

Letter from the President

At work, I am responsible for putting together a 350-person sales conference. Each year we meet with senior leaders to discuss potential themes as we assess where the business is and where we are going. This year our conference theme was "Evolve," and our logo was a butterfly. When speaking about that, our senior VP of sales said, "We can't just continue to do the same things and expect people to do them better and faster. The butterfly represents true change. Think about the evolution from a caterpillar to a butterfly. It starts out as one thing but ends up something completely different."

Sometimes it is funny how work life and personal life parallel each other. At TBZ, as we think about our next 175 years, we too need to evolve. Letter from the Rabbi

Vote For Reform Judaism!

Voting is both our civic and a Jewish obligation. Responding to threats of antisemitism and the need to secure Jewish self-determination in our people's historic land, Theodore Herzl and leaders from across the Jewish World established the World Zionist Congress (WZC) in 1897. To this day, the WZC is the Jewish people's democratically elected international body. As antisemitism has once again reached historic levels, it is more important than ever that we exercise our Reform Jewish voice.

Representation among diaspora Jews in the WZC is determined by a vote held every five years. 2025 WZC elections begin this month on March 10 and continue through May 4. Over the next five years, the WZC will decide how to distribute five billion dollars as they fund major organizations of the Jewish world. This is a way for diaspora Jews like you to have a voice and stand up for pluralism, equality, security, and a path to peace.

Currently, ultra-Orthodox leaders and extreme politicians hold significant power in Israel, often marginalizing Reform Jews, women, LGBTQ+ individuals, and expanding settlements. They aim to undermine Israel's democratic foundations and roll back advancements in social equality. Our opponents in the WZC campaign are highly motivated religious fundamentalists whose vision for the future of Israel is diametrically opposed to ours.

The upcoming WZC election presents a pivotal opportunity for Reform Jews in North America to influence the future of Israel. By casting your vote for the Association of Reform Zionists of America (ARZA), you can help shape Israel into a more democratic, pluralistic, and inclusive society.

Our congregation has started to build our team – and we need your help! Beginning March 10, votes can be cast online or by picking up and completing a paper ballot. All self-identifying Jews over 18 years old are eligible to vote if they pay a simple \$5 administrative fee. To vote online, use the QR code on page 4 of this Bulletin or go to: https://urj.tfaforms.net/1507. If you wish to vote by paper ballot, you can pick one up at 805 Delaware before or after services, at the Broder Center during open hours, or you can call the Temple office to have a paper ballot mailed to you.

Please help us meet our goal by casting your vote!

Letter from the Cantor

Music Notes

Another word for Cantor is Hazzan, which refers to an "over-seer", and the term was used in ancient Babylonian times (2000-1600 B.C.E.). The profession of the Cantorate has certainly evolved over time. In the late 19th and early 20th Centuries, synagogues would often hire the Hazzan to be both the Cantor and Kosher butcher! During the time of composer Max Janowski (who wrote the famous Avinu Malkeinu that we know and love), congregations employed a Music Director, not a Cantor, to oversee the music of the congregation and to direct choirs--roles which I lovingly perform as your cantor today. Max would offer solos to lay members of his choir who would serve in the role of Sheliach Tzibur, an "over-seer" or "sender", throughout the worship services, offering the prayers on behalf of community. How exciting it is to serve Beth Zion, with its myriad of talented people who joyously take part in similar roles today in our congregation! Not only do I get to serve in this role as the Hazzan or "over-seer", Sheliach Tzibur, but I also get to serve as the great Max Janowski did, directing and guiding our choir, and empowering individuals from it to also serve as these senders of prayer to the congregation.


Sisterhood Spotlight


