marks the halfway point in my initial contract with the temple. Part of the transformation I have witnessed is the growth in our leadership's understanding of sacred partnership. As we seek sacred partnership, we seek to emulate values such as empathy and honor, transparency and communication. As we do so, we create processes to help our temple discern its circumstances and make good decisions together.

I am excited to share with you this month yet another exciting step on the path strengthening our temple so that it can reach its full potential. Approximately six months ago, our board empowered a carefully selected committee of past-presidents, board members, and lay leaders, guided by the graphic expertise of Truax & Company for the purpose of recommending a new logo to succeed our prior logo, designed by Kathy Rogers. The new logo was approved last month by our Board and you will begin to see it more and more as we make the official transition to it this month. Thank you to the design advisory committee including: Leslie Zemsky, Jean DuBow, Toby Laping, Samantha White, and Ken Rogers.

The most important priority of a logo is that it uniquely identifies an organization, but also that it conveys that organization's understanding of its history, who it is, and who it wishes to be. For our committee, as we considered a new logo, we sought to capture the sacredness of our congregation in our relationships and in the collective impact we make in the lives of our members and in our community.

The image we chose is anchored in the shape of the scalloped walls of our 805 Delaware Avenue sanctuary. Architect John Laping, who will be honored at our 175th Gala with his wife, Toby Fink Laping, explains the shape of our building is meant to represent the "fingers of God holding the congregation." Inner light and color was inspired by Ben Shahn's stained glass masterpiece. Within it, all creation is held in the hand of the Eternal.





As the new secular year is upon us, CRS is in full swing! The new initiatives implemented at the Community Religious School are continuing into the winter session. The winter electives are OMG-an exploration of the concept of G-d taught by Rabbi Rich, Jewish communities around the world, taught by CRS staff, Antisemitism and Antizionism taught by Rabbi Gutmann, Jewish Gaming taught by Rabbi Alex and an elective on current Israel Advocacy taught by Michal Shmuel-Lewis.

CRS students continue to be involved and initiate Tikkun Olam opportunities. Our 5th grade class initiated and implemented a rescue pet drive. Our students participated in Chanukkah card writing to United States Jewish service men and women stationed around the world. Students in grades 6 and 7 will participate in a learning session on Autism as part of Jewish Disability Month in February. We are also appreciative of TBT's Men's Club for leading our students in learning about the Mitzvah of putting on T'fillin as part of the World Wide Wrap.

Update Your Information

Cofeld Corner

We have started to digitize "nowhere else to be found" materials through a local and global resource company, <u>Hein Online</u>. These materials illustrate congregational, community and international history found within the Museum that would otherwise be difficult to access, especially within the older, oversized and bound volumes. All these materials connect to member histories and provide genealogical resources to explore.

The first item featured is a modest looking ledger that is now over a century old. "The Buffalo Jewish Relief Committee for Sufferers from the War, Campaign 1922," reveals how Temple Beth Zion members led the way for the entire community, Jews and non-Jews, to help aid European Jewry after WWI. In the past, Jews had left Europe in times of violence and famine and had emigrated to America. But the year of the ledger is significant. It is around the same time that anti-immigrant feeling was gaining an upper hand in America. The year before this 1922 campaign, the Emergency Quota Act (1921) set immigration limitations based on different national groups that impacted eastern European prospective immigrants more harshly. This was the backdrop in which this ledger comes into its meaning. It's why so many Jews needed help in places they could not leave.

Eugene Warner of Temple Beth Zion, and community leader, was appointed statewide coordinator of the campaign. He was aided by another Temple Beth Zion member, Cecil Wiener, alongside leaders of other synagogues and volunteers from across the community.

Hundreds of people gave to the cause, and many of them were from Beth Zion. Each donor name includes an address, left out of the edited list in the *Buffalo Jewish Review*. By reading through the home addresses (and sometimes their changes within a few months), we see the beginnings of a northward move in Buffalo, as well as a still strong showing on the East Side and in the streets around Delaware Avenue. It illustrates a community of subcommunities mixing and growing as the boundaries between older founding communities of Buffalo Jews and newer immigrant descendants becomes a lot more fluid. It allows us to see older areas of living and newer choices of residence, and it further illuminates the sheer range of neighborhoods that Jews chose to settle in.
